#### ROYAL AIR FORCE.

The KING has been graciously pleased to approve the following awards in recognition of gallantry displayed in flying operations against the enemy:—

##### *Distinguished Service Order.*

Acting Wing Commander Peter Wooldridge TOWNSEND, D.F.C. (33178)—No. 85 Squadron.

This officer has displayed outstanding powers of leadership and organisation, combined with great determination and skill in air combat. By his untiring efforts he has contributed materially to the many successes obtained by his squadron. Wing Commander Townsend has been engaged on active operations since the war began and has carried out numerous operational flights, both by day and night. He has destroyed at least 11 enemy aircraft.

##### *Distinguished Flying Cross.*

Wing Commander Thomas Geoffrey PIKE (16202)—No. 219 Squadron.

This officer, who recently assumed command of the squadron, has shown great skill in intercepting enemy aircraft at night. During his first night patrol, he intercepted and, it is believed, destroyed a raiding aircraft.
