Petersbourg, April 19, O. S.

M. Kizerling, who has been for some Time at this Court with the Prince of Bevern, has received the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Wolfenbüttel, and will soon have his first Audience in that Quality of the Czarina. M. Kune, a Swiss Merchant, is gone to Narva to hire a Ship or two, to transport to France about 200 French Soldiers, who were left last Year sick at that Place, when the others went from thence.

Warsaw, May 5, N. S. The Prince of Weissenfeldt arrived here the 28th past, and was very well received at Court; and as a Mark of it, he has been presented by King Augustus with a Diamond Ring of Value, and a Bill of 50,000 Crowns for his late Services. The 1st Instant, the Castellan of Cracow, the Palatin of Kiow, the Grand Marshal, and the Crown Master of the Horse, with their Families, came hither; and the next Day had Audience of King Augustus, and the Honour of dining with him. A Solemn Deputation of the Army that remained with the Palatin of Kiow, have also had an Audience. The Palatin of Culm, and others, are gone to Lublin, to open the great Tribunal of the Kingdom there, which was held some Months ago at Petrickow, and adjourned to that Place, as usual. The Stolnick of Lithuania Sapieha, is appointed to go with the Bishop of Warmia, who is already in that Diocese, to treat with the Lithuanians concerning their Accommodation with this Court, to which they now seem inclined, according to Accounts from thence. A General Meeting of the Palatinate of Podolia, was to be the 26th of last Month, to name Deputies for acknowledging King Augustus, according to the Account of the Storafta Belsh, a near Relation of the Primate, and of several others who have already been with the Prince of Hesse Hombourg at Leopold for that Purpose. General Lacy goes to Day or Tomorrow for Cracow, from whence, as is given out, he is to march with his Body of Russian Troops directly for the Rhine, according to his present Orders; and Commissaries from the Emperor are to meet him up on the Frontiers. That General says, that Orders were very lately come from his Court, for making up the Number 30,000 Men for the Emperor's Service as soon as possible. The Primate has writ to the Castellan of Cracow by the last Post, desiring him to answer for his Fidelity to King Augustus, and solicit his being set at Liberty, though he does not say he will immediately acknowledge him for his King; he has also writ to the Felt-Marshal Munich, begging to be released, but without mentioning King Augustus.

Whitehall, May 20.

This Day about Twelve at Noon, an Officer belonging to His Majesty's Sloop the Fly, arrived from Margate, with an Account; that His Majesty, who sailed from the Gunfleet on Saturday last at Nine at Night, arrived on the Coast of Holland on Sunday Morning, and at Two that Afternoon sailed in for Helvoetfluys; and that it was not doubted but His Majesty landed before Four; after a very good Passage of nine Hours from Land to Land.

Whereas on the 18th of April last, Mr. Newby, Collector of His Majesty's Customs at Woodbridge in Suffolk, having received Information of some Tea being lodged in a House in Seymour near Hadleigh, did, with the Assistance of another Officer of the Customs, and a Serjeant and three Dragoons, seize in an Almshouse Ten Bags containing near Four Hundred Weights of Tea, which he secured at the Excise Office at Hadleigh that Night: And as he was carrying the same the next Day to the Custom-house at Ipswich, they were attacked on the Road about a Mile from Hadleigh, by above Twenty Persons on Horseback, who were all armed with Blunderbusses, Fowling Pieces, Pistols, and other Weapons, fired on the Officers and Dragoons, carried away the Tea, and shot William Cam, one of the Dragoons, in the Shoulder; of which Wound he died the next Day; and wounded the Serjeant and two other Dragoons, killed two of their Horses, and wounded another.— And it appearing upon Oath, that William Neale and John Harrook of Boxford, Henry Clarke of Hinstlesham, Miller; William Ruffell of Seamar; Benjamin Witherell of Seamar, Yeoman; Benedictus Posford of Seamar; William Posford of Seamar; Samuel Leman of Bildeston, Cooper; William Cack of Hadleigh, Locksmith; John Ranjon

Ransom of *Hittleham*, Blacksmith; James Ponder of *Monks Eleigh*, Samuel Gallant of *the same*, and others were acting in the said Murder and Rescues — His Majesty is pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any two of the Persons concerned, (except the said Neale and Harvey, or the said Clarke, who it is supposed kill'd the said Cum, or the Person who it shall appear did actually kill him) in Case they shall be the Means of apprehending any of the other Offenders beforementioned, or shall discover and apprehend any of the Offenders, whose Names are not here named, so as that they or any of them shall be convicted of the Murder. — And for a further Encouragement for such Discovery, and for apprehending the Offenders, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds each, for apprehending the said William Neale, John Harvey, and Henry Clarke, or either of them; and Fifty Pounds each for apprehending the said William Ruffell, Benjamin Witherell, Benedictus Posford, William Posford, Samuel Lennan, William Cack, John Ransom, James Ponder, and Samuel Gallant, or any of the rest of the Offenders, so as that they be convicted of the Murder, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Customs.
