Venice, June 15. N. S.

**T**HE Prince d'Elseuf is arrived here from Naples. Prince Hercolani, the Imperial Ambassador, who had his Audience of Leave of the Senate some time ago, is gone to Bologna, from whence he intends to return very soon to Vienna. Count Colloredo, his Successor, is expected here about the beginning of the next Month. On the 5th Instant an Earthquake was felt here, but it did no manner of Damage. All the Passages into the Territories of this State were opened on the 10th, by order of the Magistrate of Health. The Palisadoes have been taken away, and the Noblemen, who guarded the Frontiers, are return'd to this City. They write from Rome, that the Pope had held a Consistory, in which several Bishops were proposed, and Cardinal Piazza was declared Legat of Ferrara. The Marquis de Prie, who had resided for some Years at that Place in Quality of Ambassador of his Imperial Majesty, was set out from thence in order to return home. The Queen-Dowager of Poland was preparing to go to France, and had taken leave of the Pope, who had made her several Presents of a considerable Value. Letters from Naples bring an Account, that an Edict had been publish'd, forbidding the Exportation of Corn from thence. The Vice-Roy had given Orders to have all the Castles well provided with Ammunition and warlike Stores. Several Pieces of Cannon were planted on the Mole, as also on the Batteries towards the Sea, and Preparations were making for a vigorous Defence, in case any Foreign Power should attempt to make a Descent into the Kingdom. On the 5th Instant *Te Deum* was sung in the Presence of the Vice-Roy, for the Conclusion of the Treaty of Peace between the Emperor and France, and the People gave all possible Demonstrations of their Joy upon that occasion.

*Berlin, June 19. N. S.* Yesterday the King, accompanied by the Prince of Anhalt, came hither from Spandau, where he review'd the Battalion of Swendi, which is in Garrison at that Place. Some Days ago the Princess Sophia Charlotta Albertina, youngest Daughter of his Majesty, died here, and was buried privately. On the 16th Monsieur Schulembourg, Chamberlain of the Elector of Hanover, arrived here, and notified the Death of the Electress Dowager. This Day the Court went into Mourning, and their Majesties received the Compliments of Condolence of the Foreign Ministers upon that Occasion. Baron Spar is returned hither from Hamburg, and holds frequent Conferences with the Ministers of Great Britain, France, Prussia, and Holstein. Monsieur Lintelo, Envoy of the States-General, set out from hence a few Days ago for the Hague.

*Hanover, June 25. N. S.* On the 23d the Elector, the Electoral Prince and Princess set out for Pirmond, where they intend to continue three Weeks, and to drink the Waters of that Place.

Baron Bothmar, Envoy Extraordinary of his Electoral Highness at the Hague, is appointed to go to Great Britain, to notify the Death of the Electress Dowager to Her Majesty. They write from Brunswick, that the Counts Flemming and Wackerbart, were gone suddenly from thence to Dresden, having received Orders from King Augustus, their Master, to that purpose, at which the Plenipotentiaries of the other Princes seem'd very much surprized. It is said Count Wackerbart is to return to Vienna. We are inform'd, that the Emperor hath sent a Body of Troops towards the Frontiers of Poland, but it is not yet known for what Design. The King of Denmark is arrived at Gottorp.

*Hamburg, June 26. N. S.* We are inform'd, that the Ministers assembled at Brunswick, have agreed to leave that Place for a Month, and Count Schonborn, first Plenipotentiary of his Imperial Majesty, is expected here in a few Days. Colonel Meyer, Envoy of Denmark to King Augustus, set out from Dresden on the 20th, in order to return home. Three Regiments of Imperial Horse are upon their March towards the Maine, and are to encamp near Reinfels; upon which, the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel has reinforced the Garrison of that Place. It is said the King of Prussia intends to go to Cassel, before he sets out for Pomerania. A Swedish Privateer of Helgeland has lately taken three Danish Vessels richly laden from Bergues. Letters from Vienna bring an account, that Monsieur Sternhock was gone to the Court at Laxembourg, to desire Passports for the King of Sweden, his Master, to pass through Hungary. The Polish Troops that were commanded by the Palatin Kiovia, have submitted themselves to the Great General, and are join'd to the Army of the Crown.

*Brussels, June 28. N. S.* Monsieur Gossinga, one of the Ambassadors Extraordinary from the States General to the most Christian King, arrived here two Days ago from Paris, and to morrow he intends to proceed on his Journey to the Hague. Monsieur Pesters, the Dutch Intendant in Flanders, came hither at the same time from Aix la Chapelle, and will set out very soon for Ypres, in order to meet the Deputies sent from Holland to visit the Frontier Places on that side. It is said, the Imperial Troops encamped at Neweid near Coblentz, amount to Ten thousand Men, and they are to be reinforced in a short time by some Regiments that are coming down the Rhine.

*Hague, June 29. N. S.* On the 27th Instant we receiv'd Advice from Utrecht, that  
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the Treaties of Peace and Commerce between his Catholick Majesty and this Republick was Sign'd the Night before at the Earl of Strafford's House. Yesterday his Excellency returned hither from Utrecht, and this Morning he was in Conference with Monsieur de Chateaufeuf, Ambassador of France. Baron Bothmar, Envoy of the Elector of Brunswick, has received Orders to go to Great Britain, and intends to embark accordingly within a few Days. The Duke of Wolfenbuttel is gone from hence, in order to return into his own Dominions.
