P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty, in Council.

This Day the Right Honourable Sir William Yonge, Baronet and Knight of the Bath, His Majesty's Secretary at War, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Tuesday the 11th of this Instant, should be further prorogued to Thursday the 15th Day of January next.

*Paris, Nov. 12, N. S.* On the 5th Instant the Marshal de Coigny having communicated to Count Seckendorf Orders which he had received from the King relating to a Cessation of Hostilities lately concluded, and Count Seckendorf having by his Answer accepted the Regulations proposed by the Marshal de Coigny, it was agreed between them, that from that Day all Hostilities should cease between the two Armies, and that they would wait for new Orders from France and Germany, as well for publishing the Cessation of Hostilities, as for settling in Consequence of it the Quarters to be possessed by the French and Imperial Forces. The Duke of Wirtemberg having on the 1st of this Month written to the same Effect to M. de Quadt, Hostilities immediately ceased between the King's Troops and those of the Emperour which the Duke of Wirtemberg commands on the other Side of the Rhine.

*Hague, Nov. 11, N. S.* It is advised from the Rhine, that Hostilities between the Imperialists and the French have already ceased; and that a Conference is to be shortly held near Philipsbourg, between one or more of the General Officers on each Side, for settling every thing relating to the Cessation. The States of the Province of Holland are assembled, and to Day have disposed of several Military Employments that were vacant. M. Hop sets out next Tuesday for Zealand, thence to proceed to Calais, and so to London.

*Dublin, October 30.*

This being His Majesty's Birth-day, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon there was a vast Concourse of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, who appeared in great Splendor, to compliment his
