or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southeastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the close numbered I upon the map and extending thence northwestward to and along the said wall or fence and across the road leading from Minskip to Boroughbridge to and along the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the close numbered 2 upon the map for a distance in all of 29 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said isolated part of the Parish of Aldborough from the said New Parish of Roecliffe.

'II. All that further portion of the said Parish of Aldborough which is bounded upon the west by the said New Parish of Boroughbridge, upon the north by the said Parish of Kirby on the Moor and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said Parish of Kirby on the Moor from the said Parish of Aldborough at a point in the middle of the River Ure opposite to the northern end of the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the closes numbered 3 and 4 upon the map and extending thence southward to and first southward then eastward and then again southward along the said wall or fence for a distance in all of 22 chains or thereabouts to the northern side of the road leading from Boroughbridge to Aldborough and extending then southward to and westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of 8 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Boroughbridge to York and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 12½ chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the eastern end of the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of the closes numbered 5, 6 and 7 upon the map and extending thence westward to and along the said boundary for a distance of 22 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Aldborough from the said New Parish of Boroughbridge.

All that portion of the said New Parish of Boroughbridge which is bounded upon the east by the said Parish of Aldborough, upon the south by the Parish of Marton with Grafton in the said County and Diocese, upon a part of the west by the said isolated part of the Parish of Aldborough and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said isolated part of the Parish of Aldborough from the said New Parish of Boroughbridge at a point in the middle of the aforesaid road known as Aldborough Gate and extending thence eastward for a distance of 11 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Wetherby to Boroughbridge and extending thence northward along the middle of the last mentioned road for a distance of 37 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the aforementioned close numbered 7 on the map and extending thence eastward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of I chain or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Boroughbridge from the said Parish of Aldborough.'

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 to 1930, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:
