HE Senate have made Choice of Signior Alvizo Mocenigo to go Ambassador from this Republick to the King of England; And of Signior Pisani to reside with the same, Character at the Court of France. The Pope's and the Maltese Galleys are return'd from the Levant. Our Fleet continues eruizing in the Archipelago, and have often endeavoured to draw the Enemy to an Engagement, but the Captain Bassa avoided it, and retired within the Streights of the Dardanelles; Two of the Turks Men of Warhavelately been stranded on the Coast of Gal-

Warsaw, Octob. 6. The Cardinal Primate is relipoli. turned hither from the Bathes, where he has spent the greatest part of the Summer. Our last Letters from the Frontiers give an Account, that the King of Poland's Forces being all joined together near Podaize, and having taken a Review of them, a Council of War was held, in which 'twas resolved, That seeing the Season is too far advanced to undertake any thing of Moment, they should forthwith be put into Winter-Quarters; and accordingly the King intends to post 10000 Men about Caminiec, so as to block up that Place during the Winter; to Quarter the like Number in Poland; and to march himself with the rest of the Troops to Lithuania, to settle the

Affairs of that Dutchy. From the Imperial Camp near Berzkerk, Sept. 29. Prince Eugene of Savoy having received Advice on the 18th Instant, that a strong Body of the Enemy had passed the River Temes, and judging them to be a Convoy the Turks were fending to Temeswaer, he marched from the Camp with greatest part of the German Horse, and having posted his Troops near Temeswaer, commanded a Party of Hussars to advance, in order to get farther Intelligence of the Enemy; but one of them deserting, and going over to the Turkish Garison, inform dthem of the approach of our Forces; whereupon feveral Cannon were immediately fired from the Town for a Signal to give notice to their Foragers who were abroad to return; And foon after the Enemy fallied out with about 2000 Horse, and engaging our advanced Party, beat them back, till Colonel Vaubonne, who was commanded with a Detachment of Horse to support them, came to their Assistance, when the Enemy retired, and were puriued to the Walls of the Town. Several of the Turks were killed in this Action, which cost us only one Officer, Count Esterhasi, a Captain in the Regiment of Palfi, who being too eager in the pursuit, was raken Prisoner, and about 8 or 10 Soldiers killed. Turks having notice of our Motions, had stopp'd the Convoy designed thither, and have since refolved to fend ir under a stronger Guard, and Prince Eugene has order'd out a Body of Horse to observe them. We hear, the Turks have built a Fort in an Island in the Danube near Belgrade, wherein they have put a Garison and 20 Pieces of Cannon. The Galleys, Barks, and other Vessels of the Imperial Fleet, are joined together near Peter-Waradin. Prince Eugene has given Orders for observing an exact Neutrality in the Country, lying within 5 miles round the Place of Congress for Treating a Peace with the Turks, pursuant to the Directions he has received from the Court at

Vienna, Octob. 8. My Lord Paget's Secretary returned to Belgrade on the 2d Instant with Passes for the Mediators and the Turkish Ministers; and Count Sehlick and Count Marsigly, two of the Emperor's Ambassadors for the Peace with the Turks, began their Journey on the 4th to the Place of Treaty, as Count Otting their Collegue did on the 6th; and the Venetian Ambassador, Signior Ruzzini, will follow to morrow. Several Preliminary Points are already settled, and among others, That the Country situate within 5 miles round the Place of Congress shall be reputed Neuter, and no Acts of Hostility committed there; and it's hop'd this great Work will soon be finish'd after the several Ambassadors are met together, both fides being very desirous to see an End put to so long a War. Signior Paulucci, the Pope's Nun-cio Extraordinary, who came hither some days ago from Poland, having finished his Negociation at this Court, is preparing for his Journey to Rome; The Pope having conferred on him a considerable Bishoprick, and intending, as tis said, to make him a Cardinal at the next Promotion.

Francfort, Octob. 15. The Sieur Obrecht, Com-

missary from the French King for adjusting the Pretentions of the Dutchess of Orleans on the Palatinate, is not yet arrived; and they write from Strasbourg, that he waits there for further Instructions from the French Court, as also for the Arrival of the Abbot Mauron from Paris, who is joined in Commission with him.
