Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Salisbury.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the 3rd day of October, 1895, and made under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, it was (amongst other things) ordered that burials in the Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield), in the County of York, should be discontinued as follows, viz.:—

Forthwith and entirely in the Wesleyan Chapel, Grimesthorpe, in the Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield), in the said County of York; and also in the Chapelyard, except as follows:—

(a) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the Chapelyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented;

(b) In such partly walled graves and earthen graves as are now existing in the Chapelyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the said Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it is, amongst other things, provided that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to vary any Order in Council made under (amongst others) the Burial Act, 1853, as to

His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the said Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield), ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, so much of the said Order in Council of the 3rd day of October, 1895, as relates to burials in the Wesleyan Chapel and Chapelyard, Grimesthorpe, in the Parish of Brightside Bierlow (Sheffield) aforesaid, should be varied so as to provide that burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the said Chapelyard in the said Parish:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 1st day of September next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 1st day of September.
