severed from the benefices and parishes of Workington and Saint John, Workington, and united to the benefice and parish of Harrington and (b) all that part of the parish of Saint John, Workington, which is described in Part II of the said Schedule and coloured blue on the said map shall be severed from the benefice and parish of Saint John, Working-ton, and united to the benefice and parish of Distington

Distington. "2. Upon the unions taking effect or upon the cesser of the pension of £200 per annum charged upon the benefice of Workington in favour of the Compared Compared Starley Participa Lamburgh Compared upon the benence of Workington in favour of the Reverend Canon Stanley Patricius Lamplugh Curwen (whichever shall be the later) a capital sum suffi-cient to produce an annual income of £100, being part of a larger capital sum held by us for the endowment of the benefice of Workington, shall be severed or diverted from the said benefice and shall be held by us towards the endowment of a proposed new ecclesiastical district within the said diocese to be called Saint Mary, Westfield; provided that until the said new district shall have been constituted the said annual income shall be paid by us to the diocesan board of finance of the said diocese as trustees to be applied towards the remuneration of

the curate having charge of the conventional district of Saint Mary, Westfield. "3. Upon the unions taking effect the benefice and parish of Harrington shall belong to the rural deanery of Cockermouth and Workington.

" SCHEDULE.

" Part 1.

"The area comprising:

"All those contiguous parts (coloured pink and green respectively) of the parishes of Workington and Saint John, Workington, which taken together are bounded upon the west by the Sea, upon the south and southeast by the parish of Harrington and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at Harrington Junction in the middle of the Cleator and Workington Branch of British Railways (London Midland Region) on the boun-dary which divides the parish of Harrington from the parish of Saint John, Workington, and extending thence generally westwards along the middle of the mineral railway from the said Harrington Junc-tion to its junction with the local line leading to the Workington Iron and Steel Works and then branching off and continuing westwards along the middle of the mineral railway parallel to the northern side of Poole Road to the bridge which carries the said mineral railway over the Harrington to Workington road and continuing thence south-Workington road and continuing thence soutn-westwards over the said bridge and along the middle of the mineral railway which runs south-east of the Workington Iron and Steel Works reservoir and parallel to the northwestern side of Shore Road to its junction with the main White-haven to Workington line of British Railways at a point due west of the southwestern end of the northwestern side of Shore Road and continuing thence westwards in an imaginary straight line to thence westwards in an imaginary straight line to the sea.

" Part II.

"The area comprising: "All that part (coloured blue on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Saint John, Workington, which is bounded upon the south and southeast by the parish of Distington and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line com-mencing at a point in the middle of the Whitehaven to Cockermouth Boad on the houndary which to Cockermouth Road on the boundary which divides the parish of Distington from the parish of Saint John, Workington, and extending thence northeastwards along the middle of the last mentioned road to the point opposite to the north-western end of the wall or fence forming the northeastern boundary of Lilly Hall and continuing thence southeastwards to and along the last mentioned wall or fence and then in the same direction in the same straight line to the boundary which divides the parish of Saint John, Workington, from the parish of Distington.'
