PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Termination of the Present War (Definition) Act, 1918, it is provided that His Majesty in Council may declare what date is to be treated as the date of the termination of the present war, and that the date so declared shall be as nearly as may be the date of the exchange or deposit of ratifications of the treaty or treaties of peace, and that His Majesty may also similarly declare what date is to be treated as the date of the termination of war between His Majesty and any particular State:

And whereas at Versailles on the twentyeighth day of June, nineteen hundred and nineteen, a treaty of peace between the Allied and Associated Powers and Germany was signed on

behalf of His Majesty:

And whereas by the said treaty of peace it was provided that a process-verbal of the deposit of ratifications should be drawn up as soon as the treaty had been ratified by Germany on the one hand and by three of the principal Allied or Associated Powers on the other, and that from the date of the said process-verbal the treaty would come into force between the high contracting parties who had ratified it:

And whereas the said treaty having been ratified by Germany and three of the principal Allied and Associated Powers, including His Majesty, such a process-verbal as aforesaid has been drawn up dated the tenth day of January, nineteen hundred and twenty:

And whereas treaties of peace with other belligerents not having yet been ratified it is desirable to declare the date which is to be treated as the date of the termination of war with Germany before declaring the date which is to be treated as the date of the termination of the present war:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said tenth day of January shall be treated as the date of the termination of war between His Majesty and Germany.

W HEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in

Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. In Regulation 2AB after the words "Commissioners of Works," where those words first occur, there shall be inserted the words "or as respects Ireland the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland."

2. In Regulation 14B for the words "and the Chief Secretary respectively, shall" there shall be substituted the words "and references to the Lord Lieutenant or Chief Secretary shall re-

spectively.'

3. In Regulation 30E after the words "A person shall not" there shall be inserted the words "except under and in pursuance of a licence granted by the Treasury."

WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased to approve a change in the constitution of the Army Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) The Secretary of State is to be responsible to His Majesty and Parliament for all the business of the Army Council.

All business, other than business which the Secretary of State specially reserves to himself, is to be transacted in the following principal divisions:—

- (a) The Under Secretary of State shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for the administration of business affecting the Territorial Force Associations, the Volunteer Force, and War Department lands, and for so much of the other business of the Army Council as may be assigned to him, from time to time, by the Secretary of State.
 - (b) The Chief of the Imperial General Staff, the Adjutant-General, the Quarter-master-General, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and the Deputy Chief of the Imperial General Staff, shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for the administration of so much of the business relating to the organisation, disposition, personnel, armament and maintenance of the Army, as shall be assigned to them, or

each of them, from time to time, by the Secretary of State.

(c) The Finance Member of the Army Council shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for the finance of the Army, and for so much of the other business of the Army Council as may be assigned to him, from time to time, by the Secretary of State.

(d) The Surveyor-General of Supply shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for so much of the business relating to the commercial administration of Army supplies as is not under the control of the Ministry of Munitions, and as may be assigned to him, from time to time, by the

Secretary of State.

(2) The Secretary of the War Office will act as Secretary of the Army Council, and will be charged with the interior economy of the War Office, and the preparation of all official communications of the Council, and with such other duties as the Secretary of State may, from time to time, assign to him.

(3) The Military Members of the Army Council shall have precedence amongst themselves according to their Army Seniority.

(4) This Order in Council shall be substituted for the Order in Council dated the 27th day of February, 1918.

And whereas by proviso (i) of sub-section (1) of Section three of the Act it is enacted that the power conferred upon the Insurance Commissioners of retaining and applying for the purposes of research the sums mentioned in sub-section (2) of Section sixteen of the National Insurance Act, 1911, shall not be transferred to the Minister of Health but that the duties heretofore performed by the Medical Research Committee shall after the date of the commencement of the Act be carried out by or under the direction of a Committee of the Privy Council appointed by His Majesty for that purpose:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of sub-section (1) of Section eleven of the Ministry of Health Act, 1919, and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Ministry of Health Act, 1919 (Date of Commencement)

Order, 1920.

2. For the purpose of the provisions in the Act specified in the Schedule hereto, the date of the commencement of the Act shall be the 1st day of April, 1920.

W HEREAS by Section 1 of the Anthrax Prevention Act, 1919, it is enacted (inter alia) that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, make provision for preventing the importation into the United Kingdom of goods infected or likely to be infected with anthrax, and that an Order so made may declare that goods of any specified class which are of any specified origin, or are exported from any specified country or place, are goods likely to be infected with anthrax, and that any such declaration shall be conclusive for all purposes:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty, and it is hereby declared, that shaving brushes manufactured in the Empire of Japan or exported therefrom are goods likely to be infected

with anthrax:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred on Him by the said Act and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Anthrax Prevention (Shaving Brushes) Order, 1920.

2. On and after the date of this Order the importation into the United Kingdom of shaving brushes manufactured in or exported from the Empire of Japan shall be prohibited.

3. This Order applies in the case of shaving brushes as aforesaid whether such shaving brushes are exported direct to the

United Kingdom or otherwise.

4. The provisions of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, and more particularly Sections 42, 177, 186, 202 and 207 of that Act (which relate to penalties by way of forfeiture and otherwise) shall apply as respects any shaving brushes of which the importation is prohibited under this Order as though such shaving brushes were goods whereof the importation is prohibited under Section 42 of that Act.

W HEREAS by Section 80 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, power is given to His Majesty, by Order in Council, to make Regulations as to the manner in which Government Ships may be registered as British Ships under the Merchant Shipping Acts:

And whereas by the said Section it is provided that those Acts shall, subject to any

exceptions or modifications which may be made by Order in Council, either generally or as respects any special class of such Ships, apply to such Ships when registered in accordance with such Regulations:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been

complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise, in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered:—

That the following Regulations shall have effect as regards any Government Ships in the service of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries hereinafter sometimes referred to as

the Ministry:—

1. An application for registry of a Government Ship in the service of the Ministry shall be made in writing under the hand of the Fisheries Secretary to the Ministry. Such application shall contain the following particulars:—

(1) A statement of the name and descrip-

tion of the Ship.

(2) A statement of the time when, and place where, the Ship was built; or, if the Ship was foreign built, and the time and place of building are unknown, a statement to that effect, and of her foreign name.

(3) A statement of the nature of the title to the said Ship, whether by original construction by or for the Ministry, or by purchase, capture, condemnation, or otherwise, and a list of the documents of title, if any, in case she was not originally constructed by or for the Ministry.

(4) A statement of the name of the

Master.

- 2. The Registrar, on receiving such application in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the Ministry shall:—
 - (1) enter the Ship in the Register Book as belonging to His Majesty, represented by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, and shall also enter therein:—

(2) the name of the port to which she

belongs:

(3) the particulars stated in the application for registration:

(4) the details comprised in the Surveyor's Certificate.

- 3. On the registry of a Government Ship in the service of the Ministry the Registrar shall retain in his possession the Surveyor's Certificate and the application for registry, and any documents of title mentioned in such application.
- 4. Upon the transfer of a registered Government Ship in the service of the Ministry by Bill of Sale the Ministry shall be the transferors, and the Bill of Sale shall be in Form A. in the proper form prescribed under the Principal Act, omitting the covenant therein contained. Any such Bill of Sale shall be signed by the Fisheries Secretary to the Ministry on behalf of the Ministry.

5. The application for a Certificate of Sale referred to in Sections 39 to 42 and Sections 44 to 46 of the Principal Act, may be made in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the Ministry by the Fisheries Secretary to the

Ministry on their behalf.

6. The person to whom the management of any Government Ship in the service of the Ministry is entrusted by the Ministry shall be registered as provided by Section 59 (2) of the Principal Act.

7. Government Ships in the service of the Ministry registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council are hereby excluded from the category of ships belonging to His Majesty within the meaning of Sections

557 to 564 of the Principal Act.

8. Where any Section of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order in Council, is applicable to Government Ships in the service of the Ministry imposes any duty or liability or confers any right or power upon or contemplates any act being performed by the owner of a Ship such duty, liability, right or power shall, subject always to the other provisions of this Order in Council, be carried out, borne, or exercised by the Ministry on behalf of His Majesty.

9. In this Order in Council the term Merchant Shipping Acts shall mean and include any of the Merchant Shipping Acts any provision of which is by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order, applicable

to Government Ships.

10. Section 1 and Sections 8 to 12 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, shall not apply to Government Ships in the service of the Ministry registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council. Provided always that no provision of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, according to a reasonable construction, would not apply in the case of Government Ships in the service of the Ministry shall be deemed to apply to such Ships by reason only that its application is not hereby expressly excluded.

- 1. An application for registry of a Government Ship in the service of the Board shall be made in writing under the hand of the Secretary to the Board. Such application shall contain the following particulars:—
 - (1) A statement of the name and description of the Ship.(2) A statement of the time when and

place where, the Ship was built; or, if the Ship was foreign built and the time and place of building are unknown, a statement to that effect, and of her foreign name.

- (3) A statement of the nature of the title to the said Ship, whether by original construction by or for the Board, or by purchase, capture, condemnation, or otherwise, and a list of the documents of title, if any, in case she was not originally constructed by or for the Board.
- (4) A statement of the name of the Master.
- 2. The Registrar, on receiving such application in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the Board shall:—
 - (1) enter the Ship in the Register Book as belonging to His Majesty, represented by the Fishery Board for Scotland, and shall also enter therein:—

(2) the name of the port to which she belongs:

(3) the particulars stated in the application for registration:

(4) the details comprised in the Surveyor's Certificate.

3. On the registry of a Government Ship in the service of the Board the Registrar shall retain in his possession the Surveyor's Certificate and the application for registry, and any documents of title mentioned in such application.

4. Upon the transfer of a registered Government Ship in the service of the Board by Bill of Sale the Board shall be the transferors, and the Bill of Sale shall be in Form A, in the proper form prescribed under the Principal Act, omitting the covenant therein contained. Any such Bill of Sale shall be signed by the Secretary to the Board on behalf of the Board.

5. The application for a Certificate of Sale referred to in Sections 39 to 42 and Sections 44 to 46 of the Principal Act, may be made in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the Board by the Secretary to the Board on their behalf.

6. The person to whom the management of any Government Ship in the service of the Board is entrusted by the Board shall be registered as provided by Section 59 (2) of the Principal Anti-

cipal Act.

7. Government Ships in the service of the Board registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council are hereby excluded from the category of ships belonging to His Majesty within the meaning of Sections 557 to 564 of the Principal Act.

8. Where any Section of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order in Council, is applicable to Government Ships in the service of the Board imposes any duty or liability or confers any right or power upon or contemplates any act being performed by the owner of a Ship such duty, liability, right or power shall, subject always to the other provisions of this Order in Council, be carried out, borne, or exercised by the Board on behalf of His Majesty.

9. In this Order in Council the term Merchant Shipping Acts shall mean and include any of the Merchant Shipping Acts any provision of which is by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order, applicable

to Government Ships.

10. Section 1 and Sections 8 to 12 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, shall not apply to Government Ships in the service of the

Board registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council. Provided always that no provision of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, according to a reasonable construction, would not apply in the case of Government Ships in the service of the Board shall be deemed to apply to such Ships by reason only that its application is not hereby expressly excluded.

WHEREAS by reason of conditions arising out of the war difficulties have been experienced by citizens of the United States of America in complying with the requirements of the Copyright Act, 1911, as to first publication within the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which the Act extends of their works first published in the United States of America during the war:

And whereas His Majesty is advised that the Government of the United States of America has undertaken, upon issue of this Order, to extend the protection afforded by the United States Law of December 18, 1919, entitled "An Act to amend Sections 8 and 21 of the Copyright Act, approved March 4, 1909," to

British subjects:

And whereas by reason of the said undertaking of the Government of the United States of America His Majesty is satisfied that the said Government has made, or has undertaken to make, such provision as it is expedient to require for the protection of works first made or published between the 1st August, 1914, and the termination of the war in the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which this Order applies, and entitled to copyright under Part I. of the Copyright Act, 1911:

And whereas by the Copyright Act, 1911, authority is conferred upon His Majesty to extend, by Order in Council, the protection of the said Act to certain classes of foreign works within any part of His Majesty's Dominions, other than self-governing Dominions, to which

the said Act extends:

And whereas by reason of these premises it is desirable to provide protection within the said Dominions for literary or artistic works first published in the United States of America between August 1, 1914, and the termination of the war which have failed to accomplish the formalities prescribed by the Copyright Act, 1911, by reason of conditions arising out of the war:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The Copyright Act, 1911, shall, subject to the provisions of the said Act and of this Order, apply to works first published in the United States of America between the 1st August, 1914, and the termination of the war, which have not been republished prior to the

commencement of this Order in the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which this Order applies, in like manner as if they had been first published within the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which the said Act extends:

Provided that the enjoyment by any work of the rights conferred by the Copyright Act, 1911, shall be conditional upon publication of the work in the Dominions to which this Order relates not later than six months after the termination of the war, and shall commence from and after such publication, which shall not be colourable only, but shall be intended to satisfy the reasonable requirements of the public.

2. The provisions of Section 15 of the Copyright Act, 1911, as to the delivery of books to libraries, shall apply to works to which this Order relates upon their publication in the-

United Kingdom.

3. In the case of musical works to which this Order relates and provided that no contrivances by means of which the work may be mechanically performed have before the commencement of this Order been lawfully made, or placed on sale, within the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which this Order applies, copyright in the work shall include all rights conferred by the said Act with respect to the making of records, perforated rolls and other contrivances by means of which the work may be mechanically performed.

4. This Order shall apply to all His Majesty's Dominions, Colonies and Possessions with the exception of those hereinafter named,

that is to say:—

The Dominion of Canada;

The Commonwealth of Australia;
The Dominion of New Zealand;

The Union of South Africa;

Newfoundland.

5. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as depriving any work of any rights which have been lawfully acquired under the provisions of the Copyright Act, 1911, or any Order in Council thereunder.

6. This Order shall take effect as from the 2nd day of February, 1920, which day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of this

Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders accordingly.

W HEREAS by an Act passed in the 4th year of the reign of His Majesty King William IV. entitled "An Act for the better Administration of Justice in His Majesty's Privy Council" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time to make any such Rules and Orders as may be thought fit for regulating the mode, form and time of Appeal to be made from the decisions of any Courts of Judicature in India (from the decisions of which an Appeal lies to His Majesty in Council), and in like manner from time to time to make such other Regulations for the preventing delays in the making or hearing such

Appeals and as to the expenses attending the said Appeals and as to the amount or value of property in respect of which any such Appeal

may be made:

And whereas Her Majesty Queen Victoria did by Her Order in Council of the 10th day of April, 1838, approve certain Rules and Orders for regulating the mode, form and time of Appeal from the decisions of the said Courts and also certain Regulations for the preventing delays in the making or hearing such Appeals and as to the expenses attending such Appeals and as to the amount or value of property in respect of which any such Appeal may be made:

And whereas the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council hath deemed it expedient to rescind all the said Rules, Orders and Regulations and to substitute others in lieu thereof:

His Majesty is, therefore, pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to rescind all the said Rules, Orders and Regulations in the said Order in Council of the 10th day of April, 1838, contained, and to approve of the several Rules, Orders and Regulations contained in the Schedule hereto, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the same be respectively observed by all Courts of Judicature in India and by all persons whom it shall or may concern.

Whereof the Governor-General of India in Council, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern them-

selves accordingly.

The SCHEDULE above referred to.

1. Applications to the Court for leave to appeal to His Majesty in Council shall be made within 90 days of the Decree or Order to be appealed from, subject to the provisions of Sections 4, 5 and 12 of the Indian Limitation Act, 1908.

2. The preparation of the Record shall be

2. The preparation of the Record shall be subject to the supervision of the Court, and the parties may submit any disputed question arising in connection therewith to the decision of the Court, and the Court shall give such directions thereon as the justice of the case may

require.

3. The Registrar, as well as the parties and their legal Agents, shall endeavour to exclude from the Record all documents (more particularly such as are merely formal) that are not relevant to the subject-matter of the Appeal, and, generally, to reduce the bulk of the Record as far as practicable, taking special care to avoid the duplication of documents and the unnecessary repetition of headings and other merely formal parts of documents; but the documents omitted to be copied or printed shall be enumerated in a manuscript list to be transmitted with the Record,

4. Where in the course of the preparation of a Record one party objects to the inclusion of a document on the ground that it is unnecessary or irrelevant, and the other party nevertheless insists upon its being included, and the Court allows the document to be included, the Record, as printed (whether in India or in England), shall, with a view to the subsequent adjustment of the costs of and incidental to such document, indicate in the index of papers, or otherwise, the fact that, and the party by whom, the inclusion of

the document was objected to.
5. Where the Record is printed in India, the

Registrar shall, at the expense of the Appellant, transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council 40 copies of such Record, one of which copies he shall certify to be correct by signing his name on, or initialling, every eighth page thereof and by affixing thereto the seal, if any, of the Court.

6. Where the Record is to be printed in England, the Registrar shall, at the expense of the Appellant, transmit to the Registrar of the Privy Council one certified copy of such Record, together with an index of all the papers and exhibits in the case. No other certified copies of the Record shall be transmitted to the Agents in England by or on behalf of the parties to the Appeal.

7. Where there are two or more Appeals

arising out of the same matter, and the Court is of opinion that it would be for the convenience of the Lords of the Judicial Committee and all parties concerned that the Appeals should be consolidated, the Court may direct

the Appeals to be consolidated.

8. An Appellant who has obtained a certificate for the admission of an Appeal may at any time prior to the making of an Order admitting the Appeal withdraw the Appeal on such terms as to costs and otherwise as the

Court may direct.

9. Where an Appellant, having obtained a certificate for the admission of an Appeal, fails to furnish the security or make the deposit required (or apply with due diligence to the Court for an Order admitting the Appeal), the Court may, on its own motion or on an application in that behalf made by the Respondent, cancel the certificate for the admission of the Appeal, and may give such directions as to the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appellant as the Court shall think fit, or make such further or other Order in the premises as, in the opinion of the Court, the justice of the case requires.

10. An Appellant whose Appeal has been admitted shall prosecute his Appeal in accordance with the Rules for the time being regulating the general practice and procedure in

Appeals to His Majesty in Council.

- 11. Where an Appellant, whose Appeal has been admitted, desires, prior to the dispatch of the Record to England, to withdraw his Appeal, the Court may, upon an application in that behalf made by the Appellant, grant him a certificate to the effect that the Appeal has been withdrawn, and the Appeal shall thereupon be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed without express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appellant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.
- 12. Where an Appellant, whose Appeal has been admitted, fails to show due diligence in taking all necessary steps in connection with the preparation of the Record, the Court may, either on its own motion or on the application of the Respondent, call upon the Appellant to show cause why a certificate should not be issued that the Appeal has not been effectually prosecuted by the Appellant, and if the Court sees fit to issue such a certificate, the Appeal shall be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed for non-prosecution with out express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appealant shall be dealt

with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.

13. Where at any time between the admission of an Appeal and the dispatch of the Record to England the Record becomes defective by reason of the death, or change of status, of a party to the Appeal, the Court may, notwithstanding the admission of the Appeal, on an application in that behalf made by any person interested, grant a certificate showing who, in the opinion of the Court, is the proper person to be substituted, or entered, on the Record, in place of, or in addition to, the party who has died, or undergone a change of status, and the name of such person shall thereupon be deemed to be so substituted or entered on the Record as aforesaid without express Order of His Majesty in Council. If, in the opinion of the Court, there has been undue delay in making this application, the Court may order the Appellant, or the party interested, to take all necessary steps to perfect the Record within such time as the Court may direct, and, if he fails to comply with such Order, the Court may call upon him to show cause why a certificate should not be issued that the Appeal has not been effectually prosecuted, and if the Court sees fit to issue such a certificate, the Appeal shall be deemed, as from the date of such certificate, to stand dismissed for non-prosecution without express Order of His Majesty in Council, and the costs of the Appeal and the security entered into by the Appellant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.

14. Where the Record subsequently to its dispatch to England becomes defective by reason of the death, or change of status, of a party to the appeal, the Court may, upon an application in that behalf made by any person interested, cause a certificate to be transmitted to the Registrar of the Privy Council showing who, in the opinion of the Court, is the proper person to be substituted, or entered, on the Record, in place of, or in addition to, the party who has died, or undergone a change of status. If, in the opinion of the Court, there has been undue delay in making this application, the Court may order the Appellant, or the party interested, to take all necessary steps to perfect the Record within such time as the Court may direct, and, if he fails to comply with such Order, the Court shall report the matter to the Registrar of the Privy Council.

15. These Rules shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1921, or on such other date as the Governor-General of India in

"Whereas under and by virtue of the several Indentures, particulars whereof are set forth in the Schedule hereunder written, the lands, tenements, tithe rentcharges and hereditaments, situate in the Parish of Ripon aforesaid, and particularly described in the same Indentures and Schedule, became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us:

"And whereas none of the said lands, tenements, tithe rentcharges and hereditaments are subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed:

"And whereas with a view to the advangeous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our Common Fund it is expedient that the said lands, tenements, tithe rentcharges and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands, tenements, tithe rentcharges and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, tithe rentcharges and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, under and by virtue of the said several Indentures or any of them with their appurtenances and all our estate, right, title and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to pur-chase the same and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England. .

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

A Statute to amend certain Statutes made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 & Vict., c. 48), and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College in the University of Oxford (as amended by a Statute made by the Provost and Fellows of the said College on the 18th day of April, 1884, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 27th day of January, 1885, and as further amended by a Statute made by the Provost and Fellows of the said College on the 25th day of April, 1917, and approved by the King in Council on the 16th day of January, 1918), duly made at a General Meeting of the said Provost and Fellows, specially summoned for the purpose, held on the 12th day of November, 1919, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting and submitted to His Majesty the King in Council.

Whereas by Statute III, 17, as made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College in the University of Oxford (as amended by a Statute made by the Provost and Fellows of the said College on the 18th day of April, 1884, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 27th day of January, 1885, and as further amended by a Statute made by the Provost and Fellows of the said College on the 25th day of April, 1917, and approved by the King in Council on the 16th day of January, 1918), it was enacted as follows:—

"17. Each Ordinary Fellow shall be entitled to receive out of the Corporate Revenues such share of the divisible income of the year as is hereinafter provided, such share to be inclusive of all allowances save as hereinafter mentioned."

And whereas by a Statute made by the said Provost and Fellows on the 18th day of April, 1884, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 27th day of January, 1885 (as amended by

a Statute made by the said Provost and Fellows CENTRAL CHANCERY OF THE ORDERS on the 25th day of April, 1917, and approved by the King in Council on the 16th day of January, 1918), the following clause, numbered I (the existing clauses being numbered 2 and so on) was added to Statute XI as made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the aforesaid Act and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882:

"I. The Provost and Fellows shall in, or as soon as may be after the close of each year, declare so much of the clear surplus income of the College as they shall think fit to be the divisible income for that year: and the same shall be apportioned among the Fellows for that year (including any Fellowship which may be suspended or vacant) in equal shares, provided that no Fellow shall receive more in respect of such share for any one year than the sum of £200, unless the average amount received by him in each of the preceding years, not exceeding six, in which he has held his Fellowship, has been less than £200, in which case he may receive in respect of such share any sum not greater than the amount which would, with the amounts previously received by him, bring his average receipts for that year and for each of such preceding years up to £200. Before declaring the divisible income the Provost and Fellows shall make repayment to the Provost, to any Fellow elected or admitted under Statute III and to any officer of the College appointed under Statute V of such portion of the Income Tax paid by him in respect of his emoluments received from the Corporate Revenues of the College, as Provost Fellow or Officer as would have been payable by him if such emoluments had constituted his sole income and as if he were assessed on such income as unearned income and without abatement."

And whereas the Provost and Fellows of the said College are of opinion that it is desirable to amend the said Statute in manner herein-We the said Provost and after appearing. Fellows of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given to them by the fifty-fourth section of the said Act alter Statute III, 17, by substituting for the existing clause the following clause: -

"17. Each Ordinary Fellow shall be entitled to receive the annual stipend of £200 out of the Corporate Revenues, clear of Income Tax as hereinafter provided, but inclusive of all allowances save as hereinafter mentioned ";

and Statute XI, I, by substituting for the existing numbered clause the following clause: -

"The Provost and Fellows shall make repayment each year to the Provost, to any Fellow elected or admitted under Statute III, and to any Officer of the College appointed under Statute V, of such portion of the income tax paid by him in respect of the emoluments received from the Corporate Revenues of the College as Provost, Fellow or Officer, as would have been payable by him if such emoluments had constituted his sole income and as if he were assessed on such income as earned income and without abatement.'

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Jute Trade in Great Britain, as specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time-Rates for Male and Female Workers, as shown in the Schedule set out below.

Workers of 21 years of age and over, 50s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 18 and under 21 years of age,

45s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 16 and under 18 years of age, 28s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers under 16 years of age, 22s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION II.—Female Workers.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 32s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers of 16 and under 18 years of age, 28s. per week of 48 hours.

Workers under 16 years of age, 22s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION III.

The above General Minimum Time-Rates are weekly rates, based on a week of 48 hours, but they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction or increase, according as the num. ber of hours spent by the worker in the factory or workshop under contract of employment in any week is less or more than 48.

PART II.

The respective General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male and Female Workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, that is to say:

The preparing, spinning or weaving (a) of jute or (b) of jute and any other fibre except

flax or hemp, Including:

(1) The preparing and spinning of waste

reclaimed at any stage, and
(2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above mentioned work, But excluding:

(1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing or

finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials, and

- or spinning preparing (2) The materials required for the making or remaking of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles, when such preparing or spinning is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or remaking, and
- (3) The making or repair of sacks or bags, and also
- (4) The weaving of carpets, rugs or mats.

PART III.

SECTION 1.

The General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.

The above General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposals to Fix which may be lodged with them within two months from 7th February, 1920.

Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Jute Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

- (i) The general minimum Time-Rates for learners under 14 years of age shall be 9s. per week of 48 hours, or 2½d. per hour, and from the age of 14 years they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in Column 1 above as if they had commenced at 14.
- (ii) The weekly rates set out above are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a pro-
- portionate deduction according as the number of hours actually spent by the learner in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.
- (iii) The advances to be given to learners commencing at under 21 years of age shall become due as from the first Monday in January. and July of each year, the learner being entitled to her first advance from the first

Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.

(iv) A learner shall cease to be a learner and be entitled to the full general minimum Time-Rate applicable to her under Section I (a) of Part I of this Schedule, upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:-

Age of Entering upon Employment and Conditions.

Under 15 years of age, the completion of not less than 3 years' employment, and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

15 and under 16 years of age, the completion of not less than 2 years' employment, and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

16 and under 21 years of age, the comple-

tion of 2 years' employment.

21 years of age and over, the completion of 1 year's employment.

(v) No female learner shall be held to be entitled to the full general minimum time-rate under Sub-section (a) of this Section until she has attained the age of 18 years, notwithstanding any employment she may have had. vided that in determining the age of entry and the length of employment, all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

SECTION II .- Male Workers.

Workers of 22 years of age and upwards, 4s. 2d. per hour.

Workers of 21 and under 22 years of age,

1s. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age,

9d. per hour. Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 74d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age,

6d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and and under 17 years of age,

.5d. per hour,

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 4d. per hour.

Workers of under 15 years of age, 3d. per

hour.

Workers commencing employment in the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade for the first time at and over the age of 19 may serve a period of 6 months at 7d. per hour, and thereafter a period of six months at 84d. per hour.

On the expiration of one year's service in the trade, these workers shall receive such rates as their age may entitle them to under the foregoing provisions.

PART II.

Proposed Piece-work Basis Time Rates. SECTION I .- Female Workers.

(A) All female workers other than Homeworkers, 9½d. per hour.

(B) Homeworkers, $9\frac{1}{2}d$. per hour.

In the case of all female workers employed on piece work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 91d. per hour to an ordinary worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers other than learners.

Section II.—Male Workers.

All male workers, 1s. 3½d. per hour.

In the case of all male workers employed on piece-work; each piece-rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case not less than 1s. 3½d. per hour to an ordinary worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of workers of 22 years of age and upwards.

PART III.

Proposed Overtime Rates—Male and Female Workers—All Ages.

Section I.—In accordance with Section 3 1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:-

In any week On any day (other than Saturday) ... On Saturday ...

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether engaged on time-work or on piecework, in excess of the declared normal number of hours, shall be as follows, that is to say:-

1. For the first two hours' overtime on any day except Saturdays, Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rates shall be equivalent to time and a quarter, that is to say, one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

2. For overtime after the first two hours of overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to time and a half, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

3. For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to double time, that is to say, twice the minimum rate

otherwise applicable.

4. For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be time and a quarter except in so far as higher overtime rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs The Overtime Rate 2 and 3 of this Section. shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceeds 9 or, in the case of Saturday, exceeds 5, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48. Provided-

(a) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on 5 days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 91.

(b) That where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

(c) That where a worker who is of the Jewish religion and subject to the provisions

of Section 48 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, is employed on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as proposed above shall apply to such worker in like manner as if in the provisions of this Notice as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

But in the application of these Provisos, where the employer requires attendance on any day on which it is not the established practice of the employer to require attendance, all time worked on such day (not being a Sunday or a Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) shall be paid for at time and a quarter for the first two hours and time and a half thereafter.

Note.—The hours of work which female workers and young persons are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901.

PART IV.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

Section I.—A female learner is a worker who—

- (a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning, and
- (b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, and held subject to compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

Section II. — The expression "Homeworker" shall be held to mean a worker who works in her own home or any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

The above respective minimum rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in England and Wales who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 24th November, 1919, that is to say:—

Those branches of the Women's Clothing Trade that are engaged in the making of Non-Tailored Garments, namely, the making from textile or knitted fabrics of (a) non-tailored wearing apparel (other than handkerchiefs) worn by women or girls or by children without distinction of sex, or (b) boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls or by children, without distinction of sex;

including: -

- 1. All operations and processes of cutting, making or finishing by hand or machine of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-robes, jumpers, sports-coats, neckwear, tea-gowns, dressing-gowns, dressing jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, underskirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby-linen or similar non-tailored articles;
- 2. The making of field bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps or infants' millinery where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph 1 above;
- 3. (a) The altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of any of the above-mentioned articles;
- (b) The cleaning of any of the above-mentioned articles, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of such garments;
- 4. All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of such articles other than hand embroidery or hand-drawn thread work on articles made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen and cotton;
- 5. The following processes if done by machine:—thread drawing, thread clipping, top sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;
- 6. Laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, packing, warehousing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making, altering, repairing, renovating or remaking of any of the above-mentioned articles;

but excluding:—

- (a) The making of knitted articles; the making of underclothing, socks and stockings, from knitted fabrics; and the making from knitted fabrics of articles mentioned in paragraphs 1 and 2 above, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabrics;
- (b) The making of gloves, spats, gaiters, boots, shoes and slippers;
- (c) The making of headgear, other than the articles mentioned in paragraph 2 above;
- (d) The branches of trade covered by the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919;
- (e) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments;
- (f) The making of women's collars and cuffs and of nurses' stiff washing belts where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of men's or boys' shirts or collars;
- (g) Warehousing, packing and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises.

PART VI.

Section I.—The above General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work basis Time-Rates and Overtime-Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannua-

tion or other Provident Fund.
SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of

the minimum rates.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposals to fix which may be lodged with them within two months from the 7th February, 1920. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making. the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade Board (England and Wales), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should

state precisely, and so far as possible with

reasons, what is objected to.

- (c) To erect on the pleasure ground and to provide and maintain music and other pavilions, concert halls, reading-rooms, baths, shelters, lavatories or other buildings and conveniences.
- (d) To let any pavilion or other building in the pleasure ground to any person or company for the purpose of entertainments, and to authorise that person or company to charge for admission thereto.
- (e) To provide and maintain refreshment rooms in the pleasure ground, and either manage them themselves, or, if they think fit, to let them to any person or company for any term not exceeding three years.
- (f) To provide in the pleasure ground bowling greens, tennis courts, croquet grounds, miniature rifle ranges and spaces for other games and recreations.

- (g) To provide in the pleasure ground any apparatus for games and recreations and charge for the use thereof, and to let the right, if they think fit, to any person or company of providing and charging for the use of any apparatus for games and recreations for any term not exceeding three years.
- (h) To provide or contribute towards the expenses of any band of music, or any musical, dramatic or other entertainment in the pleasure ground, or in the pavilions or other buildings hereinbefore referred to.
- (i) To provide covered and other seats and chairs in the pleasure ground and the buildings thereon, and to charge for the use of the said chairs or any of them.
- (j) To enable the Corporation at all times to make charges for admission to the pleasure ground and buildings, and the entertainments and amusements to be provided thereat, and for refreshments and for the use of the spaces to be provided for games and recreation.
- (k) To make and enforce byelaws for the regulation of the pleasure ground, and by such byelaws to provide for the removal from the pleasure ground of any person infringing any such byelaw by any officer of the Urban Authority or Constable.
- (2) To enable the Corporation to borrow money for such purposes under the provisions of the said Local Act.
- (3) To alter the provisions of the said Local Act with reference to the height of rooms intended to be used for human habitation in new buildings.
- (4) For the several purposes of this application, or for purposes connected with, incidental to or consequent on those purposes, to make any such alteration or amendment of the said Local Act or of any other Local Act or of any Act confirming a Provisional Order made in pursuance of any of the Sanitary Acts, or of the Public Health Act, 1875, and in force in the said borough, as may be necessary or desirable.

And whereas it is proposed that a Provisional Order should be issued in compliance with the said Application, and that it should with regard to the subject-matter of paragraph (3) above repeal the provisions of the said Local Act with a view to byelaws being made on the subject under section 23 of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890;

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 4TH FEBRUARY 1920.)

NORTHUMBERLAND (FOOT - AND -MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1920 (No. 2).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Modification of Order.

1.—The Northumberland (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," is modified in the manner hereinafter contained.

Continued Prohibition of Movement in Certain Prohibited Area.

- 2.—(1) The provisions of the principal Order shall apply without modification to the area described in the First Schedule hereto, hereinafter referred to as the Prohibited Area.
- (2) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Prohibited Area, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Prohibited Area.

Provisions as to Movement for Slaughter into the Parts of the Scheduled District not Included in the Prohibited Area.

- 3.—(1) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway or by vessel without a licence from premises not situate within any district which is for the time being a scheduled district for the purposes of an Order of the Minister relating to foot-and-mouth disease to a railway station or landing place in the Scheduled District which is not situate in the Prohibited Area, and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing place to any slaughter-house in the Scheduled District which is not situate in the Prohibited Area if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing place is situate.
- (2) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises not situate within any district which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Minister relating to foot-and-mouth disease to any slaughterhouse in the Scheduled District which is not situate in the Prohibited Area if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate.

Movement Within the Scheduled District Excluding the Prohibited Area.

4.—Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient that an animal in his district should be permitted to be moved from premises in the Scheduled District not situate in the Pro-

hibited Area to any other premises in the Scheduled District not situate in the Prohibited Area, he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

5.—(1) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement to a slaughterhouse from premises other than a railway station or landing place an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:—

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow

on the forehead of each of the sheep;
and also by the painting or stamping of the
letter M, about six inches long, on both
sides of each of the sheep with the following
composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil
of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red
ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or
with some other adhesive composition of a
blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

- (2) A Movement Licence under this Order shall not be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road in a Prohibited Area.
- (3) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be inforce until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority, or of the Ministry by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.
- (4) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.
- (5) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.
- (6) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect.
- (7) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member

of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee

of a Local Authority.

(8) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

Movement through the Prohibited Area by Rail.

6. Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Prohibited Area where they are moved through the Prohibited Area by railway from a place outside such Area to another place outside such Area without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such Area except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

General Provisions as to Movement.

7. Animals while being moved under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

8. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising-

(i) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii) movement into or out of a foot-and-

mouth disease infected place; or
(iii) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Ministry given under any Order of the Minister.

Saving for Orders and Regulations.

9. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Minister, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Minister for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

Production of Licences; names and Addresses.

10.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Ministry or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whorn it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and addresto the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or

other officer.

No 91773

Holding of Markets and Sales in the Scheduled District (except in the Prohibited Area).

11.—(1) A market or sale of animals may be held on any premises in the Scheduled District, except in the Prohibited Area, if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Article.

(2) The Local Authority shall cause a Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Article and examine the animals exposed thereat.

(3) An animal exposed at a market or sale authorised under this Article shall not be moved therefrom unless before such movement it is marked, by and at the expense of the owner, in the manner described in Article 5 of this Order.

Offences.

12.—(1) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

13. In this Order—
"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases

of Animals Act, 1894.
"The Ministry" means the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

'Animals'' means cattle, sheep, goats

and swine.

"Slaughterhouse" means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

14. This Order shall come into operation on the seventh day of February, nineteen hundred and twenty.

Short Title.

15. This Order may be cited as the North-umberland (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order or 1920 (No. 2), and shall be read with the principal Order.
