## TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England on Friday, the 22nd August, 1958, at 1 p.m. for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the National Loans Act, 1939, to the amount of £250,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000 or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 25th August, 1958, to Saturday, the 30th August, 1958, inclusive, and will be due 91 days after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. Notification will be sent by post on the same day as Tenders are received, to the persons whose Tenders are accepted in whole or in part, and payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday, 11.30 a.m.) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

## HOMICIDE ACT, 1957.

An Inquisition taken for our Sovereign Lady the Queen at Her Majesty's Prison, Winson Green, situate in the City of Birmingham, in the County of Warwick, this 12th day of August in the seventh year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Elizabeth the Second, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1958 (there having appeared to me to be reason for summoning a Jury) before me, George Billington, Esquire, Coroner of our said Sovereign Lady the Queen for the said City, on view (by me) of the body of Matthew Kavanagh then and there lying dead upon the oath of the several Jurors whose names are hereunder subscribed, and seals affixed, being good and lawful men of the said City, duly chosen, who being then and there duly sworn and charged to inquire for our said Lady the Queen, when, where, how, and by what means the said Matthew Kavanagh came to his death. Do upon their oaths present and say that the said Matthew Kavanagh was a prisoner in the said prison, having been convicted of capital murder and sentenced to death for that offence at the last Assizes for the County of Warwickshire.

And that the aforesaid Judgement of Death was on this 12th day of August, 1958, and within the prison aforesaid duly executed and carried into effect by the hanging of the said Matthew Kavanagh by the neck until he died;

And the Jurors aforesaid, upon their oaths aforesaid, do further say that this Inquest is duly held by the Coroner of the Jurisdiction to which the said prison belongs within twenty-four hours after the execution; and that the body of the said Matthew Kavanagh on view of which this Inquest is held is the identical body of the said Matthew Kavanagh who was so convicted and executed for the offence aforesaid.

And the Jurors aforesaid upon their oaths aforesaid, do further say, that the said Matthew Kavanagh at the time of his death, was a male person, of the age of 32 years, and was a single man, a press operator, a native of Eire.

In witness whereof, as well the Coroner as the Jurors, have to this Inquisition set their hands and seals, the day and year first above written (this 12th day of August, 1958) and also to a duplicate hereof.

Here follow the signatures of the coroner and jurors.
