Madrid, Sept. 29. 1695.

THE Fleet under the Command of Admiral Ruffel passed by Alicant on the 18th Instant, taking their Course towards Cadix. The Essex Man of War, with the two French Prizes, the Content and Trident, arrived at Málaga the 15th. We hear from Catalonia, That the Spaniards are going to re-fortifie Ostalrick, which was lately quitted by the French.

Turin, Octob. 5. The Spanish Forces are come to Rivoli, where they will continue some days, and then return to the Milanese, the Campaign being ended in these parts.

Vienna, Octob. 5. An account is come by Letters from the Elector of Saxony and General Caprara, dated the 26th past in their Camp near Gena, on the Frontiers of Transilvania; That in pursuance of what had been resolved in a Council of War, his Electoral Highness and the said General marched with 16 Imperial Regiments of Horse and Dragoons, and 20 Field-Pieces, towards Lippa; and the Foot, with the Saxon and Brandenburg Horse and the rest of the Artillery, marched back by Segudin towards the Danube. The 21st his Electoral Highness came to Nadbach, the 22d to Sembach; and the 24th encamped within a League of Lippa; where they understood from several hands the Defeat of General Veterani (whereof they had before heard several Rumours) by the whole Turkish Army, which was said to consist of 18000 Janizaries and 40000 Spahis. Whereupon, a Council of War being held, it was resolved that they should turn their March towards Deva, in order to cover Transilvania. Accordingly, the 25th they encamped within two Leagues of Gena, and the 26th came to that place; An Officer arrived there from General Truches, with an account, That the Turkish Army had on the 21st attacked General Veterani near Lugos; and though the later had with him but 6500 Men, yet they maintained the fight from Morning till Evening; when General Veterani being himself desperately wounded, and afterwards taken with the Baggage, General Truches retired with the remaining Forces to Carinsfeld; and being strengthened with the Garison drawn from thence, he posted himself near the Iron Gate, where he had together, when this Express came away, above 5000 Men. The Elector of Saxony and General Caprara intended to continue their March with all the diligence they could towards Transilvania, and proposed to be the 30th at Deva; and 'twas said the Elector would call together the States of that Principality, to take such Resolutions as should be necessary for their Security in this Juncture of Affairs.

The Turks had not attempted any thing since their action with Veterani; and some intercepted Letters, say they lost then 12000 of their best Men. The Imperial Infantry, with the Saxon and Brandenburg Horse, returned the 28th to Peter Waradin, and design to give the Enemy a Diverfion on that side. 'Tis said that General Veterani is alive in the Enemy's hands.

Cologne, Octob. 4. There is nothing new from the Upper Rhine, the two Armies continuing in their former Camps, but preparing for their Winter-Quarters. The Letters from Vienna of the 5th say, That the Elector of Saxony continued his March towards Transilvania, to protect that Country against the Turks, who have done nothing since their action with General Veterani; and General Truches had secured the famous Pass of the Iron Gate.

Paris, Octob. 14. They write from Perpignan that the Regiments of Horse and Dragoons are arrived from Xaintoigne and Poitou, as is thought to joyne the Army commanded by the Duke of Vendosme, which is still about Palamos, employed in the Demolishing of that place. The Marechal de Villeroi has cantoned the Troops of his Army along the Lys, where they will stay till the 25th, and then go into Winter-Quarters. The said Marechal is expected at Paris towards the end of this Month. It is yet uncertain whether they will set out the Fleet at Toulon.

Brussels, Octob. 16. The Forces of the Allies that are to Winter in Flanders, are not yet all gone into their Quarters, but the greatest part of them continue cantoned between Ghent, Bruges, Ostend, and Newport. Most of the French Troops are already gone into Winter-Quarters, and the Troops of the Household returned to France; the rest are cantoned near Harlebeck and Courtray. The Marechal de Boufflers was expected on Wednesday last at Lille.

Hague, Octob. 18. N. S. The Wind being now fair, the King will Embark to Morrow at the Oranie Polder. The Elector of Brandenburg took his leave of His Majesty this morning, and is gone to Rotterdam in his way home. All is quiet in Flanders.

Whitehall, October 11. Yesterday in the Evening we received an Account, by an Express, That His Majesty Embarked last Wednesday Morning in the Maese, and Landed Yesterday about Ten in the Morning at Margate, being attended by 3 English and 7 Dutch Men of War, under the Command of Sir Cloudesly Shovel. His Majesty intended to lay last Night at Canterbury, to Dine this Day at Northfleet near Gravesend, and to be this Evening at Kensington.

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this Month. It is said, That several new Edicts will be speedily published here for raising of Money, and one of them for alienating the Revenue arising by the Posts.

Brussels, Octob. 12. The Armies are separated on both sides and the Troops going into winter Quarters. The Brandenburg Troops have likewise left the County of Hesbaye in order to march into their Winter Quarters; and the Count de Harcourt and Monsieur de Pracontal, have thereupon sent back the Forces under their Command to their respective Garrisons. The Count de Guiscard late Governour of Namur, is made Governour of Dinant. The French are going to make several new Fortifications at Charleroy. The Council of war has begun to meet at Ghent for the Tryal of Major General Eilenberg and the rest of the Officers of the late Garrisons of Dixmayde and Deynse.

Hague, Octob. 14, N. S. The Elector of Brandenburg arrived here last Sunday in the Evening, and is lodged at Prince Maurice's House. The State of the War for the next Year, as formed by the Council of State, has been laid before the States General, and by them transmitted to the States of the several Provinces, for their Approbation.

The Wind coming Easterly in the beginning of this Week, His Majesty intended to have Embarked for England on Wednesday last, but it changed; and every thing is now ready for His Majesty's going on Board with the first fair Wind.

Edinburgh, Octob. 3. The Council met this Day, and read a Petition of the Earl of Breadalbin, but there not being produced any Order from His Majesty concerning him, he still remains a Prisoner in the Castle: There are already Certificates brought to the Council of more than 100 Ministers, that had before refused the Oaths, and have now taken them. The Council is adjourned till the 7th of November next,

Falmouth, October 3. His Majesty's Ship the *Norwich* and the Merchant Ships under her Convoy bound to *Ireland*, which sailed hence the 30th past, were forced back again the next day by the strong westerly Winds.

Plimouth, October 6. The 4th Instant sailed out of this Port the *King's-Fisher* and *Roebucke*, with divers Merchant Ships bound to *London*. This day came in a Dutch Privateer from the *West-Indies*; who came thence in Company of another Privateer, but they were separated near the *Bermudese*.

Dartmouth, October 6. On the 2d Instant Rear Admiral Hopson came into *Torbay* with the Squadron of Men of War under his Command, from Cruizing on the French Coast, some of them having received Damage in their Topmasts; and yesterday morning sailed again for *Spithead*.

Weymouth, Octob. 7. On the 6th Instant came in here the *Quaker Ketch* from Cruizing, and with him several small Vessels: On the 2d arrived in *Portland Road* the *Jacob of Newport* bound for *Bilboa*; and the *Atiel of O-Porto* bound home from *Holland*; and they are since both gone out again.

Newcastle, Octo. 4. On Tuesday last arrived here 17 Merchant Ships from *Amsterdam*, under Convoy of two Men of War; and the Ships bound for the *Maese* will sail this day under Convoy of 2 other Dutch Frigates.

Hull, Octob. 7. On Saturday last arrived here a Swedish Ship from *Goszenburgh*, the Master whereof says, he left in that Port about 5 days ago, above 40 Sail of Merchant Ships, English and Suedes, bound for *London*, under Convoy of 2 English Men of War.

Yarmouth, Octo. 4. Yesterday went out of this Road about 50 Sail of light Colliers bound to *Newcastle*.

Yarmouth, Octob. 7. Yesterday morning passed through this Road another Fleet of Light Colliers, being about 60 Sail, under Convoy of the *Garland* and *Bonadventure*; The *Charles Gall'y*, *Solebay*, and *Milford* came in at the same time: And in the Afternoon arrived here a Fleet of laden Colliers of about the same number; part of them bound for this Place, and the rest for the River.

Cows, Octob. 7. Yesterday was sent in here by Capt. *Aarian Dirrickson* of *Flushing*, a French Vessel laden with Wine, Brandy and Linen.

Portsmouth, October 8. Rear Admiral Hopson came to *Spithead* the 6th Instant with the *Cambridge* and several other Men of War from the *Wettward*. Six *George Rovers* will sail this day to *St Helens*, with the Men of War designed for the *Streights*; and the outward bound Merchant Ships will go out at the same time.

Deale, October 8. The 4th Instant in the Night a Ship called the *William* bound to *Barbadoes*, was carried out of the *Downes*, as 'tis believed, by her own Men, the Master being ashore; since which the Vessel has not been heard of. Yesterday sailed hence the outward bound Merchant Ships and Coasters under Convoy of the *War-sprite* and *Vulture*.

Westminster, Octob. 8. The Parliament met this day, and was by Commission again prorogued to the 31st of this month.
