This Day the Right Honourable Henry Legge, Eíq; was by His Majesty's Command Sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Ships coming from any of the Ports in West Barbary upon the Atlantick Ocean be continued, and a like Quarantine of Forty Days laid on all Ships and Veffels coming from any of the Ports in the Streights of Gibraltar on the Barbary Coaft, or any other of the Ports on that Coaft in the Mediterranean, lying between the faid Streights and Cape de las tres Forcas in the Kingdom of Fez: And that the like Rules, Regulations and Reftrictions be observed by all fuch Ships and Veffels as are required to be observed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 18th of June 1747—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treafury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Mafter General and the reft of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may refpectively W. Sharpe. appertain.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint John Ponsonby, of Hale, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Cumberland, in the Room of Henry Richmond Brougham, Esq; deceased.

Whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council of the 18th of June 1747, upon Information of the Plague being at that Time at Sta Cruz in West Barbary, to order and require, That all Ships and Veffels then arrived and not unladen; and all Ships and Veffels that fhould thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the faid Port of Sta Cruz, or any other Port in West Barbary on the Atlantick Ocean, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days, in fuch Manner, and under fuch Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as were by the faid Order directed; which Order is still in Force. And whereas His Majesty hath lately received Information, that the Plague rages at this Time at Saffie and Salle on the faid West Coast of Barbary; and that from the Correspondence which is constantly carried on between those Places and the Towns of Tangier and Tetuan lying in or near the Streights Mouth, there is great Reason to apprehend that the Infection will foon fpread throughout the two Kingdoms of Fez and Morocco: And it being of the utmost Importance to prevent the Contagion being brought into this Kingdom from any of the faid Places -His Majesty, out of His great Care for the Prefervation of His Subjects, and the better to prevent the said Infection being brought hither, doth, with the Advice of his Privy Council, think it proper to order; and it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine now subsisting upon

Extract of an Act passed the last Session of Parliament for preventing the Spreading of the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle.

A ND be it further enacted by the Autho-rity aforefaid, that an Act made in the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of his prefent Majesty, intituled, An Act to enable his Majesty to make Rules, Orders, and Regulations, more effectually to prevent the Spreading of the Distemper, which now rages amongst the horned Cattle in this Kingdom, which was to continue and he in Force for the Space of eight Months, and to the End of the then next Sellion of Parliament; and which by an Act made. in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of his prefent Majesty, was explained, amended, and continued, and to be in Force with the faid laft mentioned Act, for the Space of eight Months, from the Tenth Day of January, One thousand sever hundred and forty fix, and from thence to me End of the then next Sellion of Parliaments and which faid Acts, by, an Act made in Twenty first Year of the Reign of his presented Majesty, for continuing several Laws therein the mentione

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
