Vienna, Feb. 19, N. S. The Archducheſs ſets out with Prince Charles for Flanders on the 23d Inſtant; the Queen accompanies her Highneſs to Stokereau, two Poſts from hence, but the Great Duke goes to Prague. Count Eſterhaſi went to Dreſden the Day before Yeſterday. It is ſaid that the Spaniards who were at Civita Caſtellane, are retired into the Abruzzo. Marſhal Traun is appointed and declared in Form to ſucceed the late Marſhal Khevenhuller.

Vienna, Feb. 22, N. S. The Archducheſs and the Prince received the Compliments of the whole Court and Town the Day before Yeſterday. General Botta is confined to his Houſe, and the Counts Wurmbrand and Hardegg, the one Preſident, the other Vice Preſident of the old Aulick Council, are with three other Perſons of lower Rank, conſtituted to interrogate him, and to pronounce Sentence upon the Interrogation and the Evidence which has been produced by the Court of Petersbourg.

Copenhagen, Feb. 22. The late Rigour of the Seaſon has occaſioned an Epidemical Illneſs here, accompanied with a Fever, which though not dangerous, is exceedingly troubleſome. The King of Denmark has himſelf a Touch of it, and keeps his Chamber with his Account: His Maſteſty however held his Council Yeſterday as uſual, and reſted well laſt Night.

Copenhagen, Feb. 24. His Maſteſty held a Council again Yeſterday, and diſpatched Buſineſs as uſual, but did not appear in Publick, being ſtill troubled with his Cold, which however, 'tis hoped, he will the more eaſily get rid of, as it is not attended with any Fever. An Act or Convention for reſtoring the good Intelligence between Denmark and Sweden, and for diſarming reciprocally, having been prepared and ſettled by the Daniſh Miniſters and Count Teſſin, the ſame was ſign'd by them, as is ſaid, Yeſterday.

Dantzick, Feb. 22. We have Advice here, that the late Regent in Ruſſia, the Princeſs Anne of Mecklenbourg, had been conducted, with her Family, from their Confinement in the Fortreſs of Dunamunder, in ſleeping Waggon, higher up into the Country, and that their German Domeſticks are all ſent home, and are now on their Way to Memmell.

General Poſt-Office, London, Feb. 8, 1743.

Whereas the Poſt Boy, going out with the Weſt Mail from this Office, was this Morning, between Five and Six o'Clock, attacked on the Highway at the Staling Place on the other Side of Turnham Green, by a ſingle Highwayman, who took the ſaid Poſt Boy into a Field adjoining to the Road, and opened the Mail, and carried off the Exeter and Plymouth Bags: The Perſon, who committed this Robbery, is a luſty Man, and had on a Blue Great Coat, with his Hat tied over his Head; and he rode on a large, lean Bay Horſe, and made off for Aſton the Oxford Road.
