Hague, July 25, N.S. We learn by Let-ters from Vienna of the 16th Inflant, that after the Engagement at Cornia on the 4th Instant, the Turks kept retiring, as the Imperialifts advanced, without coming to Blows, except fome few exchanged between the foremost and hindmost of the two Armies, till on the 9th the Grand Duke, presenting him-felf before Meadia, that Place capitulated upon the first Summons, though its Garrison is faid to have been above 2000 Men ftrong, and well provided with Artillery, Ammunition, and every thing necessary : and his Royal Highnels purluing his March towards Orfo-va, was met on the 10th by an Officer, whom the Governour of that Place had difpatched to meet him, with the welcome News of the Turks having entirely abandoned that Siege, and retired with great Precipitation on both Sides the Danube towards Widdin: 'Twas faid they left behind them in their Works and Camp, 30 Pieces of Can-non for Battery, 10 Mortars, and 1500 Waggons or Carts, with all their Tents, Provifions, and Ammunition.

Hague, July 29, N.S. The King of Pruf-fia is at Wefel, daily reviewing the Troops he has in that Neighbourhood.
