His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-seventh of this Instant July, should be further prorogued to Friday the Thirteenth Day of October next.

The humble Address of the Provost, Fellows and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth near Dublin.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Provost, Fellows and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth, near Dublin, humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon the late happy Increase of your August Family.

The Birth of an Heir hath ever been esteemed as well an additional Strength to a Prince, as a Pledge of Peace to his People. But this which would be a Happiness to every Nation, is more peculiarly so to your Loyal Subjects of these Realms; in as much as not

only the Publick Tranquility, but our Civil Rights and Holy Religion can only be secured by a constant Succession to these Crowns in your Illustrious Family.

May God prosper and maintain both, by preserving long your Sacred Life, and conveying with your Crown the far better Inheritance of your Royal Virtues to all your Posterity.

Hague, July 25, N. S. We learn by Letters from Vienna of the 16th Instant, that after the Engagement at Cornia on the 4th Instant, the Turks kept retiring, as the Imperialists advanced, without coming to Blows, except some few exchanged between the foremost and hindmost of the two Armies, till on the 9th the Grand Duke, presenting himself before Meadia, that Place capitulated upon the first Summons, though its Garrison is said to have been above 2000 Men strong, and well provided with Artillery, Ammunition, and every thing necessary: and his Royal Highness pursuing his March towards Orsova, was met on the 10th by an Officer, whom the Governour of that Place had dispatched to meet him, with the welcome News of the Turks having entirely abandoned that Siege, and retired with great Precipitation on both Sides the Danube towards Widdin: 'Twas said they left behind them in their Works and Camp, 30 Pieces of Cannon for Battery, 10 Mortars, and 1500 Waggon or Carts, with all their Tents, Provisions, and Ammunition.

Hague, July 29, N. S. The King of Prussia is at Wesel, daily reviewing the Troops he has in that Neighbourhood. He is expected with the Prince Royal his Son at Loo, where the Court of Orange is at present, on Friday next. As to his Journey to Holland, it is now doubted. The States of Holland continue their Assembly. The Minister of Poland has delivered to the States a Letter from the King his Master, notifying the Birth of a Prince his Son. The said Minister is preparing to entertain to Morrow a great many Persons
