THE following Address of the Corporation of Deal was presented to His Majesty by John Brewer Esq; their Recorder, Introduced by his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, which His Majesty received very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.
The Humble Address of the Mayor, Jurats, and Commonalty of Deal in the County of Kent.

THE daily Influences of Your Majesty's Grace and Favor dispens'd to all Your Subjects, makes it our Common and Undoubted Interest (as well as Duty) to Pray for Your Long and Prosperous Reigne, and yet more especially of us (Your Majesty's Most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects) for Your late Charter of Incorporation, by which we are Indulged with weekly Markets for the Better Accommodation and Benefit of Your Royal Navy, (which hath ever bin Your Majesty's special Care) and also with Courts of Justice, for the ease of Suitors, and Reformation of Manners; which Gracious Intentions of Your Majesty's of Manners; which Gracious Intentions of Your Majesty's for the good Government of Your Subjects, we shall improve our utmost Endeavours to see Accomplish'd; That Strangers to Your Majesty's Dominion, (for none can be so Your Royal Virtues) upon their first Landing, may have just Cause to believe, that Your Majesty is not only a Great, but a Happy King of a Happy People, and perceive the Advantages of a Government thus Founded on Subjects Hearts, and not their Fears: And that Your Majesty may thus long Reigne, are the Prayers of Your Dutiful Subjects.

Warsaw, Dec. 11. N. S. The Senate of this Kingdom, after several Meetings about the Business of Elbing, resolv'd to make this Proposal to the Elector of Brandenburg, That they will pay his Electoral Highness 300000 Dollars presently, and 100000 more afterwards, in different Payments, and give good Security for the Performance hereof, upon condition the Elector does withdraw his Forces out of the City of Elbing, and restore that City to the Condition 'twas in at the time his Troops enter'd the same; Which having been communicated to the Elector, and the Courier sent to Berlin on this occasion being returned, his Electoral Highness's Ministers residing here, did this day acquaint the Senate, That his Electoral Highness has accepted these Proposals, with some few Alterations, which are of so little Importance, that this Affair is looked upon to be as good as concluded; And the Crown-Treasurer is ordered to take care, that the Money be ready to be paid to his Electoral Highness according to this Agreement. The Crown-General is gone to Radom, where he and divers other General Officers are to meet, in order to settle the Accounts of the Army.

Peterwaradin, Dec. 6. The Ceremonies to be observ'd at the Meeting of the Imperial and Turkish Ambassadors on the Frontiers near *Salanck men*, being agreed upon between Count *Guido of Staremberg*, General of the Imperial Forces in these Parts, and an Officer whom the Bassa of *Belgrade* had sent to settle the same with him; Count *Oetting*, the Emperor's Ambassador, came to this Place on the 30th past by Water from *Putack*. Count *Staremberg* sent a Colonel of Foot, and some other Officers on board a Saick, to meet his Excellency about a League from hence, and himself accompanied with the Baron *Nehm* Governor of this Place, and divers other Persons of Quality, received him at his Landing, and conducted him to the House prepared for his Reception. Yesterday

Count *Staremberg*, the Imperial Ambassador, the Baron of *Nehm*, and the other Persons of Quality and Officers of Note that were here, attended by a Guard of about 200 Horse, went to *Salanck men*. The Turkish Ambassador arrived the 30th past at *Belgrade*, and was to set out from thence in like manner yesterday, with the Bassa of that City, and a Guard of 200 Horse. To morrow is the day appointed for their Meeting; When the Ambassadors with their Retinue come within a certain distance of each other, they are to alight and to advance at the same time to the Place which separates the Dominions of the two Empires; There the Imperial Ambassador is to be received by the Bassa of *Belgrade*, and the Turkish Ambassador by Count *Staremberg*, and after the proper Compliments have passed between them, they are to proceed on their respective Journeys. Preparations are making here for the Reception of the Turkish Ambassador, who is expected to morrow night.

Vienna, Dec. 16. A Courier was sent this week to Count *Marsigli*, the Emperor's Commissioner for settling the Limits between the German and Turkish Territories, with the last Resolutions of this Court, touching the Dispute about the Town of *Novi* on the River *Unna*, and its Dependencies; And the Conditions offered by the Emperor for accommodating this Matter being very reasonable, 'tis not doubted but the Turks will accept of them. The Repartition of the Quarters for the Imperial Forces in *Hungary* and *Transylvania*, is not yet adjust'd between the Emperor's Ministers and the Deputies from those Countries, and it's believed, a Diet of the Kingdom of *Hungary* will shortly be summoned to meet at *Presbourg* to settle those Matters. Count *Lemberg* is gone from hence on his Embassy to *Rome*. The Cardinal *Santa Croce*, Nuncio from the Pope, intends to begin his Journey thither in few days. We expect by our next Letters from *Peterwaradin* to receive Advice, that the Imperial and Turkish Ambassadors have met on the Frontiers. The Count of *Staremberg* is to conduct the Turkish Ambassador to *Peterwaradin*, and there he is to be received by the Commissioners whom the Emperor has appointed to accompany him in his Journey hither, and to defray his Expences.

Hamburg, Dec. 25. The Contentions between the Ministers of the several Princes, who have offer'd their Mediation for accommodating the Affair of *Holstein*, are continued, but hitherto with no great success; Several Proposals have been made, but none that satisfie both Parties: It's said, the King of *Sweden* has offer'd, that his Forces shall march out of the Duchy of *Holstein*, provided a like number of the Troops of the Circle of *Lower Saxony* may come in their stead, but that the King of *Denmark* does not consent thereto. In the mean time the Danish Forces in *Holstein* are commanded to be in a readiness to march upon the first Orders they shall receive; and a Train of Artillery lies ready at *G-lustad*; However our Letters from *Copenhagen* assure us, that the King of *Denmark* has begun part of his Journey to *Holstein*; and that part of his Servants and Equipage; who were on their way thither, have been Cou' reformed. The Points in Dispute between the Court of *Denmark*, and the Foreign Ministers residing there who have not the Character of Ambassadors, continue undecid'd; They are said to relate chiefly to the

Manner in which the said Ministers shall be Treated by the Princes of the Blood, the King having ordered, that greater Honours be paid to them by the said Ministers than has been formerly practised.

Hague, Dec. 29. The States-General have sent the Tariff, lately concluded with France, to the Provinces, in order to it's being published. Monsieur Odyk is returned hither from Zealand.

Paris, Dec. 30. N. S. The Count of Zinzendorf, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, having on the 21st Instant received Advice by an Express from Vienna, of the Birth of the young Princess, Daughter to the King of the Romans; he had Audience the next day of the King at Versailles, to whom he notified the same; as he did in like manner to the Dauphin, and the Duke of Burgundy. The Venetian Ambassador's Lady had Audience the same day of the Dutchess of Burgundy, being introduced by Monsieur de Saintot, Introducer of Ambassadors, with the usual Ceremonies. The Marquis de Cascaes, Ambassador from the King of Portugal, has had Audience of Leave of the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans and of the Duke de Chartres, and intends in few days to return home. The Dutchess of Lorraine dined with the King at Marli on Saturday last, and having taken her Leave of him, and of the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, she returned the same day to this Place, and set out from hence on Monday morning on her Journey to Barr, where the Duke of Lorraine is at present. The Cardinal d'Estrees is preparing for his Journey to Rome, which he intends to begin on the 15th of the next Month, and it's said, Cardinal Fassen will be going thither about the same time. Mr. Stanhope, His Majesty of Great-Britain's late Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of Spain, arrived here the 21st Instant. The Countess of Manchester had Audience last Saturday of the Dutchess of Orleans at the Palace Royal in this City with the usual Ceremonies. Our Letters from Lyons give an Account, that the Count de Briort is arrived in that City in his way hither from Turin, where he resided as Ambassador from this Crown. They write from Strasburgh of the 20th Instant, that the Elector Palatine had given Orders for the 4th Payment of the Money he is to make to the Dutchess of Orleans according to the Treaty of Ryswick, till her Pretensions on the Palatinate be adjusted; In order whereunto, the Conferences are continued between the French and Palatine Commissioners. Our last Advices from Rome say, the Pope continues very ill, and that his Memory begins to fail him.

Portsmouth, Dec. 22. Yesterday sailed from hence, His Majesty's Ships the *Advice*, and the *Shoram*, for the *West-Indies*; The same day came in here, His Majesty's Ships the *Portland*, and the *Mary Galley*. The Dutch outward-bound *St. Tubes* Fleet, which put in here some time ago, are failed in order to continue their Voyage.

Whitehall, Dec. 20. The Baron of Tettau, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, had Publick Audience this day of their Royal Highnesses the Princess and Prince of Denmark, and of his Highness the Duke of Gloucester, being introduced by Sir Charles Corfield, Master of the Ceremonies, in the usual manner.
