WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called "the Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm; which regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient that the regulation hereinafter mentioned should, on and after the first day of September, nineteen hundred and twenty, cease to have effect:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Regulation 37s shall, as from the said first day of September, be revoked.

W HEREAS by the New Ministries and Secretaries Act, 1916, provision is made, amongst other things, for the transfer to the Minister of Labour of such powers and duties of any Government Department relating to labour and industry, whether conferred by statute or otherwise, as His Majesty may by Order in Council transfer to him:
