THE Palatin of Kiow having demanded an Armistice, King Augustus has named Major General Levendahl, and M. Symonys Privy Councillor at War, his Commissaries; and on the Part of the Russian Army, M. Keyserling and General Lacy have pitched upon M. Golombioski, Resident from the Czarina, and Major General Backmetoff, whom, with the Regimentary Rzewuski, and the Body of Troops under his Command, they will find not far from Sendomir, on the other Side of the Vistula. They set out this Day, and have both Equipage and Table from the Court, and are to proceed directly to Sendomir, where they are to expect farther News from the Palatin of Kiow about the Place to meet at to settle the Armistice. With Permission lately granted by this Court, the Primate has sent hither from Thorn, M. Bradskoski, his Cross Bearer, to make some Propositions on his Part. As the General Council is to open the Day after to Morrow, the Deputies of the Tribunal at Petrikow are upon the Road hither.

Hague, Feb. 4, N. S. We have an Account, that the Prince of Orange landed safe in Friesland last Tuesday Morning, at Hemelumers within Twelve Leagues of Leeuwarden, not being able to put into Harlingen because the Wind turn'd contrary. On the 2d Instant, the Marquês de St. Gilles, the new Ambassadour from Spain, made a Visit to her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange, of whom he had desired an Audience. M. de Carwyk sets out To-morrow

for Leeuwarden, to sollicite the Prince of Orange for the Place of Droffard at Breda, which is newly become vacant.

In Regard several Men belonging to His Majesty's Ships in Sea Pay at Home, have been prevented by bad Weather, or other Impediments, in returning to their Duty by the Time limited by His Majesty's late Royal Proclamation, the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, that if such Men as are so absent will repair on board the Ships whereto they respectively belong, by or before the Tenth Day of the next Month, being February, the R's which may have been put against their Names in the Books of the said Ships will be taken off, and they be continued in Wages; but that such of them as do not return to their Duty by the Time before-mentioned, will not only forfeit all their Pay, but be prosecuted as Deserters from His Majesty's Service, unless it shall be such Men as have had, or may have Leave from their Captains, or other Superior Officers, in which Case, they are to take Care to repair to the Ships whereto they belong by the Times their respective Leaves shall expire, under the Penalties before-mentioned.
