## PRESENT,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This Day his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland was, by his Majesty's Command, introduced into the Privy Council by the Right Honourable the Earl of Harrington, Lord Pre-fident ; where his Royal Highne's took his Place at the upper End of the Board on his Majesty's Left Hand.

Whitehall, May 17. On Friday the 14th Instant, arrived at St. Helens his Majesty's Ship the Prince Frederick, Captain Boscawen, in nine Weeks from Jamaica, who brings Advice, that his Majefty's Squadron, under the Command of Vice-Admiral Vernon, together with the Land Forces on board the Transports, under the Command of Major General Wentworth, were all under Sail from Jamaica, upon a new Expedition against the Spaniards, the 9th of March last, and that Captain Boscawen had left them together at Sea on the 11th of the fame Month.

By Letters from Rear-Admiral Leftock, dated May 1, on board the Neptune, off Antibes, there is Advice, that Vice-Admiral Haddock having, upon Account of the Continuance of his Indifpolition, been obliged to charge him the faid Mr. Leftock, with the Command of his Maiefty's Mediterranean Squadron, he had fet Sail therewith from Port Mahon the 12th of April, in order to the Execution of his Majefty's Inftructions, which he had received from Mr. Haddock, having first appointed Cruizers in proper Stations for procuring Intelligence, and annoying the Enemy, and that they had already had the good Fortune to take and deftroy feveral Veffels, laden with Provisions for the Use of the Spanish Forces, and prepar'd with proper Ac-commodation for transporting their Horse to Italy. The fame Letters also mention, that on the 4th Instant, fome Days before the Departure of the Fleet from Port Mahon, the Victuallers, with Six Months Provisions for the Squadron, arrived there under the Convoy of Captain Norris, fo that the whole Squadron had thereby compleated their Victualling before they fail'd from thence.

### Whitehall, May 15.

On the 6th Inftant the General Affembly of the Church of Scotland met at Edinburgh, and chofe for their Moderator Mr. Thomas Tulledeph. His Majefty's Commission to the Right Honourable the Earl of Leven was read; as was likewise his Majefty's most gracious Letter to the Assembly. His Majefty's High Commissioner made a Speech to the Aflembly, which was anfwered on their Part by the Moderator, and a Committee was appointed to draw up a dutiful Answer to his Majesty's most gracious Letter, which being reported, was unanimoufly appro-ved; and having been transmitted by the High Commissioner to the most Honourable the Marquess of Tweeddale, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been prefented to his Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously. It is as follows.

## May it please your Majesty,

WE acknowledge with the greatest Thank-fulness, the Honour of your Majesty's gracious Letter to us, and your Royal Favour, in continuing to countenance our Affemblies.

The many Assurances of your Majesty's Refolution to maintain inviolable, the Rights and Privileges of the Church of Scotland, as by Law established, and the Confidence your Majesty is pleafed to repofe in the Wifdom and Prudence of our Conduct, in promoting the true Interests of Religion, encourage us to perfevere in our invio-lable Loyalty, and most fincere Affection to your Majesty's Perfon and Governmene, and to continue our most strenuous Endeavours to propagate the true Reformed Religion, to promote Virtue, to suppress Vice and Immorality, and to prevent the Growth of Popery in this Part of your Majefty's Dominions.

As we are fenfible of the Importance of Harmony and Union among ourfelves, to the Succefs of our Councils and Refolutions, we are determined, through the gracious Affistance of Almighty God, to observe that Candour, Moderation and brotherly Love, in all our Reafonings and Deliberations, which becomes us as Ministers of the Gospel, and which may further recommend this Church to your Majefty's Royal Favour.

The Continuance of your Majefty's Bounty, for the Reformation of the Highlands and Illands, we accept of with all Thankfulneß, as a fresh Instance of your pious Intentions to promote the Knowledge of true Religion in these Parts; and it fhall
