*Madrid, January 4.*

**M.** Martinet's Squadron, which sailed from Cadiz with a Commission to clear the South-Sea of Interlopers, has been forced by bad Weather into Malaga. Sig. Patino, late Intendant of Catalonia, is arrived here from Barcelona. The King designs that he shall have the Direction of Naval Affairs, and for that Purpose has given him a Commission to go to reside at Cadiz, in the Quality of Super-Intendant of the Marine and of Commerce. His Catholick Majesty has given Order for making a new Tariff, and regulating the Duties on foreign Goods, conformably to the last Treaties; and the Governour of Cadiz has nominated one of each Nation of Foreign Merchants residing there, to settle the said Tariff with the Royal Officers of the Customs.

*Vienna, Jan. 6.* The Emperour is intirely recovered of his Indisposition. Orders are issued for the Recruits already raised, and those still raising, to repair forthwith to the Places assigned them. Great Stores of Provisions and Ammunition are providing in the Places on our Frontiers nearest to Belgrade, in order to a Siege, which is designed to be undertaken before the Enemy can come into the Field. By Letters from Transylvania we have Advice, that the Ottoman Port has appointed John Mauro Cordato to be Prince of Walachia, in the Room of his Brother Nicholas, who was made Prisoner at Bucharest, and brought off from thence by the Imperialists; but that he declines taking on him that Dignity; and that the Port has signified to the principal Persons of that Province, that powerful Succours shall speedily be sent to expell the Imperialists and cover the Country from future Incurfions.

*Berlin, Jan. 12.* The King of Prussia goes to Morrow for Dessaw, where he will stay three or four Days, to hunt the wild Boar, with the Prince of Anhalt. 'Tis advised from Warsaw, that the Polish Army which is to be kept constantly on foot by the New Regulation, is to consist of six Regiments of Horse,

viz. the King's of four Troops of Hussars and 20 of Cuirassiers, making 1325 Men: The Prince Royal's of four Troops of Hussars and 19 of Cuirassiers, making 1225 Men: The Great General of the Crown's of four Troops of Hussars and 19 of Cuirassiers, making 1225 Men: The Under General of the Crown's of four Troops of Hussars and 18 of Cuirassiers, making 1175 Men: The King's Regiment of Light Horse, making 650 Men: The Crown General's Regiment of Light Horse, making 450 Men: Seven Regiments of Dragoons, making 4000 Men; and 7600 Foot in six Regiments, viz. the King's Guard 3000 Men, the Queen's 1000, the Prince Royal's 1000, the Crown General's 900, the Under General's 850, and the General of the Artillery's 850. In all 18050 Men: Besides the Troops belonging to the Dutchy of Lithuania.

*Hambourg, Jan. 15.* A Courier has brought Orders from the Czar to General Czeremetoff, to make a new Regulation of Contributions in the Dutchy of Mecklenbourg, by which the Country will be somewhat eased; for the inferiour Officers are to take but a fourth Part, and the chief Officers one Half, of what was before allowed them. General Czeremetoff has sent an Adjutant to Travemunde, with an Order to the Russian Troops to retire from thence; and some Letters advise, that they have retired accordingly, all but 60 Men, who will soon follow the rest into Mecklenbourg. 'Tis advised from Copenhagen, that on the 5th Instant three Posts came in from Norway, with an Account that Commadore Tordenschild, with some of the Transports under his Convoy having on Board 1500 Men, was arrived near Frederickstad: That General Budde had caused several Redoubts to be made on the Frontiers towards Drontheim, by which 'twas judged that Side of the Country was sufficiently covered against any Attempts of the Swedes: That the Newq they had there of the King of Sweden was, that he was very intent upon reviewing his Troops in the several Places where they are quartered; and that he would not return to Lund till the Middle of January.

*Paris*

Paris, Jan. 16. Some Days ago a Courier arrived with the Treaty of defensive Alliance between Great-Britain France and the States General of the United Provinces, signed at the Hague. Yesterday the Regent dispatched Lieutenant General Dillon to Avignon, with an Order for the Pretender's speedy Departure out of the Kingdom; and four Gallies are ready at Marseilles to transport him, with his Retinue, to Italy. Baron Sparre, the Swedish Minister at this Court, is preparing for his Audience of Leave.

- Hague, Jan. 19. We have Advice, that the King of Great-Britain intends to set out this Day from Hanover, to be here on Sunday Night, and to proceed the next Day to Helvoetsluys, there to embark for England. The Earl of Sunderland, the Lord Cadogan, and Mr. Secretary Stanhope, will go from hence on Friday, in Order to meet His Majesty at Utrecht. The Czar had sent to Hanover, to desire an Interview with His Majesty on the Way near Utrecht, to which His Majesty consented; but 'tis believed it will be prevented by the Czar's present Indisposition, which is very violent. Admiral Aylmer, and other Sea-Officers who have been here some Days, will go to Morrow to Helvoetsluys, to see every thing in Readiness against His Britannick Majesty's Arrival.
