*Whitehall, June 1.*

**H**IS Majesty has been pleased to appoint Philip Honeywood, Esq; Major General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Colonel of the Regiment of Dragoons lately commanded by George Lord Carpenter, deceased.

*St. James's, June 2.*

*St. James's, June 3.*

This Day M. de Lynn, Resident from the Elector Palatine, had a private Audience of Leave of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.

*- Sheerneys, June 5.* On the 3d Instant the King arrived at Greenwich about Two a-Clock in the Afternoon, and immediately went on board the Carolina Yacht, where His Majesty dined. Between Six and Seven in the Evening the Yacht sailed from thence, and came to an Anchor in Halfway-Tree Reach about Nine. The 4th at Seven in the Morning the Yachts weighed Anchor and came to Gravesend between Eleven and Twelve, and anchored about a Mile below the Town. His Majesty was saluted by Tilbury Fort and the Block-house at Gravesend as he passed by. About Six in the Evening the Yachts weighed Anchor from Gravesend, turned down to the lower Part of the Hope, and there came to an Anchor at Ten. This Morning they weighed again, worked down to the Nore, and the Tide being spent and a fresh Gale blowing Easterly, they were obliged to put into Sheerneys a little before One. His Majesty was saluted by the Fort at Sheerneys, and by the Men of War riding at Anchor in the River Medway, as also by those riding at the Nore, which last are to convoy His Majesty to Holland.
