Berlin, Aug. 29. N. S.

THE King of Prussia came hither Yesterday from Potsdam, with the whole Court, and din'd in Publick; after which his Majesty went to Charlottenberg, having, before his Departure, appointed Monsieur Sibourg to be Master of the Horse. Monsieur Fabricius, Envoy from the Elector of Hanover to the King of Poland, arriv'd here some time since, and proceeded from hence, on Tuesday last, to the Saxon Army. Monsieur Wyberg, formerly Envoy from the King of Denmark to the Imperial Court, arriv'd here likewise the beginning of this Week from Hamburg, and designs to depart in a few days for Vienna, where he is appointed to reside with the same Character. Our Letters from Strélitz, of the Twenty-sixth Instant, bring an Account, that a Detachment of eight Hundred Men, of the Saxon Army, had surpriz'd a small Town in the Swedish Pomerania, call'd Tréploy; and that the whole Army was to decamp the same day those Letters are dated, and march directly to the said Place.

Vienna, Aug. 22. N. S. The Accounts we have receiv'd of the late Action between the Turks and Muscovites, continue to vary. Our Letters from Transilvania say in general, that the Turks, who at first magnify'd their Victory with much Assurance, begin to talk of it with a great deal of Modesty: They own, that the Grand Visier is march'd back with his Army to Bender, and that the Czar of Muscovy is return'd towards the Confines of Poland. We have Letters dated the Fifth Instant, from the Governor of Lemberg, wherein he gives the following Account of the Action: That Twenty-five thousand Turks, being join'd by a Body of Tartars; had, under favour of very rainy Weather, attack'd an advanc'd Body of Fifteen thousand Muscovites, by whom they were Twice repuls'd; but, that the Turks making a Third Onset with great Vigour, the Muscovites, who had defended themselves with much Gallantry, whilst their Arms and Ammunition were dry, being extremely fatigu'd, were oblig'd to retire; which they did in very good Order, tho' follow'd by the Enemy, till they were reinforc'd in their Retreat by another Body of Ten thousand Men; whereupon the Muscovites made a Stand, and in their turn attack'd the Turks, who immediately gave ground, and abandon'd the Pursuit. These Letters say, that the Grand Visier was not present in the Action; and that the Czar of Muscovy, being in want of Provisions, and having all his Convoys from Poland intercepted by the Tartars, was oblig'd to draw back towards the Neister: This Account makes no mention of the Peace, which, however, is confirm'd, by our Advices from Poland, and by Letters from the Prince of Wallachia.

From the Camp before Bouchain, Sept. 3. N. S. The Enemy having formed a Design to make themselves Masters of our Communication over the Morafs near Hordain, Two thousand Grenadiers, sustain'd by a Thousand Fusiliers, were detach'd the Thirty-first past, about Midnight, in order to possess themselves of the Village of Hordain; and at

the same time another Detachment of Fifteen hundred Grenadiers, with a Brigade of Foot to sustain them from Wavrechin, were to attack the Fort of Fascines we have in the middle of the Morafs: The first Detachment made a Bridge over the Schelde, near Estrun, without being perceived by a Guard of Two hundred Men, Commanded by a Lieutenant-Colonel, who were posted in a Redoubt on the Bank of that River, to prevent the Enemies laying any Bridges, or passing in the Night; however, they were discovered before they could get to Hordain; and the four Battalions encamp'd in that Village, were, by the Care and Diligence of Lieutenant-General Finck, who Commanded there, put into so good Order to receive them, that they were soon repuls'd with Loss, and oblig'd to re-pass the Schelde. Major General Borg of the Prussian Troops mistaking a small Party of the Enemies Troops for our own, had the Misfortune to be made Prisoner, and carried off. As the Attempt upon Hordain was made in order to favour That upon our Communication, the Troops from Wavrechin at the same time attack'd the Fort in the Morafs with great Vigour; but by the good Measures we had taken for its Defence, they found such a gallant Resistance, that they were beaten off, and retired in great Confusion to Wavrechin. To prevent the like Attempts for the future, his Grace the Duke of Marlborough order'd an Intrenchment to be drawn from Hordain to Juvy, which was finish'd Yesterday, and Twenty Battalions of the Second Line are encamp'd behind it. Yesterday the Enemy made Three Batteries of Cannon, and One of Mortars, near Wavrechin, and began in the Evening to fire with Three Mortars, and Five Pieces of Cannon, on our Communication in the Morafs, and our Approaches on that side; but have hitherto done us no manner of Damage, the Distance being so great, that most of their Bombs break before they fall. They continue making a great number of Fascines at Wavrechin, and give out that they intend to make a second Attack upon our Communication in the Morafs; for the securing of which, his Grace has made such Dispositions, that we are very little apprehensive of what they can do on that side. Our Approaches to the Town are carried on with all possible Vigour: We are now making Bridges over the Ditch of the Lower Town, and have made our selves Masters of the Fleches the Enemy had made to cover the Works of the Upper Town. We carried that on the Right by Assault, and the Enemy quitted the two others on the Left; and we are now making the necessary Disposition for attacking the Counterscarp.

Hague, Sept. 4. N. S. Yesterday a Courier arriv'd here from Leewarden, and having signify'd to the States that the Princess Dowager of Brize was happily deliver'd of a Prince, he proceeded from hence to the Army. The same day Count Sinzendorf receiv'd an Expres from Vienna, with Orders to repair forthwith to Francfort, where he is to continue during the Election of an Emperor; and Count Goes is speedily expected at this Place, being to reside here on behalf of the Austrian Court,

in the Absence of that Minister. This day Baron Heems was in Conference with the Penitentiary, and proper Measures have been taken for the effectual supplying the Troops in Brabant, Flanders, and on the Meuse, with Forage in their Winter Quarters. Our Advices from different Parts continue to contradict each other on the Circumstances and Event of the Action, which has pass'd between the Turks and Muscovites. Letters from Paris of the Twenty eighth of the last Month, advise, that on the Saturday before, a great Council was held at Fontainebleau, immediately after which an Exprez was sent from thence to the Army in Flanders. Monsieur Reilly, 2 Lieutenant-General in the French Service, is arriv'd at Court upon some Differences that lately happen'd between Marechal Villars and that Officer. The Command of Captain of the Guards being vacant, by the Death of the late Marechal Boufflers, the Marechals de Tesse, Villars, Berwick, and Luxemburgh, are Competitors for it. They write from Hamburgh of the first Instant; that the Sickness continues to rage with much violence at Copenhagen, carrying off great numbers of the Inhabitants every Week. The Danish Army having been Cannonaded by the Swedes in Damgarden, without any loss on their side, the Danes prepar'd to attack the Place, according to the Resolutions taken on the Twenty fifth past, and having soon finish'd their Batteries, and made a Morass, which lay between them and their Enemy, passable by a great number of Fascines, they fir'd upon the Town with so good Success, that the Forts being in a manner demolish'd, the Swedes were oblig'd to abandon them, having first broke down the Bridges, which the Danes are repairing, in order to pass the Army over.
