Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 26th day of July, 1957, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Salisbury (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting (1) the union of the benefice of West Lulworth and part of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes, and (2) the union of the benefice of Wool with East Burton and the remaining part of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes, all of which benefices are situate in the diocese of Salisbury.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of the benefice of West Lulworth and part of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes.*

"(1) That part of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes which coincides with the area of the parish of East Lulworth shall be severed from the said benefice and the part so severed and the benefice of West Lulworth shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of West Lulworth and East Lulworth' but the parishes of West Lulworth and East Lulworth shall continue in all respects distinct.

"(2) *Taking effect of union.*

"(i) If upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the said benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes shall be vacant the union shall take effect forthwith but if it shall then be full the union shall take effect immediately upon the next avoidance thereof.

"(ii) Upon the union taking effect the Reverend John Stone, if he is then the incumbent of the benefice of West Lulworth, shall, with his consent (which has been given to us in writing), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"(3) *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of West Lulworth shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice and the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes shall become a glebe house of the united benefice.

"(4) *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice of West Lulworth and East Lulworth shall be exercised alternately by the patron of the benefice of West Lulworth and by the patron of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes, the patron of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes having the first turn of presentation to be made to the united benefice after the union.

"2. *Union of the benefice of Wool with East Burton and part of the united benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes.*

"(1) Upon the taking effect of the union recommended and proposed in clause 1 of this Scheme, the remaining part, that is to say the part which coincides with the area of the parish of Coombe Keynes, of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes and the benefice of Wool with East Burton shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Wool, East Burton and Coombe Keynes' but the parish of Wool with East Burton and the parish of Coombe Keynes shall continue in all respects distinct, and the Reverend Frank Cedric Whitter, if he is then incumbent of the benefice of Wool with East Burton, shall, with his consent (which has been given to us in writing), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"(2) *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Wool with East Burton shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"(3) *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect, in every series of four successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the united benefice the patron of the benefice of Wool with East Burton shall have the first, second and fourth turns and the patron of the benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes shall have the third turn.

"3. *Distribution of Endowments.*

Upon the taking effect of the unions hereinbefore recommended and proposed the endowments and property belonging to the said benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes shall be divided and distributed as follows, that is to say, a capital sum sufficient to produce an annual income of £1352s. 8d., being part of a larger capital sum held by us for the said benefice shall be assigned and annexed to the united benefice of West Lulworth and East Lulworth and all other the endowments and property (except the hereinbefore mentioned parsonage house) belonging to the said benefice of East Lulworth with Coombe Keynes shall be assigned and annexed to the united benefice of Wool, East Burton and Coombe Keynes."

And Whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Brandon Ferry with Wangford and the benefice of Santon with Santon Downham shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls
