This Day the most Reverend Father in God, Thomas Lord Archbishop of York, was, by his Majesty's Command, Sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council; and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Faro, March, 26. The Convoy which came last from England for the Mediterranean; passed by the 24th Instant in the Evening, after leaving off of this Port one of the Merchantmen, which was bound hither; and got over the Bar the next Day.

Lisbon, April 22. His Portuguese Majesty designs going again to the Caldas the Beginning of next Month, he has of late been two or three times upon the Water to take the Air.

Whitehall, April 26.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bangor, to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being now void by the Translation of the most Reverend Father in God Dr. Thomas Herring, late Bishop thereof, to the See of York; and also to issue his Letters under his Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, therein naming and recommending to the said Dean and Chapter; the Reverend Matthew Hutson, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them elected and chosen Bishop thereof.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Reverend William Barnard, Doctor in Divinity, and one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary; the Place and Dignity of Dean of the Cathedral Church of Rochester, void by the Translation of the most Reverend Father in God Doctor Thomas Herring, to the See of York.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Reverend Robert Hay Drummond, M. A. and one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary; the Place and Dignity of a Prebendary of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter Westminster, void by the Resignation of Doctor William Barnard, late Prebendary thereof.

Navy-Office, April 22. 1743.

The Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury having appointed Money for paying of Half Pay to Sea Officers, from the 1st of July 1742, to the 30th of December, 1742, according to his Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf, These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Treasurer of the Navy's Office in Broad Street, at Nine of the Clock in the Morning, the following Days, to wit, on Monday the 9th of May next for the Captains, Tuesday the 10th for the Lieutenants, and Wednesday the 11th for Masters and Surgeons, that all Persons concerned may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them, and not only bring with them the Affidavits required touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid the said Half Pay, but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament
