## TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice, that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 11th January, 1924, at 1 o'clock, for:—

(a) Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £4 per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 15th April, 1933.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £35,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £3,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

### TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 14th January, 1924, to Saturday, the 19th January, 1924, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

### £4 PER CENT. TREASURY BONDS, 1933.

6. The Bonds will be in denominations of £50, £100, £200, £500, £1,000 and £5,000. They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax, and will, as indicated in the Notice of 5th October, 1923, rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 23rd March, 1923. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 14th January, 1924, to Saturday, the 19th January, 1924, inclusive; the first dividend payable on the 15th April, 1924, will represent in the case of each Bond interest to that date from the date of the Bond.

7. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bonds required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even

multiple of One shilling) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

11. Tenders must be made on the printed forms, which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

12. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

DRESSERS.—A Dresser of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Dressing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Dresser of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Dresser and who turns, screws, inside and out, files flat and square at the vice, and finishes his own work throughout.

A Dresser of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is also an expert in all processes or is a Charge Hand responsible for all work and order in the shop.

STAMPERS.—A Stamper of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on stamping and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Stamper of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Stamper and is an expert in all processes, and who undertakes all classes of work of all strengths of metal used.

A Stamper of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is an expert in all classes of stamping, Pressing and Cutting-out by hand or who is a Charge Hand responsible for all work and order in the shop.

POLISHERS.—A Polisher of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Polishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Polisher of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Polisher and is an expert in all processes of any class of common work and can emery-bob and mop best work.

A Polisher of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is also an expert in all processes of both common and best work or is a Charge Hand responsible for all work and order in the shop.

PLANISHERS OR WHEELERS.—A Planisher or Wheeler of Grade I is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Planishing or Wheeling and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II or Grade III next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Planisher or Wheeler of Grade II is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Planisher or Wheeler and is an expert in all processes and is able to do good class work.

A Planisher or Wheeler of Grade III is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II as above defined, is employed in making Mitred Breast Plates or Handled Plates of any design.

- For all time worked on Sundays, twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE-TIME.
- For all other Overtime worked, one-and-a-fifth times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-FIFTH.

## SECTION III.—Overtime Rates for Piece-Workers.

The Overtime Rates for Piece-Workers in respect of time worked in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade are as follows:—

- For all time worked on Sundays, piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed, the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition in either case of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.
- For all time worked on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition in either case of one-half of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.
- For all other Overtime worked, piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition in either case of one-fifth of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.

## SECTION IV.

The Overtime Rates are payable in respect of all time worked in excess of 5 hours on a Saturday and in respect of all time worked in excess of 9 hours on any other day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

## PART IV.

## “ COST OF LIVING ” CLAUSES.

## SECTION I.

Each “ Cost of Living ” period referred to in Columns I to VI of Part I and in Columns I and II of Part II of this Schedule is a period from the first day of the month following the publication in the “ Ministry of Labour Gazette ” of a Cost of Living figure (as defined in Section II below), within the range of percentages specified in the appropriate column until the first day of the month following the publication of a figure within the range specified in another column.

Provided that in cases where the first day of the month does not coincide with the beginning of the weekly pay period, the “ Cost of Living ” period shall begin or end as the case may be at the beginning of the next following weekly pay period.

## SECTION II.

The Cost of Living figure specified in this Schedule is:—The average percentage increase since July, 1914, in retail prices (all items) in the United Kingdom, as published each month in the “ Ministry of Labour Gazette.”

## SECTION III.

The minimum rates set out in this Schedule are operative only during the several periods specified, or until such time as the cancellation or variation thereof may become effective.

PART IV—*continued.*

## SECTION IV.

The Minimum Rates payable on the date specified by the Minister of Labour as the date for which the Minimum Rates shall become effective, viz., 1st January, 1924, are the rates set out in Column III of Part I and Column I of Part II and Overtime Rates as specified in Part III of this Schedule.

## PART V.

## Applicability of Rates.

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in Parts I, II and III of this Schedule apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in the Coffin Furniture Section of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

## Description of Trade to which Trade Boards Acts apply.

- (a) The manufacture, wherever carried on, of Coffin Furniture from any metal by any process.
- (b) The manufacture of Cerements, including shrouds, face curtains, face cloths, side-cloths, winding sheets, pillow covers, coffin pads, sleeves or frilling.

*Including—*

- (c) The operations of folding, packing, warehousing, despatching or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

## PART VI.

## SECTION I.—Rates to be paid clear of deductions.

The General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates set out in Parts I, II and III of this Schedule must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

## SECTION II.—Rates without prejudice to workers earning higher rates.

The above General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

## SECTION IX.—Definitions.

For the purpose of the minimum rates set out in this Schedule :

- (a) HEAVY HAND PRESS WORKERS are workers employed on Hand Press work on any blank the largest diameter of which is 7 inches or over and the thickness of the material of which is  $\frac{1}{10}$ ths of an inch or over.
- (b) LIGHT HAND PRESS WORKERS are workers employed on any Hand Press work other than that included under paragraph (a) above.

## PART II.

## PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

*Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade.*

## SECTION I.—Piece-work Basis Time-Rates.

The Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Female Piece-Workers of 18 years of age and over in the Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade shall be 15 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Sections I., II., III. and IV. of Part I. of this Schedule.

*Cerement-Making Section of the Trade.*

The Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Female Piece-Workers of 18 years of age and over in the Cerement-Making Section of the Trade shall be 1d. per hour higher than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Sections VI., VII. and VIII. of Part I. of this Schedule.

## SECTION II.—Applicability of Minimum Rates to Piece-Workers.

In cases where a worker is employed on Piece-Work each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ORDINARY worker not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate or, in the case of female workers under 18 years of age, not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate.

## PART III.

## OVERTIME RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

## SECTION I.—Normal Number of Hours of Work.

In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows :—

In any week (exclusive of Sunday and any Customary Public or Statutory Holidays) ... ..	47
On any day other than Saturday ... ..	9
On Saturday ... ..	5

Provided that ALL time worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

## SECTION II.—Overtime Rates for Time-Workers.

The Overtime Rates for Time-Workers in respect of time worked in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade are as follows:—

- (a) For all time worked on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, one-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF, and
- (b) For all time worked on Sundays, twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE-TIME.
- (c) For all other Overtime worked, one-and-a-fifth times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-FIFTH.

## SECTION III.—Overtime Rates for Piece-Workers.

The Overtime Rates for Piece-Workers in respect of time worked in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade are as follows:—

- (a) For all time worked on Sundays, Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition in either case of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.
- (b) For all time worked on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed, the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition in either case of one-half of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.
- (c) For all other overtime worked, Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed, the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition in either case of one-fifth of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.

## SECTION IV.

The Overtime Rates are payable in respect of all time worked in excess of 5 hours on a Saturday and in respect of all time worked in excess of 9 hours on any other day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

## PART IV.

## Applicability of Rates.

The respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in Parts I, II, and III of this Schedule apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all female workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

## Description of Trade to which Trade Boards Acts apply.

- (a) The manufacture, wherever carried on, of Coffin Furniture from any metal by any process.
- (b) The manufacture of Cerements, including shrouds, face curtains, face cloths, side-cloths, winding sheets, pillow covers, coffin pads, sleeves or frilling.

*Including—*

- (c) The operations of folding, packing, warehousing, despatching or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

## PART V.

## SECTION I.—Rates to be paid clear of deductions.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

## SECTION II.—Rates without prejudice to workers earning higher rates.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

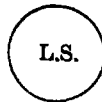

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1922, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

*Revocation of Previous Orders.*

1. The Orders described in the Second Schedule to this Order are hereby revoked.

*Meaning of Terms.*

2. In this Order:—

“ An Infected Area ” means an Area described in the First Schedule hereto.

If any farm (excluding any detached part) is partly within and partly outside an Infected Area, the whole shall be deemed to be within that Area.

“ Animals ” means cattle, sheep, goats and pigs;

“ Slaughterhouse ” means premises used habitually and solely for the purpose of slaughtering animals, but does not include a slaughterhouse which forms part of a farm.

*Restrictions in Force in the Infected Areas.*

3.—(a) No animal shall be moved out of an Infected Area except to a slaughterhouse in another Infected Area as provided in Article 4 of this Order.

(b) No animal shall be moved without a licence under Article 4 of this Order:—

(i) into an Infected Area; or

(ii) along or across any road or other highway or by water within an Infected Area.

(c) No animal shall be permitted by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon any road or other highway in an Infected Area.

(d) No market, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in an Infected Area; except a market or sale of fat animals intended for immediate slaughter or a sale of animals on farm premises. A licence must be obtained from the Local Authority to hold any such market or sale, and a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend and examine the animals exposed thereat. No licence shall be granted for the holding of any such market or sale on any premises within a radius of five miles from any place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

(e) No slaughterhouse manure or refuse shall be moved out of an Infected Area or be brought into contact with animals in any such Area.

(f) The landing of animals at the approved Landing Places at the Ports of Fleetwood, Heysham, Silloth, Preston and Manchester is

hereby prohibited, except for animals intended for slaughter. Such animals shall be moved from the Landing Place only to a slaughterhouse in an Infected Area.

*Movement of Animals by Licence Into or Within the Infected Areas.*

4. Licences may be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority for the following movement of animals only:—

(a) From premises outside any Infected Area to a slaughterhouse in an Infected Area.

(b) From premises outside any Infected Area to a farm in an Infected Area.

(c) From a farm in an Infected Area to a licensed fat stock market or fat stock sale in the same Area.

(d) From a licensed fat stock market or sale in an Infected Area or from a farm or other premises in an Infected Area to a slaughterhouse in the same Infected Area or in another Infected Area.

(e) From one farm to another in the same Infected Area or between different parts of the same farm in such Area, if the Inspector considers the movement to be necessary or expedient. (These licences may be made available for movement as often as required if the Inspector endorses the licence “ Occupation Licence.”)

Provided that no licence shall be granted under this Article for (i) the movement of any animal to or from any place or along any road within a radius of two miles from any place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease, or (ii) the movement of animals from any premises to any farm for the purpose of sale at a licensed farm sale.

*Time Limit for Slaughter of Animals.*

5. Where any animals are moved with a licence under this Order to a slaughterhouse in an Infected Area they shall be slaughtered within 96 hours of the time of arrival at the slaughterhouse, provided that the Local Authority of the district in which the slaughterhouse is situate may, if they think fit, require any such animals to be slaughtered within a less period than 96 hours from the time of their arrival at the slaughterhouse.

*Condition of Licences.*

6.—(a) Licences may be granted only by an Inspector of the Local Authority in whose district the movement commences, except in the case of movement from premises outside an Infected Area, to premises in such Area in which case the licence shall be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the district in which the place of destination is situate. In the case of movement from one Infected Area to another the licence shall not be available for the movement of the animals, unless and until it is countersigned by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the district from which the animals are to be moved.

(b) Where any animals are moved with a licence under this Order the Inspector granting or countersigning the licence may if he thinks it desirable specify therein the route by which the animals are to be moved, and may require the animals to be moved by float or other suitable vehicle.



(c) Licences shall not permit movement on any road within a radius of two miles of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place, or movement on any road outside the Infected Areas in order to reach a destination in any such Area.

(d) Occupation Licences may be withdrawn at any time by a notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority on the person to whom such Licence was granted.

(e) Licences, other than Occupation Licences, must be delivered up at or sent by post to the nearest Police Station or to an Officer of the Local Authority immediately after completion of the movement.

(f) Licences, other than Occupation Licences, shall only be available for four days, including the day of issue, and shall accompany the animals throughout the movement.

(g) Animals while being moved with a licence under this Order shall be moved as far as practicable by rail and by the nearest available route and without avoidable delay to the place of destination specified in the licence, and not elsewhere, and shall be kept separate, as far as practicable, from all other animals. Animals being moved by railway shall not be untrucked until they reach the railway station nearest to the place of destination. In no case shall any such animal be untrucked at any place outside the Infected Areas.

(h) Copies of licences authorising movement into the district of another Local Authority shall be sent by the Inspector issuing such licences to such other Local Authority.

(i) Licences shall be produced by the person in charge of the animals moved therewith on demand to an Inspector or to a Constable, and such person shall, if required by such Officer, give his name and address.

#### *Movement through Infected Areas by Railway Permitted.*

7. This Order shall not prevent the movement of animals direct by railway through the Infected Areas or any of such Areas if the animals are not untrucked within the Area or Areas through which they are so moved.

#### *Animals for Slaughter to be Marked.*

8.—(a) Animals moved to a slaughterhouse in accordance with a licence under this Order shall be detained at such slaughterhouse until they are slaughtered.

(b) Before such movement commences all such animals shall be marked as follows:—

*Cattle.*—A broad arrow six inches long clipped on the left hind-quarter and the hair clipped off the end of the tail.

*Sheep.*—A broad arrow clipped on the forehead and a letter M six inches long painted or stamped with red or blue adhesive composition on both sides of each sheep.

*Pigs.*—Letter M painted or stamped on both sides of the pig with red or blue adhesive composition.

#### *Closing of Footpaths and Premises.*

9.—(1) An Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority may (notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way) prohibit the entry of any person into any field, shed or other place in an Infected Area by

giving notice in writing to that effect to the occupier. In such cases the owner of the animals in such places, or his agents or servants, may enter for the sole purpose of feeding or tending the animals, but no other person shall enter any such place until such notice has been withdrawn by a further notice from an Inspector, unless he has obtained a licence to do so from an Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority;

(2) Copies of such notices shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he may think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed;

(3) Copies of such notices, when served, shall be sent to the Ministry.

#### *Control of Dogs and Poultry.*

10.—(1) An Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority may, by written notice served upon the occupier of any premises in an Infected Area on which dogs or poultry are kept, require such occupier to keep such dogs or poultry under such control as may be prescribed in the notice, or to confine them to any specified part of the premises;

(2) Copies of such notices, when served, shall be sent to the Ministry.

#### *Movement of Imported Animals.*

11. Imported animals intended to be moved from an approved Landing Place to a destination within any of the Infected Areas shall be accompanied throughout the movement by (1) a licence issued under this Order by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place of destination, and in the case of cattle, sheep or goats, by (2) the licence granted by the Inspector of the Ministry under the Imported Animals Order of 1923 (No. 2) authorising the removal of the animals from the Landing Place. The last mentioned licence shall not be issued until the Local Authority's licence is produced to the Inspector of the Ministry at the Landing Place.

#### *Local Authority to enforce Order.*

12. This Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### *Offences.*

13. Any contravention of this Order or of any notice served thereunder or of the conditions of any licence granted thereunder shall be deemed to be an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

#### *Commencement.*

14. This Order shall come into operation on the fourth day of January, nineteen hundred and twenty-four.

#### *Short Title.*

15. This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (INFECTED AREAS) ORDER OF 1924.
