AT the Court at St. James's, the First Day of November 1733.

P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This Day the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Selkirk, and the Right Honourable Sir Philip Yorke, Knight, Lord Chief Justice of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable George Earl of Cholmondeley to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Chester, City of Chester, and County of the same, and of the Counties of Montgomery, Flint, Merioneth, Carnarvan, and Anglesea; and likewise to appoint the Right Honourable John Viscount Lymington to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Southampton, and of the Town of Southampton, and County of the same, their Lordships this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint Richard Sutton, Esq; Major-General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Island of Guernsey, he this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of that Island.

Hague, Nov. 6, N. S. The Prince of Orange being perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition, set out this Morning with his Retinue, accompanied by Mr. Walpole and Mr. Finch, for Helvoetsluys, where the Yachts are, in order to embark for England with the first fair Wind. By the last Post from the Rhine we have received Advice that Fort Kehl surrendered to the French the 29th of last Month for want of Ammunition and Provisions, and that the French Army was gone towards Stolhoffen. We have received here no fresh Accounts of the Affairs of Poland, except that King Stanislaus was still at Dantzick, and that that City was threatned with a Bombardment from the Muscovites if the Magistrates did not oblige him to retire from thence.

Helvoetsluys, Nov. 7, N. S. The Prince of Orange came hither Yesterday from the Hague, to be in Readiness to make use of the first favourable Wind for passing over to England; though at present the Wind is so strong and contrary, that no Vessels but the Packet Boats will venture to put to Sea. His Highness lay last Night on board the Eubus Yacht.

Whitehall, October 30.

And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any one of them, or to any other Person or Persons who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid on the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
