THE following humble Addresses having been transmitted to his Excellency the Lord Carteret Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, have by him been presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive them very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Leitrim, at the General Assizes held at Carrick, in and for the said County, on Monday the 14th Day of August, 1727.

Most Gracious Sovereign;

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, beg Leave humbly to congratulate your Majesty on your peaceable and happy Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors; which alone could alleviate our unfeigned Sorrow and Concern for the Loss of our late gracious Sovereign, of glorious Memory.

When we reflect on your Majesty; happy in a Royal Consort of most exalted Vertue and Goodness, and blessed with a numerous Issue, brought up and educated under the Conduct and Example of so much Wisdom and Piety; and your known Love of our Religious and Civil Rights; and the tender and undivided Affection, which upon all Occasions you have shewn for your People; it leaves us nothing more to wish for; but the long Continuance of your Majesty's happy Reign, and the Government of your Posterity over us.

And as it has been the peculiar Happiness of your Majesty's Protestant Subjects of this County to be free from all Party-Distinctions, and to have at all Times unanimously adhered to the Principles upon which we were so wonderfully delivered, and are still secured
