AN Expreſs having brought the News of the Deceas'd of our late Sovereign Lady Queen Anne, of bleſſed Memory; the High and Mighty Prince George, Elector of Brunſwick-Lunenburg, was this Day Proclaim'd at the Market-Croſs of this City, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland. At which Ceremony aſſiſted a great many of the Nobility and Gentry of this Country, who happen'd to be in Town.

Whereas it hath pleas'd Almighty GOD, to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lady Queen Anne, of Bleſſed Memory; by whoſe Deceas'd the Imperial Crowns of Great Britain, France and Ireland, are Solely and Rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince George Elector of Brunſwick-Lunenburg; And whereas the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of the Realm, Aſſiſted with thoſe of Her late Maſteſty's Privy-Council, with Numbers of other Principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of London, did by a Proclamation, given at St. James's the Firſt Day of August One Thouſand Seven Hundred and Fourteen, Publish and Proclaim, That the High and Mighty Prince George, Elector of Brunſwick-Lunenburg, is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign, of Happy Memory, become our only Lawful and Rightful Liege Lord, George, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. And whereas, in Obedience to an Order of the Lords of His Maſteſty's moſt Honourable Privy-Council, a Copy of the ſaid Proclamation has been ſent, to the Lord Provost of Edinburgh, in Order to Proclaim his Royal Maſteſty; Therefore, We the Lord Provost, Magiſtrates and Town Council of Edinburgh, being Aſſiſted with Numbers of Noblemen and other Principal Gentlemen of Quality, do now, with one full Voice and Conſent of Tongue and Heart, Publish and Proclaim, That the High and Mighty Prince George, Elector of Brunſwick-Lunenburg, is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign, of Happy Memory, become our only Lawful and Rightful Liege Lord, George, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. To whom we do Acknowledge all Faith and conſtant Obedience, with all hearty and humble Affection: Beſeeching GOD, by whom Kings and Queens do Reign, to Bleſs the Royal King George with Long and Happy Years to Reign over us.

Venice, July 27. N. S. Signor Deſino, Provostor General of the Sea, hath had his Audience of Leave of the Senate, and will Embark in a Day or two for the Levant. Several Vessels are ready to set Sail at the same time, with some Troops on Board, as also a large quantity of Ammunition and Provisions. A Contagious Distemper is again broke out among the Cattle hereabouts. They write from Rome, that on the 17th Instant a Courier arrived there from Madrid, with a Commission from the King of Spain to Cardinal Acquiviva to marry, in his Majesty's Name, the Princess of Parma, only Child of the Duke, and afterwards to accompany her to Final, where she is to embark for Marseilles, and from thence she will pursue her Journey by Land to Madrid. On the 18th the Cardinal had a long Audience of the Pope. He was afterwards for some time with Cardinal Albani, and the next Day he set out for Parma. Count Galas, Ambassador of his Imperial Majesty, had been in Conference with the Cardinals Paulucci and Albani, after which he dispatch'd an Expreſs to the Court of Vienna. We have receiv'd advice, that his Sicilian Majesty, who continues still at Messina, hath ordered some new Regiments to be rais'd there, and it is said they will be sent into Piedmont to replace the like Number of Troops which are to come from thence into Sicily, in order to reinforce the Garrisons of the Places in that Kingdom.

Paris, August 14. N. S. On the 12th an Expreſs from Monsieur d'Ilberville, his Majesty's Envoy at the Court of Great Britain, arrived at Versailles, with an account, that the Queen had been seized with an Apoplexy, and that Her Life was despair'd of. They write from Baden, that the Abbot Passioneri was come to that Place with a Commission from the Pope, and had visited the Imperial and French Ministers. We have received advice, that the Marquis de Mary was set sail from Marseilles with a Fleet laden with Ammunition and Provisions for the Camp before Barcelona. We are informed from thence, that on the 30th past Marshal Berwick made himself Master of the Covered way without resistance.

Hague, August 17. N. S. On the 13th a Messenger arrived here from London with Dispatches for the Earl of Strafford, and immediately went on to Utrecht, where his Excellency was gone to confer with the Plenipotentiaries of Spain and Portugal, upon the Subject of the Treaty of Peace still depending between those two Crowns. The same Night Mr. Craggs passed through this Place in his way to Hanover, and the next Day Monsieur Godike, Secretary of Baron Bothmar, arrived here with the melancholy News of the Death of Her late Majesty Queen Anne. He also brought an account, that the most High and Mighty Prince George, Elector of Brunſwick-Lunenburg, had been Proclaim'd King of Great Britain. On the 14th, the Earl of Strafford came from Utrecht, and immediately after his return, he had a long Conference with Monsieur Heinsius, the Great Pensionary. The next Day his Excellency had another with the Deputies of the States-General, upon the Subject of their Engagements in relation to the Protestant Succession, to which the States have already return'd him a very agreeable Answer. On the 15th the Earl of Dorset passed thro' this



his way to Hanover, and yesterday Major Wade was sent thither by the Earl of Stafford, with some Dispatches for the King. Monsieur van Borfelle, of the States-General to the Court of Great Britain, received Orders to return immediately to London, and to embark with the first fair Wind.

August 7. On Thursday last His Majesty King George, in pursuance of an Order of the Privy Council, was proclaimed by the Right Hon. the Earl of Northampton, Countable of the Tower of London, and Lord Lieutenant of the Hamlets thereunto belonging, on the Parade, Tower-hill, White-chappel, Spittle-fields, Shadwell, and Ratcliff Cross, the accustomed Places within his Lordship's Jurisdiction, being attended by the Lieutenant and all the other Officers of the said Tower; together with the Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and principal Gentry in their Coaches and on Horseback, the Leet-Jury, Wardens, and Peace-Officers of the Liberty and Hamlets being likewise assisting. The concourse of People on this solemn Occasion was very great, all expressing their hearty Joy and Affection to his sacred Majesty with the loudest Acclamations; the Tower Guns round the Ramparts were discharged and the Standard display'd, Bonfires and Illuminations were made in the Evening at the Places aforesaid, with all imaginable demonstrations of Joy and Satisfaction.

St. James's, August 7. Their Excellencies the Lords Justices and the Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council having commanded, That all Governors of Forts and Garrisons, and Officers of the Army in Ireland, do immediately repair to their Posts: All Persons having Military Offices and Employments in that Kingdom, are hereby required to take notice of this Order, and to repair their Posts without loss of Time, as they will answer the contrary.

His Grace the Lord High Treasurer of Great Britain is pleas'd to declare, That in case the whole Sum of 1,400,000 l. should not be advanced upon the Lottery-Act lately pass'd in Parliament, so that there should be a remainder of Tickets to be brought as Many into the Exchequer: A Resolution is taken that such remaining Tickets shall not be issued from thence till the said Lottery shall have been fully drawn.

The Commissioners for managing His Majesty's Stamp Duties have thought fit to give Notice, That by a Clause in the Act of Parliament of the Twelfth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, for laying additional Duties on Soap, Paper, &c. Fol. 295 and 296, All Masters and Mistresses who have formerly omitted to pay His Majesty's Duties on Monies given, paid or contracted for with Apprentices, within the respective Times limited by the several Acts of Parliament touching those Duties, are to pay the same before the 1st of March, 1714; and that in one of those Acts there is a Penalty of 50l. (one half to the Informer) with Costs of Suit, on every Master and Mistress who shall not pay the said Duties within the respective Times limited for that purpose. And that by the first Act the Clerk or Apprentice is made incapable of exercising the intended Trade or Employment, or of being Free of any City, Corporation or Company, if the Duties be not paid in due time, and the Indentures and Contracts are also in such Case void; the Times limited by the first Act, for Payment of those Duties, are within one Month after the Dates of such Indentures or Contracts as are executed within the Limits of the Bills or Mortality, and within two Months after the Dates of such Indentures or Contracts as are executed elsewhere. Vide Act for Duties on Candles, and Monies given with Clerks and Apprentices, 8 Anne, Fol. 175, &c.
