**O**N Tuesday the 10th Instant, the Parliament having met according to the Prorogation, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Ceremony, his Excellency sent for the Commons, and made a Speech to both Houses, who unanimously resolved upon humble and dutiful Addresses to his Majesty, which were this Day presented to his Excellency.

His Excellency William Earl of Harrington, Lord Lieutenant General, and General Governor of Ireland, his Speech to both Houses of Parliament, at Dublin, on Tuesday the Tenth Day of October 1749.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

**H**IS Majesty having honoured me with his Commands to meet you again in Parliament, it is with great Pleasure that I congratulate you on the Re-establishment of the publick Tranquillity; and I am persuaded, that you are duly sensible of his Majesty's Wisdom and Goodness, in procuring the honourable Peace which has been happily concluded since the last Session, to the manifest Advantage of his Subjects of this Kingdom, in common with those of his other Dominions.

In order to contribute to the more effectual securing the Continuance of that inestimable Blessing, his Majesty has judged it necessary to regulate his Forces in this Kingdom, in such a Manner, as to be speedily prepared, in all Events, to defeat any Attempt which may be made to disturb our present Happiness.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I have ordered the several Accounts and Estimates to be laid before you, and have a particular Satisfaction in acquainting you, that I have

nothing in Command from his Majesty to ask but the usual Supplies.

The Batteries which have been thought necessary for the Defence of the Harbour of Corke, are in considerable Forwardness; and a new Disposition of the Barracks, for the more convenient Reception of his Majesty's Troops, and for the publick Security, has been proceeded upon, in pursuance of your Address to me of the last Session, with as much Expedition as the Nature of that Service would admit. An Account of the Expence of each of those Works shall likewise be laid before you.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

The Encouragement lately given to your Linen Manufacture by the Legislature of Great Britain, calls upon you, in the strongest Manner, to attend to the Advantages of that great Source of national Industry and Wealth: And their favourable Disposition to promote the general Welfare of this Kingdom, must incline you to cultivate, by all suitable Returns, that reciprocal Confidence and Harmony, which will at all Times be found essentially necessary to the Interest of Ireland. Every audacious Attempt to create a Jealousy between the two Kingdoms, and to disunite the Affections of his Majesty's common Subjects, so closely connected by the same civil and religious Interests, must excite the highest Indignation in all true Lovers of their Country.

You have abundant Reason to depend upon the Continuance of his Majesty's Protection and Favour; and your past Conduct leaves no room to doubt, that you will gratefully testify your Loyalty and Duty, by reposing a just Confidence in his Majesty, and exerting a steady Zeal for the Security and Honour of his Government.

Duty and Inclination will, upon all Occasions, equally engage me to concur with you, in every Measure, which may tend to increase the Welfare and Prosperity of this Kingdom.

*I Am very much obliged to the House of Commons for this fresh Testimony of their Regard and Esteem; and desire you will be assured of the Continuance of my most zealous Endeavours to advance the Welfare of this Kingdom upon all Occasions.*

*Dublin, October 12.*

Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Coronation, the Great Guns were fired in his Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a numerous Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant upon this Occasion. At Night there was a Play given by his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and a Ball at the Castle.

*Naples, September 27, N. S.* The King, on Notice that eleven Algerine Pirates were cruizing off the Island of Procida, ordered immediately three Gallies and two Half Gallies to go out in Pursuit of them; and sent a Detachment of seventy Soldiers, and the necessary Ammunition and Stores, to reinforce the Castles in that Island, lest those Pirates should attempt to make a Descent. His Majesty likewise ordered the three Ships of War, St. Charles, la Reine, and Notre Dame de la Conception, to be fitted out and manned with all possible Expedition for that Purpose, and they now wait only for a fair Wind to put to Sea. A few Days ago a new Ship of War of forty Guns was launched from the Stocks, in the Presence of their Majesties, attended by a great Number of the Nobility; on which Occasion much Mischief was done by the Ship falling upon the People that were employed, several of them were killed, and others disabled. Last Week arrived in this City a Danish and a Dutch Gentleman, the former with the Character of Consul from the King of Denmark, and the latter from the King of Prussia. On the 12th Instant anchored in this Port from Spain, a Shebeck mounted with 26 Guns, which the King caused to be purchased for four thousand Dollars, in order to be fitted out as a Cruizer against the Barbary Pirates, and as a Model to build others. On the 19th the King, attended by many of the Nobility and the Knights of the Order of St. Genaro, invested the Duke of Bovino with the Ensigns of that Order in the Chapel of the Royal Palace. Fifty Soldiers deserted on the 22d out of the several Regiments in Garrison in this City. The Queen happily advances in her Pregnancy. On the 23d, the King of Spain's Birth-day was celebrated here with the usual Solemnity; the Foreign Ministers, Nobility, and military Officers, in their rich Habits, were to pay their Duties to their Majesties on that Occasion.

*Rome, September 30, N. S.* Last Week the Pope ordered Count Novara to be released from his Confinement in the Castle of St. Angelo. M. Clementi has received Notice, that the King of Spain has appointed him the

fourth Counsellor of Castille. On the 17th Instant, the Secretary of State sent strict Orders to the Tower-keepers along the Coast of the See of Rome, to be very vigilant on account of the Barbary Pirates that are cruizing off these Coasts, lest they should attempt a Descent.

*Florence, October 7, N. S.* Since the Publication of the Pope's Bull, with a circular Letter from the Archbishop to the Clergy, notifying the Abolition of a certain Number of Holy-days, an Edict of the Emperor has been made publick, commanding his Subjects to conform themselves to this Regulation, under severe Penalties to those who shall refuse to comply with it. A few Days ago, M. del Turco, a Florentine Gentleman, and M. Durazzo, a Citizen, the first the Treasurer, and the latter the Book-keeper, of a Bank called Monte di Pietà, who a few Months since fled from this City to Venice, having embezzled a large Sum of Money belonging to that Office, were brought here Prisoners; having, at the Request of the Emperor, been delivered up by the Republick of Venice; the former is confined in the Castle, and the other in the common Prison. A Battalion of the Lorrain Regiment of Foot Guards is arrived in this City from Leghorn, having been relieved by another Battalion of the same Regiment.

*Madrid, October 13.* The last Letters from Cadiz mention, that the Caracas Expedition goes on but slowly; that only four Ships were as yet freighted for that Service, viz. one Irish, two French, and one Dutch, and that they were all to be careen'd to make them fit for so long a Voyage. That a Register belonging to the Fernandine Company of Seville was arrived in that River from Buenos Aires in Eighty Days, and brought Advice, that two Registers were arrived there from Cadiz; that another was almost ready to return to Europe; and that two Men of War in the South Sea, bound home from Lima with Treasure, were detain'd for want of Hands. Their Catholick Majesties leave this Place on the 16th Instant, in order to go to the Escorial.
