

MINISTRY OF HEALTH.

PUBLIC HEALTH (IMPORTED FOOD) REGULATIONS, 1937.

The Minister of Health gives notice, in pursuance of the above-named Regulations, that he hereby recognises each of the Official Certificates of which particulars are given in the Schedule hereto as showing (a) that the meat to which it relates or the meat from which the meat product to which it relates was prepared, was derived from animals inspected ante and post mortem and passed in accordance with criteria satisfactory to the Minister; and (b) that all necessary precautions for the prevention of danger to public health were taken in the dressing or preparing and packing of the meat or meat product.

Where the Certificate is in the form of a label, the recognition will apply only if the label is securely affixed to the meat or to the package containing the meat or meat product and if the label has not in any other circumstances or on any other occasion been used as an Official Certificate; and where the Certificate is in the form of a stamp, the recognition will apply only if the stamp is clearly impressed on the meat or the container, as the case may be.

The label or stamp hereby recognised as an Official Certificate for meat and meat products imported from the Commonwealth of Australia is in addition to the labels and stamps of which particulars were given in Part II of the Schedule to the Notice published in the London Gazette of the 15th March, 1938, and in Part I of the Schedule to the Notice published in the London Gazette of the 27th May, 1938. Such labels and stamps will continue to be recognised until the 30th June, 1939, but thereafter the label or stamp hereby recognised will be in substitution therefor.

SCHEDULE.

I.

COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA.

For meat and meat products, a label or stamp having on it a design and a certificate in the form set out below:—

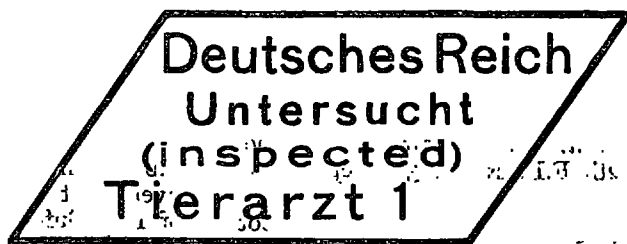
AND PASSED FOR EXPORT

The certificate will be completed by the insertion of the name of the State and the signature of the Inspector.

II.

GERMAN REICH.

A label or stamp of the following size and design:—



In place of the number 1 other identification numbers of Inspectors may be inserted.

III.

REPUBLIC OF URUGUAY.

For meat or meat products, including edible fats, in bags, wrappings, cases or barrels, a stamp having on it a design in the form set out in Part XI (3) of the Schedule to the Notice published in the London Gazette of the 15th March, 1938.

The certificate will be completed by the insertion of the number of the Establishment.
