Acting Squadron Leader Nicholas Palmer Simmons, D.F.M. (44605), R.A.F., 51 Sqn.

In June, 1944, this officer was air bomber and captain of an aircraft detailed to attack Villers-Bocage. Considerable opposition was experienced and shortly after the bombing run had been completed, the aircraft was hit by anti-aircraft fire and the navigator was wounded. Squadron Leader Simmons assisted his comrade to a rest position. While administering first aid, Squadron Leader Simmons himself was wounded when the aircraft was struck by another shell. Despite this he completed his task and then returned to his cabin, only to find that the front had been shattered and all the navigational instruments had been rendered all the navigational instruments had been rendered useless. He thereupon went to the pilot's position in order to give all assistance he could, and, when base was finally reached he helped to effect a successful landing. Not until then did he disclose

that he had been injured. This gallant captain has completed a large number of sorties since being awarded the Distinguished Flying Medal and his example has proved a rare source of inspiration to his crew.

Bar to Distinguished Flying Cross.

Acting Wing Commander Jack Napier DAVENPORT, D.S.O., D.F.C. (Aus.403403), R.A.A.F., 455 (R.A.A.F.) Sqn.

Since being awarded the Distinguished Service Order, Wing Commander Davenport has taken part in numerous attacks on enemy shipping. Much of the success obtained can be attributed to this officer's brilliant and courageous leadership. His outstanding ability and personal example have impressed all impressed all.

Squadron Leader Ernest William TACON, D.F.C., A.F.C. (36196), R.A.F.O., 236 Sqn.

In July, 1944, this officer took part in an attack on an enemy convoy during which 4 ships were set on fire. By his gallant and skilful leadership, Squadron Leader Tacon contributed in a large way to the success achieved. His resolute example in face of heavy opposing fire proved greatly inspiring.

Acting Squadron Leader Derek Harold Hammond, D.F.C. (N.Z.401493), R.N.Z.A.F., 489 (N.Z.) Sqn. Squadron Leader Hammond has taken part in

Squadron Leader Hammond has taken part in numerous attacks on enemy shipping and has displayed a high degree of courage and determination throughout. In July, 1944, he led a formation of aircraft in an attack on an enemy convoy off the Norwegian coast. During the operation, Squadron Leader Hammong obtained a hit on a medium sized vessel causing its destruction. This officer has set a fine example. His efforts are untiring and his devotion to duty unfailing.

ting Squadron Leader Derrick Fitzgerald WESTENRA, D.F.C. (89782), R.A.F.V.R., 65 Sqn. Since being awarded the Distinguished Flying

Cross this officer has completed very many sorties, including attacks on enemy transport and troop concentrations in the Normandy theatre. He is a concentrations in the Normandy theatre. He is a relentless fighter whose great skill and gallant example have greatly inspired the squadron he commands. Squadron Leader Westenra has destroyed 9 enemy aircraft.

Flight Lieutenant Kenneth Langley CHARNEY, D.F.C.

(I12709), R.A.F.V.R., 602 Sqn.
Flight Lieutenant Charney is a brave and resourceful fighter. He has taken part in a very large number of sorties, involving a variety of operational missions. In air fighting he has destroyed 6 enemy aircraft.

Distinguished Flying Cross.

Wing Commander Norman de Warrenne Boult. A.F.C. (34066), R.A.F.O., 180 Sqn. In July, 1944, this officer took part in an attack on a target south of Caen. Considerable antion a target south of Caen. Considerable anti-aircraft fire was encountered and, in his run over the target, Wing Commander Boult's aircraft was hit. The hydraulic gear was put out of action, causing the bomb doors to fall open and the land-ing wheels to drop to the down position; other damage was also sustained. Wing Commander Boult was wounded in the arm and in the eye but despite this he maintained formation and made two more runs over the target. This officer set a fine example of courage and devotion to duty throughout.

Acting Wing Commander Michael Trentham Maw (70457), R.A.F.O., 640 Sqn
This officer has consistently displayed skill and initiative and has at all times pressed home his attacks. He has completed many operations including attacks against Germany and enemy occupied territories; he has also taken part in numerous mine laying missions. By his personal example and leadership Wing Commander Maw has maintained a very high standard in his squadron. squadron.

Wing Commander Archibald CATHCART

This officer has displayed gallantry, determination and devotion to duty worthy of the greatest praise. He has taken part in a large number of sorties on many of which he has led large formations of aircraft with exceptional ability. He has rendered much valuable service.

Squadron Leader Reginald Henry Clifford Burwell (40602), R.A.F.O., 144 Sqn.

This officer has participated in very many sorties, including numerous attacks on enemy shipping, on 3 of which eight vessels were attacked with good results. In the fights, Squadron Leader Burwell displayed great skill and courage and pressed home his attacks with the greatest determination in spite of considerable anti-aircraft fire. He is a fine leader fine leader.

Squadron Leader Frank George Grant (Can/J.5056), R.C.A.F., 438 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer has completed much operational flying and has invariably displayed a high degree of skill, courage and determination. In June, 1944, he successfully attacked a bridge spanning the river Dives. Some days later he led the squadron in an attack against an enemy headquarters in the Caen area; the building being completely demolished. He is a most inspiring squadron commander. commander.

Acting Squadron Leader Richard Ronald MITCHELL

cting Squadron Leader Richard Ronald MITCHELL (45093), R.A.F., 33 Sqn.

This officer has displayed the highest standard of devotion to duty in air operations. He has taken part in a large number of sorties and has invariably displayed notable skill and courage. He has commanded the squadron for very many months and his skill, keenness and fine fighting spirit have contributed materially to the operational efficiency of the squadron. Squadron Leader Mitchell has destroyed 3 enemy aircraft.

Acting Squadron Leader Hughes Hoyles Norsworthy (Can/J.5114), R.C.A.F., 439 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer is a courageous and skilful leader and has played a prominent part in the success of the squadron he commands. He has participated in many sorties during which 16 small vessels have been destroyed. Much of the success achieved can be attributed to this officer's inspiring leadership and great tactical ability. On one occasion, whilst flying over a town on the South coast his aircraft caught fire. Displaying great skill and coolness, Squadron Leader Norsworthy effected a successful crash-landing in the only available open space in the area.

Acting Squadron Leader William Harry Pentland (Can/J.3204), R.C.A.F., 440 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer has completed many sorties on his second tour of operational duty. In air operations over the Normandy area he has led the squadron on many sorties during which bridges, enemy strong points, troop concentrations and mechanical transport have been determinedly attacked.

Throughout these operations Squadron Leader Throughout these operations, Squadron Leader Pentland has displayed great skill, courage and resolution.

Acting Squadron Leader Donald Hamilton SMITH (Aus.407256), R.A.A.F., 453 (R.A.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer is a most efficient squadron commander. He has participated in a very large number of varied sorties and has proved himself to be a gallant and skilful leader. He has destroyed at least 3 enemy aircraft.

Flight Lieutenant Arthur Charles Leigh, D.F.M. (11975), R.A.F.V.R., 129 Sqn.

Since being awarded the Distinguished Flying Medal this officer has completed many sorties, during which he has attacked many enemy targets such as locomotives, mechanical transport and trucks with damaging effect; he has also shot down an enemy aircraft. This officer continues to display a high degree of courage and resolution.

Flight Lieutenant Edward Robert Murphy (106676), R.A.F.V.R., 264 Sqn.

Flight Lieutenant Murphy is a highly efficient observer. He has participated in a large number of sorties and has proved himself to be a most valuable member of aircraft crew. He has assisted in the destruction of 3 enemy aircraft at night.

Flight Lieutenant Raymond Stanley NASH (119808), R.A.F.V.R., 91 Sqn.

This officer is a most capable flight commander. He has completed a large number of sorties and throughout has displayed great skill and keenness. He has destroyed 2 enemy aircraft, 2 locomotives and a number of flying bombs.

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Flight Lieutenant Alan Francis Pavey (119252), R.A.F.V.R., 122 Sqn.

This officer has led his flight with great distinction in very many sorties during which such targets as railway junctions, bridges, mechanical transport and other targets on the ground have been attacked with destructive results. By his gallant, resolute and skilful leadership, Flight Lieutenant Pavey has played a prominent part in the successes obtained. In air fighting he has destroyed 3 enemy aircraft.

Flight Lieutenant James Kent Blair Purves (Can/J.4342), R.C.A.F., 21 Sqn.

This officer has completed many sorties on his second tour of operational duty. In the course of his assignments he has attacked a wide range of targets, including enemy airfields, shipping, road transport and other objectives. He has displayed great skill and determination, setting an excellent example example.

Flight Lieutenant Peter Frank STEIB

This officer has taken part in very many sorties of a varied character and throughout has displayed the highest standard of keenness and determination. He has successfully attacked many targets on the ground and in air fighting has shot down 3 enemy aircraft.

Flight Lieutenant Henry Paul Michael Zary (Can/ J.9261), R C.A.F., 421 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.
This officer is a most determined fighter whose keenness to engage the enemy has always been apparent. In July, 1944, he took part in an engagement against a superior force of enemy fighters, 3 of which he shot down. This officer has completed a large number of sorties and has destroyed 6 enemy aircraft.

Flight Lieutenant Peter Francis Locker Hall (N.Z.412841), R.N.Z.A.F., 488 (N.Z.) Sqn. Flying Officer Richard D'Arcy Marriott (141337), R.A.F.V.R., 488 (N.Z.) Sqn.

As pilot and observer respectively these officers have participated in many sorties. Throughout they have displayed commendable skill and keenness. They have destroyed 4 enemy aircraft.

Acting Flight Lieutenant Fred Derek Algernon Ainsley (128859), R.A.F.V.R., 640 Sqn As pilot and captain this officer has participated in very many operational missions. He has displayed a high standard of ability and throughout his determination to complete his missions successfully has been most apparent. He is a fine leader whose coolness in action has greatly inspired his crews. cfews.

Acting Flight Lieutenant Horne Paul LAGACE (Can/

As air gunner, this officer has displayed the highest standard of determination throughout his tours of operational duty. He has taken part in attacks on very many targets important to the enemy's war effort His coolness in action and his

notable gunnery skill have made him a most valuable member of aircraft crew.

Acting Flight Lieutenant Vernon Arnold Lancaster

cting Flight Lieutenant Vernon Arnold Lancaster (Aus. 409149), R.A.A.F., 453 (R.A.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer has displayed great keenness to engage the enemy. He has taken part in a large number of sorties, including attacks on such targets as railway objectives, radio installations and enemy positions in Northern France, Belgium and Holland. In June, 1944, Flight Lieutenant Lancaster took part in an engagement against 6 enemy fighters over the battle area of Normandy. Although wounded in the head this officer fought with great tenacity and assisted in the destruction of one of the enemy force. He has destroyed 3 hostile aircraft. aircraft.

Acting Flight Lieutenant Stanley Arthur WINDMILL

cting Flight Lieutenant Stanley Arthur WINDMILI (174076), R.A.F.V.R., 158 Sqn.

One night in June, 1944, this officer piloted an aircraft detailed to attack Trappes. During the operation the aircraft was attacked by a fighter at close range. By a clever manoeuvre, Flight Lieutenant Windmill evaded the attacker but, a short time afterwards the enemy aircraft again came in. Once again Flight Lieutenant Windmill responded well to the directions of his gunners and obtained a position from which they delivered effective fire and shot the enemy aircraft down. In this spirited action, Flight Lieutenant Windmill displayed great skill, coolness and co-operation. He has participated in a large number of sorties during which he has attacked a wide range of targets.

Flying Officer Robert Lyle James Barbour (125456), R.A.F.V.R., 264 Sqn. Flying Officer George Paine (129167), R.A.F.V.R.,

These officers have completed very many sorties

They have as pilot and observer respectively. They have displayed great skill and co-operation and have destroyed 3 enemy aircraft at night. Their keenness and devotion to duty have been most commendable.

Flying Officer Peter de Leighton BROOKE (127949), 264 Sqn.

This officer has displayed exceptional keenness to engage the enemy. He has destroyed 2 enemy aircraft both of which he shot down one night in June; 1944, over the allied beachhead in Normandy; he has also destroyed a number of flying bombs.

Flying Officer James Douglas Cooper (79411), R.A.F.V.R., 158 Sqn. This officer has completed a large number of

sorties involving attacks on a wide variety of targets. Throughout he has displayed exceptional keenness and a fine fighting spirit and his accurate bomb aiming has contributed materially to the successes obtained. His example has been most

Flying Officer Leonard Evans (144330), R.A.F.V.R.,

Flying Officer Evans has taken part in attacks on a wide range of well defended enemy targets. Throughout he has displayed the highest standard of determination and his navigational ability has contributed materially to the successes obtained. On a recent occasion, Flying Officer Evans took part in an attack. During the operation the aircraft was hit by fire from the ground defences. The air bomber's compartment was damaged and its occupant was wounded. After rendering first aid to his comrade, Flying Officer Evans guided his pilot unerringly to the target where he manipuhis pilot unerringly to the target where he manipulated the bomb sight and released the bombs himself. He has invariably displayed commendable courage and resource.

Flving Officer Ralph Edward Jones (151862), R.A.F.V.R., 455 (R.A.A.F.) Sqn. This officer has participated in numerous sorties, including several successful attacks on enemy shipping He is a gallant and devoted member of aircraft crew, whose navigational ability has contributed in good measure to the successes obtained. His keenness, thoroughness and appreciation of the responsibilities entrusted to him have set a very fine example.

Flying Officer Allan Robert Osment (N.Z.539054), R.N.Z.A.F., 489 (N.Z.) Sqn.
In July, 1944, this officer took part in an air attack on a large enemy convoy. In the fight, Flying Officer Osment beavily attacked a medium

sized merchant vessel; he also attacked 2 smaller skill and resolution of a high order. This officer has taken part in very many sorties, including several attacks on shipping.

Flying Officer William Gerald Phelan (Can/J.27718), R.C.A.F., 425 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer has completed many sorties and has displayed exceptional skill and determination, qualities which were well in evidence when detailed qualities which were well in evidence when detailed for an attack one evening in July, 1944. Early on the outward flight one of the engines became defective and had to be put out of action. In spite of this, Flying Officer Phelan was determined to complete the mission for which he had been detailed. Owing to loss of air speed he knew that to follow the prescribed route would mean a late arrival over the target. He therefore altered course and, by the most direct route. mean a late arrival over the target. He therefore altered course and, by the most direct route, went on to the target and executed a successful attack. On the return flight he skilfully controlled the use of the engines to conserve the petrol supply which had become much reduced and finally reached base. This officer has at all times displayed the highest standard of devotion to duty.

Flying Officer Matthew Francis Southeate (151833), R.A.F.V.R., 455 (R.A.A.F.) Son.

This officer has taken part in many sorties, and has displayed skill and devotion to duty throughout. In July, 1944, he was the navigator of one of a large formation of aircraft which attacked a big enemy convoy. The attack was pressed home with great determination and Flying Officer Southgate rendered valuable service in the co-ordination of a most successful attack. He is a highly skilled and courageous member of aircraft highly skilled and courageous member of aircraft

Flying Officer Fred Leon Rowe (Can/J.16034), R.C.A.F., 434 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.
Flying Officer Rowe has completed two tours of Flying Officer Rowe has completed two tours of operational duty during which he has taken part in very many attacks on targets in Germany. Throughout he has displayed a high standard of navigational ability, combined with great determination and devotion to duty. On one occasion his pilot was temporarily blinded by particles of glass from the shattered windscreen. On reaching an airfield in this country, Flying Officer Rowe proved his resource by assisting another member of the crew to make a safe landing. This officer is a most valuable member of aircraft crew. most valuable member of aircraft crew.

Officer Elliot Gilbert AVERY

ilot Officer Elliot Gilbert AVERY [177072], R.A.F.V.R., 158 Sqn.

This officer has completed very many sorties in the role of wireless operator and has invariably displayed initiative, skill and courage. On one occasion he was a member of a crew detailed to attack Stuttgart. On the outward journey some important navigational equipment became unserviceable. The pilot was determined to go on to the target, however, and the subsequent good work by Pilot Officer Avery played a good part in the ultimate success achieved. ultimate success achieved.

Pilot Officer Glen Alvin Bassett (Can/J.86138), R.C.A.F., 428 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer, as rear gunner, has participated in many sorties against objectives in Germany and France; he has also completed numerous minelaying operations. On several occasions his vigilance and skilful evading directions have applied his pilot to frustrate enemy fighters. His enabled his pilot to frustrate enemy fighters. His excellent work has contributed materially to the successes achieved.

Pilot Officer Ronald Victor CLARKSON (Aus.417805),

R.A.A.F., 158 Sqn.

This officer has completed a large number of sorties as air gunner, against a wide variety of targets. On several occasions he has been involved in engagements against enemy fighters but he has defended his aircraft with much skill and determination and his efforts have contributed materially to the successes obtained. He has proved himself to be a most valiant member of aircraft crew.

Pilot Officer Reginald Samuel Cripps (178148), R.A.F.V.R., 158 Sqn.

As air gunner, this officer has participated in a large number of sorties, many of them involving attacks on targets in Normandy. He is a cool, confident and vigilant member of aircraft crew, whose fine fighting qualities have set a fine example. On a recent occasion, he took part in

an attack against Trappes. During the flight the aircraft was attacked by a fighter. After giving the necessary combat manoeuvre to his captain, Pilot Officer Cripps opened fire. His bullets struck the enemy aircraft which burst into flames and fell to the ground. His, conduct has at all times been exemplary.

ilot Officer Roy E R.A.F.V.R., 640 Sqn. Edgar " CROCKETT (175431),

This officer has participated in very many sorties against targets important to the enemy's war effort. He has invariably pressed home his attacks with great determination, setting a fine example. On one occasion, when attacking Frankfurt, his aircraft was hit by anti-aircraft fire and temporarily went out of control. A fire broke out near the main spar and the cockpit became filled with smoke. With the greatest difficulty, Pilot Officer Crockett succeeded in regaining control and turned for home, whilst other members of the crew fought the fire which they soon succeeded in extinguishing. Although suffering acutely from the pain of his wounds, Pilot Officer Crockett displayed great fortitude and flew the damaged aircraft to base. His example of courage and tenacity was worthy of great praise.

Pilot Officer John Double (172416), R.A.F.V.R., 166 Sqn.

This officer has displayed the greatest determination in his attacks on the enemy. He has completed many sorties. most of which have been against well defended targets. One night in July, 1944, Pilot Officer Double captained an aircraft detailed to attack Stuttgart. On the outward flight the rear turret became unserviceable. In spite of this, he went on to the target In the bombing run the aircraft was hit by anti-aircraft tree and one engine was put out of action. Neverthefire, and one engine was put out of action. Nevertheless, Pilot Officer Double pressed home his attack and afterwards flew the aircraft back to this country. His determination to successfully complete his allotted task was typical of that which he has shown throughout his tour.

filot Officer Alan Robert Clark Forrester (Aus.415517), R.A.A.F., 640 Sqn.

This officer has completed very many sorties involving attacks against such heavily defended targets as Berlin, Leipzig, Frankfurt and Stuttgart. He has displayed a fine fighting spirit and has at all times pressed home his attacks with the greatest determination. During February, 1944, when on a sortie over Stuttgart, his aircraft was attacked on eight separate occasions by two enemy fighters. Pilot Officer Forrester co-operating splendidly with his gunners was largely responsible for the safe return of his aircraft and crew. He has a fine return of his aircraft and crew. He has a fine record of achievement and has displayed exceptional qualities of leadership and courage.

Pilot Officer William Henry Golding (Can/J.19871), R.C.A.F., 57 Sqn.

This officer has successfully completed numerous sorties on his second tour of operations. One night in July, 1944, he was rear gunner of an aircraft which was attacked by a fighter. Early in the engagement Pilot Officer Golding was hit in the less by a bullet; he also sustained burns to the in the engagement Filot Officer Golding was hit in the leg by a bullet; he also sustained burns to the leg and thigh when his turret caught fire. In spite of this he used his guns with good effect and the enemy aircraft was seen to dive steeply away on fire. His courage and resolution were characteristic of that which he has displayed throughout his tours. throughout his tours.

Officer Robert Borden McCullough

Pilot Officer Robert Borden McCullough (Can/J.19784), R.C.A.F., 434 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn. This officer has completed many operations. He is a skilful and resolute pilot and has at all times displayed the highest degree of courage and devotion to duty. On two occasions his aircraft has been attacked and damaged by enemy fighters. Nevertheless, by skilful airmanship he evaded the enemy and piloted his aircraft back to base. His consistent good work and gallantry merits the highest praise.

Pilot Officer Douglas Neilson (175816), R.A.F.V.R.,

15<u>8</u> Sqn.

This officer has completed a large number of This officer has completed a large number of sorties in a tour which commenced with an attack on Berlin. He has displayed great skill and iron determination throughout, qualities which were amply demonstrated in June, 1944, when he attacked the vital target of Villers Bocage. In spite of a hail of light and medium, anti-aircraft fire, Pilot Officer Neilson pressed home his attack with great determination. Although 2 engines were damaged, this brave pilot flew safely to base. He displayed the highest standard of fearlessness and resolution.

Pilot Officer John Charles Oram (Aus.422250), R.A.A.F., 626 Sqn.

In July, 1944, this officer was the captain of an aircraft detailed to attack a concentration of enemy forces in daylight. The attack was successfully executed but, whilst over the target area, the aircraft was hit by anti-aircraft fire and sustained extensive damage. Control was not affected, however, and a course was set for home. Almost as the ever, and a course was set for home. Almost as the French coast was reached one of the fuel tanks was seen to be on fire. The flames spread furiously and soon both wings were alight. Nothing could be done to save the aircraft and Pilot Officer Oram ordered his crew to leave by parachute. At this stage the crew would have descended in the sea. Fully aware that some of his comrades were unable to swim Pilot Officer Oram turned so that the drop could be made over land behind our lines. This done he again headed for the sea. Displaying comone he again headed for the sea. Displaying complete disregard for his own welfare he remained at the controls until he was satisfied that the burning aircraft was clear of a concentration of shipping before he jumped himself. A few seconds later the aircraft plunged into the sea well clear of the ships. This officer displayed skill, courage and devotion to duty of the highest order.

Pilot Officer Gordon Ridge VINCENT (Can/J.86473), R.C.A.F., 425 (R.C.A.F.) Sqn.

This officer has completed many sorties during which he has effectively attacked such enemy targets as Essen, Dusseldorf and Berlin. On one occasion whilst over Karlsruhe his aircraft commenced to ribust head to have the started by the property of the p sion whilst over Karlsruhe his aircraft commenced to vibrate badly, having been apparently struck by anti-aircraft fire. Nevertheless, Pilot Officer Vincent executed his attack and flew his aircraft to this country despite much physical discomfort.
