The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS Her Majesty, as well by Her Royal Proclamation as by several Orders in Council, was pleased to Direct, That all Ships and Vessels coming from the Baltick Sea, and several other Places therein mentioned to be Infected with the Plague, should be obliged to perform their Quarentine, in order to prevent any Contagious Distemper that might be brought from such Places into this Kingdom: And Her Majesty being inform'd by a Memorial from the Count de Gillenborg, Minister from the King of Sweden, this Day presented and read at the Board, That there is not at present, nor hath been at least for these Twelve Months past, any Contagious Distemper in that Kingdom, and therefore humbly desiring, That the Ships coming from thence may be permitted to enter into any Her Majesty's Harbours, and Unlade without any Hindrance or Molestation; which being taken into Consideration, Her Majesty, with the Advice of Her Privy-Council, is graciously pleased to Order, as it is hereby Order'd, That, notwithstanding any former Order in this Case, all Ships and Vessels coming directly from the Kingdom of Sweden, upon the Master or other Person's taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel making Oath before the Custom-house Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that they did not touch at any Infected Place, nor with any Infected Ship during the Voyage, be exempted from performing Quarentine, and forthwith permitted to discharge their Ladings: And the Right Hon. the Lord High Treasurer of Great Britain, and the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

To the QUEEN'S most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Clergy and Grand Jury, &c. of the County of *Cork*, at the General Quarter Sessions held for the said County at *Bandonbridge*, on the 12th of *January*, 1713-14.

Dread Sovereign,

**W**E Your Majesty's Subjects of this County, most humbly beg Leave to approach Your Royal Person, and to Congratulate You on the safe and honourable Peace which Your Majesty's unwearied Endeavours have obtained for the Relief and Comfort of Your People.

We can't but with Grief and great Concern take notice, that the unhappy and fatal Divisions which reign'd and were fomented some Tears past, do yet continue in this Kingdom, notwithstanding the indefatigable Zeal and Application of the Right Hon. Sir *Constantine Phipps*, Lord High Chancellor, and Your other Excellent Ministers, to the contrary.

We can't but join, with great Pleasure and Satisfaction, Your Majesty's most loyal Lords in Parliament, and Your faithful Clergy in Convocation

assembled, in their dutiful and humble Request to continue Your Royal Countenance and Favours to that Great Minister, whose impartial Justice, consummate Abilities, and unbiass'd Affection to the Constitution in Church and State, are equal to these great Trusts in which Your Majesty's unerring Wisdom, for the Safety and Honour of Your Majesty's Interests, and the common Good of Your People, has placed him.

As we are thankful to GOD for the great Blessings of the late happy Revolution, and firmly resolv'd to stand by the Succession in the illustrious House of Hanover; so we do not think the remembrance of the One, or the prospect of the Other, any Motives to abate our Duty and Allegiance which is at present only owing to Your Majesty, and are sorry any Thing or Practice, in this Kingdom, should be observ'd, which might have any other Views: And we hope that neither Poperie or Schism can prevail with any of Your Majesty's Subjects to abett or assist any Pretender to Your Majesty's Crown and Kingdoms, or to disturb or elude Your legal Successors.

May Your Majesty's long and flourishing Reign outlive all Faction and Sedition; and may the People of these Nations gratefully and unanimously own themselves happy under the Conduct and Administration of the best of Princes.

*Constantinople*, December 29. N. S. On the 4th Instant the Grand Signior arrived from *Adrianople* at a Village near this Place, and on the 7th he made his publick Entry here with the usual Magnificence. He was follow'd soon after by the *Mulcovite* and *Polish* Ambassadors. On the 10th Monsieur *Fleischman*, the Emperor's Minister, came hither likewise, and is lodg'd in the *Pera*. The King of *Sweden* continues still at *Demir-Tocca*, where Monsieur *Funck*, his Majesty's Envoy to the Port, is lately dead. The Commissioners appointed to regulate the Frontiers between the *Ottoman Empire* and *Muscovy*, are upon their departure from hence for that purpose. The Conferences are to begin with the Ambassadors of *Poland*, as soon as the *Turkish* and *Tartarian* Ministers return from that Kingdom. The Insurrection of the *Bacha's* in *Asia*, occasions great Uneasiness at this Court, and it is reported that there is another Rebellion broke out in *Arabia*. *Iffuf Bacha*, formerly Grand Vizir, has been Strangled in the *Isle of Rhodes*, and his Estate Confiscated. *Ali Bacha*, Son of *Cara Mustafa*, who commanded at the Siege of *Vienna*, is removed from his Government of *Adrianople*, and committed to Prison. *Asri Mehemet Bacha* is fitting out several Men of War, but it is not yet known upon what Design.

*Turin*, *January* 13. N. S. The Dutchess Dowager of *Savoy* has sent a Compliment to the King and Queen of *Sicily* upon their Coronation, by a Gentleman of her Household, who set out from hence two Days ago. It is said, his Majesty intends to return to this Place within two Months. He has sent Directions for Regulating the Household of the Princes, by which the Count de *Profane* is constituted High Steward, the Marquis de *Jane* Great Chamberlain, and the Count de *Bourg* Master of the Horse. We have received advice from *Palermo*, that the Ambassador of *Malta* had made his publick Entry into that City, accompanied by Two hundred Knights of the same Order. The Marquis de *los Balbases*, late Vice-Roy of the Kingdom, was still detain'd

*Haffhausen, February 1. N. S.* We have received advice, that the Cantons of Zurich and Berne have consented to demit from the Demand they had made concerning the Expences of the War by the Abbot of St. Gall, and have sent Instructions and full Powers to their Deputies at Roschach, to conclude a Treaty of Peace upon such Terms as they shall think proper. Since the most material Difference that hath hitherto retarded the Negotiations is ended, and the Abbot hath seem'd willing to comply with all other Points insisted on by the two Cantons, it is not doubted but we shall hear very speedily of the Conclusion of the Peace. The Catholick Cantons have printed and dispers'd the Treaty of Alliance made in the Year 1583, and renew'd in their last Diet at Lucern. It is said, they intend to hold another particular Diet at Soleure.

*Deale, February 25.* There are now in the Downs Her Majesty's Ships the Fowy, Charles-Gally, Dolphin, Maidstone, Lowestoff and the Basilisk-Bomb; as also the following Merchant Ships, viz. the St. George bound for the East Indies; the Laffels, Mary and Elizabeth, Hopewell, Tiberton, London, Robert and Edward, Benjamin and Mary, Jeremiah and Anne, Crown, Speedwell, Edward and Mary, and the Canewood for Barbadoes; the Guilford, Anne-Gally, and the Loyal Jane for Jamaica; the Bridget, New Hopewell and the Hopewell for Antegoa; the Lambert and the Ruby for St. Christophers; the Anne and the Samuel for Nevis; the Sampson, Cecilia and the Neptune for the Isle of May; the Carter-Frigat, Spot-wood, Susan and Rebecca, Concord, and the Joanna and Anne for Virginia; the Florida, John and Thomas, and the Hamilton for Guinea; the Robert and Jane, Union, Blenheim, Christian, St. Martin, Margaret, and the Britannia for St. Ubes; the George, and the Queen-Anne for Madera; the William and Anne, and the Loyal Catherine for Oporto; the Prince Frederick for Carolina; the Kent for the Streights; the Conqueror for Newfoundland; and the Recovery, and the Loretto for Ireland. Two Days ago came in the Catherine from Leghorn.
