Dresden, January 15. N. S.

THE King of Poland came hither this Morning, accompanied by the Count de Lagnasco, in the same Chaise, and one single Page that attended his Majesty on Horseback: The Thaw surpriz'd the rest of his Retinue, who were upon the Road from Berlin, so that their Sledges were render'd useless, and they are detain'd till the Arrival of Coaches to pursue the rest of their Journey. Count Fleming designs to stay some few Days longer at the Court of Berlin. Mr. Scott, Envoy from Her Majesty of Great Britain to King Augustus, is arriv'd here.

Dresden, January 19. N. S. The Bishop of Cujava has fully adjust'd the Differences that have continued a great while between the Great-General and the Under-General of Poland, and they have been publicly Reconcil'd in the Presence of many of the Nobility. We have Advice from Muscovy, that the General Sienieki, formerly Great Master of the Artillery of Lithuania, and afterwards taken Prisoner by the Czar, and sent into Siberia, died there on the Twentieth of November last. His Czars Majesty has sent Orders to his Ministers at Moscow, to attend him at Riga, where a Council is to be held about some important Affairs. The Hereditary Prince and Princess of Muscovy are still at Thorn, on the Vistula, and it is said, they design to pass the Winter in that City. The Muscovite Prince Dalgorouchi is now at Dresden, and desires speedily to set out for Carolsbad, to take the Benefit of those Baths for the Recovery of his Health. Upon Sunday last Mr. Scott, Envoy from Her Majesty of Great Britain, had his first private Audience of the King of Poland. His Polish Majesty, before he left the Army in Pomerania, declar'd Count Fleming, Velt-Marshal of his Saxon Troops, and has order'd Count Wackerbath to return to Vienna in the Quality of his Envoy to the Imperial Court. Letters from Lemberg in Poland, confirm that the Grand Vizier is degraded, and that the Aga of the Janizaries is made Grand Vizier for a time, and Messieurs Schappirov and Schermettow, the Muscovite Hostages, are committed to

the Seven Towers. These Letters say likewise, that the Sultan, for Reasons not yet made Publick, was much dissatisfy'd with the Tartar Cham; and, that without the powerful and frequent Instances that had been made in his Favour, that Prince would have been taken into Custody. It is said, that the Muscovites upon the Occasion of the Absence of the Cham of Tartary, had made an Incurfion into the Czerkasy, and their Calmucks into the Crim Tartary, where they had laid waste great Tracts of those Countries, and carried off many of the Inhabitants, with a considerable Booty. The Hospodar of Moldavia, has taken a Turkish General Officer and two Captains of that Nation into Custody, and sent them Prisoners to Constantinople; but it was not yet known upon what Account.

Hamburg, January 19. N. S. The Muscovite Troops which were encamp'd about Dantzick are advanc'd even to the Works and Ditches of the Town, which has caus'd so great a Consternation in the Inhabitants and Burgeses, that they all put themselves under Arms, and mounted the Posts assigned them by their Officers on the Ramparts, being universally resolv'd to endure the utmost Extremity, rather than agree to the Payment of seven hundred thousand Crowns, which the Muscovites pretend to demand of them. His Imperial Majesty has declar'd Prince Ernest de Bevem, Cousin-German to the Empress-Regent, to be Velt Marshal and Governor of Silesia. According to the last Advices from Moldavia, the King of Sweden remain'd still at Bender, without any Mention being made of his Majesty's Departure for his own Kingdom. The General Monsieur d'Urbanowitz was upon his Return from Bender, to the Troops which are posted on the Frontiers, and had receiv'd a large Sum of Money to be distributed among them, according to the Orders of his Suedish Majesty. We have Letters likewise from Dantzick which tell us, that Monsieur the Great Treasurer Prebendow had received an Express from the Great General of the Crown, of the Thirtieth past, importing, that the Grand Vizier had been
