HEY write from Rome, that Prince Lobkowitz had received politive Orders from Vienna to retire from Nemi into Lombardy; but as the provi-ding for the Security of his Invalids retarded the Execution of those Orders, he has fent to this Republick to demand Leave to land them at Porto Republick to demand Leave to land them at Porto Spetia, which was immediately granted. This Republick continues her Military Preparations with the utmoft Vigour, and every Night fends away Detachments of Sixty to one Hundred Men to Savofa, from whence they are marched to Final: They are likewife preparing to caft Forty Pieces of Brafs Cannon, Forty Pounders, which are to be ready by the Month of February next. The Doge and Senate have nominated a Magistracy, confisting of some particular Gentlemen, who have Power given them to transact the Publick Affairs at this Juncture, without giving the Doge and Senate, or the fmall Council, any particular Account of their Proceedings. Various are the Reports what Part the Republick's Troops are to act : Some fay they are to affift Don Philip with 12 to 14000 Men as Auxiliaries, and to join him as foon as his Army fhall become Mafters of Coni, and shall have gained a free Paffage into Lombardy; others, that they will form a Camp about Final, to cover that Marquifate from any Attack that might be formed against it. It is affured that the Republick has fent into Switzerland to raife 6000 Men; they are dally draught-ing Troops from Corfica, and have allo agreed with a General to command their Forces, who is daily expected from Franckfort. Letters from Barcelona advife, that they were preparing an Embarkation, which was to confift of about 100 Sail of Veffels; about 50 of which were ready in that Port, and that the Spanish Fleet was to convoy them to Naples. Three Days

ago arrived a Veffel from Port Mahon, the Mafter whereof reports, that in his Voyage, near the Island of Sardinia, he met with four Spanish Veffels full of Troops, who chafed him, but finding they could not come up with him, they flood away to the Southward. He also fays, that he believes they came from Majorca; from whence they write, that an Embargo has been laid on all Veffels, and that an Embarkation is to be made of 800 to 1000 Men.

The King has been pleafed to conflitute and appoint the Right Hon. William-Anne, Earl of Albemarle, Major General of his Majeffy's Forces, to be Colonel of the Second Regiment of Foot Guards, in the room of his Grace Charles Duke of Marlborough.

Admiralty-Office, October -9.

Letters from Vice-Admiral Stewart, dated the 7th and 8th Inftant, give an Account of his Arrival at Spithead, with all the Englifh and Dutch Men of War of Sir John Balchen's Squadron, (except the Admiral's own Ship) having feen the Victuallers and Store fhips, which lay at Lisbon, fafely into the Streight's Mouth. Sir John Balchen's Ship feparated from the reft of the Squadron, in a hard Gale of Wind, in the Mouth of the Channel.

His Majefty's Ship the Harwich, commanded by Captain Carteret, in her Paffage to the Nore, with the Trade from the Baltick, faw three Sail on the 29th of laft Month, to which he gave Chace, and came up with one of them at Nine in the Evening, which, after exchanging one broad Side, ftruck to her. She was a French Privateer of Dunkirk, called La Solide, of 24 Guns, and 2023 Men, and extraordinarily well fitted. She had Seven Men killed, and 21 wounded. The Harwich had one



Marine wounded, of which he died. The other two, which were in Company with her, The and made their Escape, were also Privateers, one of 10 Guns, and 150 Men, and the other of 8 Guns, and 80 Men.
