*Constantinople, November 16. O. S.*

**Y**esterday the Muscovite Envoy M. Daskhof set out from hence on his Return Home, making a publick Cavalcade through the Town. A Turkish Aga is gone with him, to compliment the Czar upon the Renewal of the Peace between him and the Port. The two French Men of War which brought hither the Turkish Ambassadour who was lately in France, sailed from hence about 10 Days ago. The Venetian Bailo has not yet been with the Vizier, to make the Republick's Excuses for what passed in the Affair of the Dulcignori; but expects to be called every Day, and he is to carry with him five and twenty Vests of Velvet, Sattin, and Venetian Brocade, as Presents for the Grand Signior; which is an additional Expence to the Republick, not stipulated by the Agreement, but demanded by the Turks as a constant Practice on the like Occasions, to which the Bailo submits. A Persian Ambassadour is lately arrived here with a numerous Retinue, chiefly to return the Compliments made by a Turkish one lately come back from that Country.

*Stockholm, Dec. 6.* Yesterday Morning the King and Queen of Sweden went to the Palace of Carlberg, where his Majesty dined and returned to Town in the Evening. But as soon as there falls a little Snow, it is said the King will go and take the Diversion of Hunting for six or eight Days at the Royal Seat of Grypsholm. The Commissioners who were several Months ago appointed by the Chancery here, for examining into and giving Judgment upon the Fiscal's Charge against M. Hopken, who was Resident from this Court at that of Vienna, but left his Post and came hither without Permission the Close of last Year, have now finished the Examination, but have not yet pronounced their Sentence.

Last Week arrived here two or three small Vessels from Finland, with an Account of the Arrival there of all the Troops sent thither since the Conclusion of the Peace with the Czar of Muscovy; for though several of the Transport Ships were stranded in Stormy Weather, yet the Men on board them had all the good Fortune to escape. But there is yet no News of Major-General Von Essen, who went from hence in October last, to be Governour of the Province of East-Bothnia; so that it is feared he with the Ship that carried him is lost. Some Days ago the Crews of six large Dutch Ships came over hither from Finland, those Ships having been cast away near Helsingfors in their Way home from Petersbourg and Narva.

*Naples, Dec. 19.* Last Week the Daughter of his Excellency the Prince of Borghese Viceroy of this Kingdom, set out from hence for Rome, having been married here the Day before by Proxy to the Duke of Bracciano residing there.

*Lisbon, Dec. 25, N. S.* Letters from Cadix of the 7th Instant, N. S. bring Advice, that all Commerce was prohibited at that Place with Holland as well as with France: It is generally believed, that this Prohibition is occasioned by the groundless Report of the Plague having been brought into the Texel by the Dutch Man of War said to belong to Admiral Somersdyke's Squadron, being the same Ship which not long ago caused some Alarm in England. As the Conde de Affumar, late Viceroy of the Rio de Janeiro, is preparing to return to Portugal, and in order thereto is obliged to adjust his Accompts with his Successour; it is believed that the Fleet from thence may be later than usual in coming Home, and cannot be expected in this Harbour till the End of the next Month.

*Paris, Jan. 14.* On the 10th Instant the Duke of Chartres was taken ill of a Fever, which lasted almost 24 Hours, and for which he was bled the next Day; and having had since another Fit of it, he was bled for the second time

time last Night, when his Fever continued still upon him. The whole Court is extremely alarmed at this Accident. The Cardinal de Rohan will not arrive here till the 25th Instant, by reason of his having stopt several Days at Turin. It is assured that soon after his Arrival he will administer to the King the Sacrament of Confirmation. The Duke d'Orléans went on the 12th Instant to the Palais Royal to take his Leave of the Cardinal du Bois; he designs to set out from hence for Spain in 8 or 10 Days. P. S. The Duke of Chartres rested pretty well last Night; but his Fever continues still upon him, though not with much Violence.

Whitehall, Jan. 8. His Majesty has been pleased to order Letters Patents to be passed under the Great Seal of Ireland, containing a Grant of the Dignity of a Baron of that Kingdom unto James O'Hara, Esq; eldest Son of the Right Honourable Charles Lord Tyrawley, by the Name, Style and Title of Baron Killmaine of Killmaine in the County of Mayo in the said Kingdom.
