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Warsaw, May 1. N. S.

THE King of Poland has writ a Circular Letter to the several Provincial Diets that are now assembled to chuse their Deputies for the General Diet, which is to meet here on the 16th of June, wherein he acquaints them with the Peace lately concluded between this Crown and the Porte, by which the Turks are to restore the City and Fortrefs of *Gaminiec*, together with the Provinces of *Podolia* and *Ukrania*; and that he is sending an Ambassador Extraordinary to the Grand Signior; He informs them of what has passed in the Affair of *Elbing*, and that the Senate are of Opinion to accept the Mediation of the Emperor, and the other Princes and States, who have offered to employ their good Offices for accommodating this Matter, provided the Elector of *Brandenburgh* do agree to put the said City into some Neutral Hand, before the Treaty be set on foot for this purpose; He acquaints them likewise, that the Troubles of *Lithuania* are ended, by the Agreement made between the Houses of *Sapieha* and *Oginsky*; And he exhorts them to give their Deputies such Instructions, as may tend to secure the Peace and Tranquillity of the Kingdom. The Commissioners appointed to take Possession of *Gaminiec*, and the other Places that are to be delivered up by the Turks, as likewise to see those Places evacuated which are to be restored to them pursuant to the Treaty of Peace, are arrived at *Lemberg*, and are expecting to hear from the Bassa of *Gaminiec*, on what day he will be ready to evacuate the same; And in the mean time, the Crown-Generall has issued Orders for the Forces of *Poland* that are quartered in *Rusland* to draw together, in order to make Detachments out of them, to furnish Garrisons for the Places that are to be restored to this Crown. The Letters from *Lemberg* say, the Peace has been published in *Budziac*, and other Parts of *Tartary*, together with a very strict Order from the Grand Signior, forbidding the *Tartars* to make Incurfions into the King of *Poland's* Territories.

Vienna, May 6. Their Imperial Majesties Journey to *Luxembourg* continues fixed for the 8th Instant; and it's said, that the Emperor intends, towards the beginning of the next Month, to go to *Presbourg*, where the States of *Hungary* are then to meet, in order to settle the Affairs of that Kingdom; It's reported, that the City of *Buda* will be restored to all its ancient Privileges, and that the Emperor designs to place there the Chief Courts of Justice, and the Chamber of the Finances, which are now at *Presbourg*. It's believed, the King of the *Romans* will likewise go to *Hungary*, and visit the fortified Places on those Frontiers. Our Letters from thence give the following Account of the Conferences at *Salankemen*,

for settling the Limits between the Emperor and the Grand Signior's Dominions; The first thing considered, was the making a Line or Ditch, pursuant to the Treaty of Peace, from the Shore of the *Danube* opposite to the Mouth of the *Theyffe*, to the *save* near *Swerem*; The Turkish Commissioners pretended, that the same ought to be made, so as to include *Salankemen* in the Sultan's Dominions; but this was opposed by the Emperor's Commissioners, and gave occasion to some Debate, but at last 'twas agreed, that the said Ditch should be carried on at some distance beyond *Salankemen*, so that this Place is to continue in the Emperor's Possession; And according to this Agreement, the Ground where this Ditch is to be made was staked out, and 500 Rascians are employed by each side to work on the same. The Turkish Officers on that Frontier have caused publick Notice to be given at *Belgrade*, and in the other Frontier Places, that the Grand Signior has granted freedom from Taxes for 50 years, and several other Privileges to all such as will come and settle within his Dominions in those Parts. Directions are given for finishing the new Fortifications at *Arat*, as likewise the Fort near that Place, which were begun last Summer, and are intended to serve as a Curb to the Garrison of *Temeswar*; For which reason, very strong Garrisons will be continually kept in those two Places. Signior *Ruzzini*, Ambassador from the Republick of *Venice*, set out from hence last Monday on his return home.

Frankfort, May 13. The Diet of the Circle of *Frankonia* is assembled at *Nuremberg*, to consider of divers Matters relating to the Garrison of *Philp burgh*, and particularly to agree about the number of Men to be furnish'd by each Member of the said Circle. The Count of *Nassau Wylourgs* and Baron *Wiser* Chancellor of the Palatinate, are returned to *Duseldorp*. It's said, there will shortly be a General Review of the Elector Palatine's Forces quartered in these Parts; after which, the Horse and Dragoons are to march back to their Quarters, and the Foot will be employed in making some new Fortifications at *Manheim*. We hear from *Alsace*, that the French are demolishing the remaining Arches of the Bridge over the *Rhine* near *Brisac*, and give out that they will shortly evacuate that Place; They work very hard on the new Fort they are building over-against it, which they design to call *New Brisac*. Two Declarations have been lately publish'd in these Parts, the one by the Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel*, and the other by the Landgrave of *Hesse-Darmstadt*, to invite the Protestants, banished by the Duke of *Savoy*, to come and settle in their Territories, promising them divers Privileges.

Hamburg, May 15. The Dukes of *Mecklenbourg-Swerin* and *Strelitz* are come hither, in order to renew the Conferences for adjusting the Pretensions they both make to the Succession of the late Duke of *Mecklenbourg-Gustraw*, which have been interrupted for some time. They write from *Dresden*, that the Prince of *Furstemberg* is returned thither from *Warsaw*, with some Members of the Council of State of *Saxony*, who had accompanied him in his Journey to *Poland*. Our

Letters from *Brandenburg* say, the Commander of the Garrison of *Elbing* had acquainted the Magistrates, that there being a great number of the Troops of *Poland* quartered in the Neighbourhood of that Place, the Elector of *Brandenburg* had thought fit to give Orders, that the City-Gates should be shut up every night before Sun-set, and that to prevent all Disturbances within the Town, the Burghers should not wear any Arms, or be together in such Numbers as might give just grounds to suspect them. Our Letters from *Stockholm* give an Account, that the Count *d'Avaux*, Amb. Nador from *France*, took his Audience of Leave of the King of *Sweden* on the 24th past, in order to his return home. The *Sieur Galeski*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Poland*, was come thither from *Copenhagen*, and had Audience of the King of *Sweden* on the 31st. The Duke of *Holstein-Gottorp* was shortly expected there from *Germany*.

Brussels, May 17. The Count *de Tirimont*, and Monsieur *de Brouckhoven*, Commissioners on the part of *Spain* for settling the Limits between the *French* and *Spanish* Territories in the *Netherlands*, are come hither from *Liste*, where the Conference for that purpose are held, to receive the Elector of *Bavaria's* last Orders and Instructions, and will return thither to morrow. It's said, they have made a great Progress in this Affair, and 'tis hoped the same will shortly be brought to a Conclusion. The Deputies from the Cities of *Brabant* met here yesterday, and will continue some time assembled, to consider of divers Matters relating to the Improvement of their Trade, and the Canal they intend to make from *Ostend* to the *Scheld*, the Expence of which is computed at about 1500000 Florins. The Count of *Tarini*, Envoy from the Duke of *Savoy*, had Audience this week of the Elector and Electresses of *Bavaria*, whom he acquainted, that the Dutches of *Savoy* was delivered of a Son on the 6th Instant.

Hague, May 19. Divers Members of the States of *Holland* and *Westfriseland* are come hither, in order to open their Assembly to morrow. The Directors of the several Chambers of the *West-India* Company are expected here in a day or two, to settle several things relating to their Trade; The Deputies from the Colleges of the Admiralty are also to meet here about the same time. The States-General have sent a Letter to the King of *Denmark*, to thank him for the Relief and Settlement he has promised within his Dominions to the Protestants that are banished out of *Piedmont*. Major-General *d'Eppinge* arrived here yesterday from *Overyffel*, and went this morning to the *Brill* to embark for *England*. The Count *de Frize* is returned to *Germany*. Monsieur *d'Odyke* is come back to this Place from *Zeist*.

Falmouth, May 8. The *Spanish-Expedition* Packet-boat failed from hence the 5th Instant with one Mail for the *Groyne*. This morning came in here the *Ann* of this Port, *Robert Pike* Master, with Wine from the *Canaries*.

Plymouth, May 9. Yesterday failed from hence the *Bridget Galley* of *London*, *John Bacon* Master, bound home from *Havre-de-grace*; and the *Manley* of *Southampton*, *Philip Dourwell* Master, homeward bound from *Virginia*.

Deal, May 12. His Majesty's Ships the *Rochester* and the *Winchester* came in here this morning from *Plymouth*.

Kensington, May 13. His Majesty returned hither this evening from *Windfor*.

Kensington, May 14. His Majesty has been pleased to Constitute the Right Honourable *Edward Earl of Jersey* One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and accordingly his Lordship took the usual Oaths this evening in Council.
