Warfaw, October 15, N.S.

HE King of Poland has held a Court called here Judicium Curlandize, for the hearing of Appeals passed in the Courts of that Fædal The Court has received this Morning a Letter from the Officer they have in Count Munich's Army; in which he says the Russians had retired clear out of the Terri-tories of Poland: That had the Tartars pur-sued them according to the Setaskier's Orders, their Retreat might have been as fatal as that from Pruth; but those irregular Troops thought that the Turks loaded them with all the Difficulties and Dangers of the Campaign; therefore mutinied, and are supposed to be on their Return to their own Countries. His Majesty was present to Day in the Senate, where the Pacta Conventa, and the Result of the Senatus Consilium held at Fraustad were read. The Great Chan-cellor of Poland afterwards made from the Throne a Speech, with sour or sive Propositions for the Senators to take into Confideration; the chief were relating to the Augmentation of the Army; the Necessity of repairing the Fortresses on the Frontiers; of resto-

ring Immunities to certain Towns; and of better regulating the Exchange of Money.

Vienna, Oct. 18, N. S. By Letters from Effeck of the 14th Instant we have Advice, that the Turks and Bosniacks have raised the Siege of Ratscha, upon the Approach of the Saxons and Bavarians.

Dublin, October 12.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Coronation, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon their Excellencies the Lords Justices met at the Castle, where a Squadron of Horse attended, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon this Occasion: At Night a

Play was given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

Kensington, October 22.

This Day Don Sebastian de Caravalho, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, had a private Audience of His Royal Highness the Duke, to which he was introduced by John Inglis, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

He had afterwards an Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, and was conducted by the Affistant Master of the Geremonics.
