WE humbly beg leave to acknowledge with the utmost Sense of Gratitude, Your Majesty's great Condescension, in communicating to Your Parliament the Terms upon which a General Peace may be made; whereby all Your Subjects may with the highest Satisfaction, see Your Majesty, incessantly continuing Your Tendernefs, and Care, for the Safety, Interest and Welfare of Your People, and for procuring to Your Allies, whatever is

justly due to them by Treaties, and necessary for their Security.

We are sensible that the Obligations we have all to Your Majesty for this, are beyond what is possible for Words to express, and are fully persuaded, from Your Majesty's great Wisdom and Prudence, a Peace will be speedily Settled, Glorious to Your Majesty and Your Subjects, Honourable to Your Ministers, Advantageous and Happy to Your People and Allies; and do most humbly assure Your Majesty, that on all Occasions, and to the utmost of our Powers, we will stand by Your Majesty and Your Prerogative, against all Your Enemies and Opposers at Home and Abroad.

The following Address from the City of New Sarum, was presented to Her Majesty by Robert Pitt, Esq; accompanied by several other Gentlemen of the County of Sarum, introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary St. John.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of New Sarum.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Mayor and Commonalty of the City of New Sarum, having always deeply at Heart the many Blessings we enjoy under Your Majesty's most auspicious Reign, cannot omit any Opportunity of repeating our unshaken Loyalty and Affection to Your Majesty's Royal Person and Government; as also on this occasion to express our full Joy and Satisfaction in Your Majesty's most wise and tender Care for the Good of Your own Kingdoms, the Security of the Protestant Succession in the House of Hanover, and restoring Peace to Europe.

Your Majesty has been pleased to give us a convincing Instance hereof, in Your most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament, wherein Your Majesty in Your great Goodness, has condescended to communicate to Your People the Terms on which a General Peace may be made, not only Safe and Honourable to Your own Kingdoms, but consistent also with the Common Security of Your Allies, and with what is due to them by Treaties.

May Your Majesty's pious Endeavours prove Effectual, towards perfecting so great and good a Work, to the Confusion of all secret Cabals and wicked Artifices to obstruct the same, that we and all Your Majesty's good Subjects, being blessed with Peace Abroad, and free from all Dregs of Faction at home, may long enjoy the Blessings of Your Majesty's happy and peaceable Reign over us.

All which Addresses Her Majesty receiv'd very Graciously.

Coire, June 5. N. S. Both Parties in the War of Switzerland, are so furiously incensed against each other, that the Prisoners are not treated so well as they would be by any other Enemy. This State in Compliance with the Demands made to them by the Cantons of Zurich and Bern, by Virtue of their ancient Alliances, have granted them the Succours which they had stipulated for amounting to Sixteen hundred Men, and the Officers are named who are

to Command them. The Baron de Greuth, who is the Emperor's Envoy to this State, has receiv'd an Account that Roses in Catalonia, is invest'd by Sea and Land.

Vienna, June 11. N. S. The Empress Amelia returned hither on Wednesday last in the Evening, from Her Journey to Presbourg. From whence, we have Advice that the Emperor has been Congratulated upon his Coronation as King of Hungary, by the Envoy's of Holland, Hanover, Parma, Lorrain, and other Foreign Ministers. We have received these farther Particulars from thence, concerning his Imperial Majesty's Reception there, that the Emperor having lodg'd on the Eighteenth at Petronel in a Castle belonging to Count Thau, made his Entrance the next Day into Presburg, in the Hungarian Habit; that upon the Twentieth there was a General Diet of all the Senators and Members of the Kingdom, who were assembled in a much fuller number than ever they had been heretofore, because all the Members of Hungary from as far as Belgrade, had never univerally consented to the Coronation of any of their Kings, as they have done at present. The Emperor's Guards consisted of two Regiments of Imperial Horse, and two of Foot, and about Noon the Senators and Deputies went to the Castle, where the Emperor being seated on the Throne, the Chancellor of Hungary being on his right Hand, pronounced a Speech to him in the Hungarian Language. To which his Majesty gave them a Gracious Answer in Latin, and the Cardinal of Saxe Zeits, as Primate of Hungary, assisted by the Count Palatin Esterhazy, on the left hand of the Emperor, in a Latin Speech, returned thanks to his Majesty, in the name of the whole Kingdom; after which all the Senators and the Deputies had the Honour of kissing his Majesty's Hand. The Diet have continued their Sessions and Deliberations ever since the Coronation; and the Emperor has given a very favourable Answer to the Deputies of the Protestants, so that it is hoped it will have a happy Conclusion. The time for the Emperors return to Vienna, is not as yet fixed, but it is said, that it will be within Fifteen Days: In the mean time the General Count Thau is upon his departure for Italy, to take upon him the Command of the Imperial Troops in Piedmont, and the Sieur Fozner, the Emperor's chief Interpreter at the Ottoman Port, who came lately from Constantinople, is to return thither with several Magnificent Presents for the Sultan and his chief Ministers, which are to be delivered to them when the Sieur Talman, the Imperial Resident at that Court, shall by a special Commission, notify to the Grand Signior, the Elevation of his Majesty to the Imperial Dignity,

Utrecht, June 28. N. S. On Saturday the Twenty fifth Instant arrived here a Courier from the Court of France, who brought Advice of the Death of the Duke of Vendome in Spain; as likewise that the Person who has pretended to disturb the Settlement of the Protestant succession of the House of Hanover, has been obliged to leave St. Germain, and was already on his way to Lorrain. On Saturday the 26th, Monsieur Marshal de Biberstein, one of the Plenipotentiaries on the part of the King of Prussia, who has been lately at the Hague, returned from thence, accompanied by Monsieur Hymen, Envoy Extraordinary from that Prince to the States-General. Yesterday in the Morning a Conference was held as usual in the Town-house, among the Ministers of the Allies residing here, wherein the Lord Privy-Seal, in a solemn manner, acquainted them with the Offers Her Majesty had prevailed on France to make the Allies. Monsieur Buys, one of the Plenipotentiaries of the States, is gone for a few Days to Amsterdam, and Yesterday in the Afternoon, the Lord Privy Seal was in Conference with the rest of those Ministers, and laid before

them the Necessity there was of a Suspension of Arms. This Day the same Ministers have been in Conference with the Lord Privy-Seal, at his Lordship's House.

Whereas on the 8th of the last Month at Night, some of the Riding Officers of the Customs being on their Duty in Hyth District on the Coast of Kent, were assaulted by 12 Persons unknown, supposed to be Romney-Marsh Owlers, and one of the said Officer's Servants was so desperately beaten, that he died thereof in few Days after, as hath been found by the Coroner's Inquest: For the better Discovery of the Murderers, Her Majesty is graciously pleased to promise Her most gracious Pardon to any one of the Persons concerned in this Fact, who will discover any two or more of his Accomplices, so as they may be apprehended, and prosecuted according to Law. And as a further Encouragement, a Reward of One Hundred Pounds will be given to such Person, or any other whatever making such Discovery, to be paid upon Conviction of the Offenders. DARTMOUTH.
