Hague, August 7, N. S.

A Courier coming from Lisbon and going for Vienna, passed thro' this Place Yesterday, and delivered Letters to Don Louis d'Acunha the Portuguese Minister, who being thereby informed of the Death of the Princess, Sister to the King of Portugal, has this Morning notified the same to the President of the States. The Princess Royal and the Prince of Orange are expected here next Month, in order to reside here for some Time. M. Pouchoud, his Majesty's Electoral Commissary at Utrecht, died there of an Apoplexy on Saturday last. Count Rechteren and M. de Bransembourg, two Deputies sent to Munster to adjust there some Differences between the States and that Government relating to the Province of Overysfel, have sent Advice of their Arrival there; and that Commissioners were named by the Elector of Cologne to confer with them.
