Falmouths Finuary 4.

Everal ships are come into this Harbor, the Richard and John of London, bound for the Barbados, the Sumpson and Bombay-Mer-chant, bound for the East Indies; and the Humphrey and Elizabeth, the Europe and East Indea Merchant bound for the same parts, are

expected here to night.

Lymc, January 7. A small vessel belonging to Bridgmater, loaden with Salt and Wines from Rochel, was by contrary winds forced into this Port; the Mafter fays, That having been almost a month at fea in very foul weather, he put into Breft for provisions, and that they have thereupon the Stocks 12 great ships, on which they work very hard; That the biggest of them is to have Four Decks, to car-TY 130 Guns, and will be called the Wonder of the World. He further says, That about Three weeks since, a very considerable Fleet of English, French, and Dutch Merchant men, to the number of 130 fail laden with Salt, Wines, and Brandy from Burdeaux and other French Ports, fet out from Camerett, and by a violent Northwest wind, were most of the sidriven on shoar, and 60 of them cast away: but hereof we hope fuddainly to have a better account.

Hamborough, Dec. 30. The last Letters from Warfaw give us an account of the peaceable condition of that Kingdom; That the differences and animofities which have been so long between the Great General Sobiesky, and the Under General Demerius Wishowitsky, have by the interposition of the King and some of the chief of the Nobility, been happily composed; That the fears of a confederation of the Army are quite vanished, and they marched into the winter Quarters that were appointed for them. That those of Walachia and Moldavia were with a confiderable force upon the frontiers of the Ukrain and Tartary to be ready to affift the Coffacks, in case the King of Poland should march with his Army against them, as it is reported he intends to do, so soon as Two or Three months of the winter were past. From Liefland they write, That in Moscowy the troubles encrease daily; that the Court there is very much distracted to see how the Rebels grow in strength, multitudes flocking every day to rbem; and almost no way left to suppress them. They farther fay that they are on their march towards Moscow, and that they have defeated some of the Emperors forces which were fent out against zhem, but hereof are fo many various reports, that it is hard to know what to believe, till we have a more certain account thereof. Letters from Danizicklay, That the Magistrates of that Town, fear, ing some busie spirits under the pretence of Randing upon their diberties, may endeavor di-flurbances in the Government, are raising some Troops of Horse and Companies of Foot for the preventing of all fuch evil practices.

Hague, fan. 13. Here have been published Two Placaets or Ordinances of the States General of the United Provinces, bearing date the 2d of this prefent fanuary; by the one they forbid the importa-tion of Brandy and all other distilled waters, to this effect. That for several important reasons them thereunto moving; They do forbid all persons to import, or to bring into any place within their do-minions any Brandy or other distilled waters, under penalty that all persons so offending, shall forfest for every Cask of Brandy, whether the same be great or small, by them imported or received into their Cellars or Warehouses, besides confiscation of the same, 600 Gilders. They further forbid all Masters of Vessels, Carriers and others, to bring in their Vessels or Waggons any Brandy on other diflilled waters into any place within their domini-ons, under penalty of forfeiting for every Cask or Barrel of Brandy, or other distilled waters they shall to bring in. One hundred Gilders belides confifention of the same; for the payment of which, their Vessels and Waggons to be liable, or otherwise to be exemplarily punished. They forbid all Porters, Labourers and others, to be employed in unlading, carrying or receiving any fuch Brandy or distilled waters, under penalty as abovefaid. And whereas there is at present some quantity of Brandy and other distilled waters in the hands of several Merchants, they give leave for Eight Months, to ex-port, fell, or confume the fame. That after the ex-piration of the faid time, no person shall keep in his Warehouse or Cellar any such Brandy or other distilled waters, under penalty of forfeiting 600 Gilders for every Cask or Barrel of Brandy or distilled waters by him so kept or remaining, and if the said offenders be not able to pay the said Fines, then to suffer corporal punishment. They forbid all fworn Brokers to be present at, or make any bargain for the buying or felling any fuch Brandy or distilled waters after the expiration of the said time, upon forfeiture of their places, and being Fined as above. They further forbid all their subjects, to make any Brandy or other distilled waters of Wine or Lees of Wine, after the expiration of the faid Eight months, under penalty of being for the first offence, besides confiscation of the said Brandy or other distilled waters, suspended their Trade for One year and Six weeks; for the Second offence, for ever; and for the third to be bapished the Country. And that the Merchants or others may have timely notice hereof, this Order is not to take effect till after the 29th of this prefent January.

By the other they charge great impositions upon all French Manufactures, and for the bester execution of their intentions therein; They forbid all Persons of what quality or condition soever they may be, henceforward to Buy, Sell, Trade with, or bring into any part of their Dominions, any French Mantifactures (excepting onely, White Chences, otherwife called Witte Cajanten, Worsted Camlets, (otherwise Barracanen van Wolle) Picotes Royal, white and coloured, worsted Damask of Wooll, Picotes of Wooll, Flowerd Chences, otherwise Gevlande Cajan-

ten, Bouratts, Hangings for Chambers from 6, to 20 Quarters broad, course Velvet (otherwise Trypen) & Stockins, unless they be fuch persons as shall have Licences from the Magistrates of the respective places so to do, under a penalty of 100 Gilders for every piece of such manufactures (besides confiscation of the same ) as shall be found in their hands for the first offence, for the second fault 200 Gilders, and for the third to be banished the Countrey. That such persons as are Licensed as abovesaid, shall not buy, fell, or trade with any other Commodities, then the said French Manusactures, under penalty as above-said. That in the several Towns there shall be a certain number of such Licenced Shopkeepers or French Mercers, not exceeding Six in the Gieat Towns, and Three in the less; the said Mercers paying yearly in the Great Towns 1000 Gilders, and in other places yoo Gilders. That the said French Mercers shall nor receive into their nouses or shops, any such French Manufactures, till they have acquainted the Officers of the place, to be to that end appointed, therewith, who are to pura certain mark upon the same, the Customes being first paid, under penalties as abovesaid. That no person shall receive out of France or other parts, any such French Manufactures for his own use, or buy the same of any others, then fuch Licenced thopkeepers, under a penalty of One hundred Gilders for every piece they shall so buy or receive, besides confiscation of the same, to be paid both by the buyer and feller. That the abovefaid Officers of the respective Towns shall not connive at the receipt of any of the said French Manufactures, or mark the same; till the Customes be first paid, under penalty of 1000 Gilders for every time to offending. That the faid Officers may at any time, taking with them one or more witnesses, go and visit the shops and houses of the said Mercers, and take an account of what Goods and Commodities they have therein. That fuch persons as shall inform against any one offending in any of these particulars, shall enjoy one half of all the Fines and Forfeitures to be by him paid: And whereas there may be at present great quantities of such manufactures in the hands of several Merchants and Shopkeepers, they give leave for Six months to buy, fell and vent the same, to begin from the Date hereof, and no longér.'

Genoud, Dec. 27. This Seriate hath made choice of Signor Pompeo Justiniani, descended from him of the same name, who was formerly General for the Republick of Penice in Triott, to go with all speed to Constantinople in quality of their Resident in the place of Signior Sinibald Fiesco, who is re-

turning thence.

We have advice here, that Monsieur Markel, Vice-Admiral of France, coming in pursuit of some Corfairs of Barbary to Maltha, and entring that Port, pretended that the Castle ought to salute first, which the Governor thereof expected from him, in which they both remaining obstinate, some sharp words passed between them, and Monsieur Martel went thence, much distatissed at the Governors proceedings, who having acquainted the Grand Master of the Order therewith, he immediately dispatched an Express to inform his most Christian Majesty of the whole affair.

Cologne, Dec. 30. The Duke of Lorrain continues here still, together with the Princes of Lislebonne and Vaudemont, having lately received advice that his most Christian Majesty hath given Orders for the marching of Twenty Companies into Lorrain to compleat the Regiments there; They farther say, that the Duke de Greguy had published a Proclama-

tion, forbidding the Inhabitants to keep any correfpondency with his faid Highness, upon pain of death.

The Bishop of Munster hath written a very kind Letter to the States-General, wishing them a happy New year, and officing them the service of his forces, when the differences he hath with the Duke of Brunstak are composed. From Muscowy they write, that the Patriarch who was formerly deposed and banished the Court, hath sided with the Rebels, and that several Greek Priests, have been severely punished for going about to defend him in it. From Vienna they tell us, that the troubles in Hungary being wholly appeased, the Troops that were ordered to march thither, have been countermanded, to remain in Moravia, Silesia and Bohemia, till farther order.

Paris, Fan. 44. Yesterday was committed a very strange and villanous attempt upon the person of the Princess of Conde by one Duval, formerly her Footman; and who, for some offence, was by the Prince of Conde turned out of his service. fellow, upon what account is not known, watching an opportunity, when the Princess was alone in her Chamber, stabbed her in the Brest with a Dagger, and so left her, double locking the door, and carrying the Key away with him: By which means, for the present, he made his escape without any observation, notwithstanding, there were three Swilles at the door, but hath been fince apprehended. The wound the Princess received is large, but not deep, so that it is hoped, she is in no great danger. All the Nobility, and Persons of Condition about the Town, have been fince to visit her upon this acci-

His most Christian Majesty hath by an Order of Council of the seventh instant, forbid all His Subjects to lade any Brandy-Wine on Holland Vessels in any Port within His Dominions under a penalty of 1500 Livres, besides consistation of the same Further commanding, That from the First of April next, there be charged on every de zen Barrel of Herrings imported in Holland Vessels into His Dominions, or laden upon their accompt 24 Livres, from the sirst of July next 32 Livres; and from the sirst of October next 40 Livres. That there be likewise charged upon all Spices imported by the Hollanders, or upon their accompt, either by Land or Sea, 30 per cent, besides the duties already payable.

On Sunday last, the King was to view the Triumphal Arch, together with his Statue on Horsback of White Marble, which he causes to be erected in

the Fauxbourg S. Anthoine.

Here is concluded a marriage between the Duke of Ventadour, and the second Daughter of the Mareshalle de la Motte, to the great satisfaction of all their Friends and Relations.
