Count Galas, Ambaffador of his Imperial Majeffy, had been in Conference with the Cardinals Paulucci and Albani, after which he difpatch'd an Express to the Court of Vienna. We have receiv'd advice, that his Sicilian Majeffy, who continues fiill at Mellina, hath ordered fome new Regiments to be raifed there, and it is faid they will be fent into Pied-mont to replace the like Number of Troops which are to come from thence into Sicily, in order to reinforce the Garrifons of the Places in that Kingdom. > Paris, Auguff 14.
