Algier, February 26.

TWENTY English Prisoners have been delivered up by the Dey to Ambrose Stanyford, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Consul here. As an Attack upon this Place by the Spaniards and their Allies in the Mediterranean is apprehended, Preparations are making for a most vigorous Defence; amongst other Inventions there is one of a floating Battery of 12 Guns of 24 Pounders, and three Mortars. Ten Xebecs are now out, as is also a Vessel called the Macho, and her Prize, mounted with 34 Guns; and four Ships will go to Sea in about three Weeks.

Petersbourg, March 2. M. de Wahrendorff, the new Prussian Minister at this Court, will be admitted to his first publick Audience of his Imperial Majesty immediately after the Return of the Court from Czarkaselo. General Lieven has received his last Instructions, and is set out for his Post; and General Lapuchin will set out in a few Days for Livonia. They talk of some Camps that are shortly to be formed, and 'tis even said, that Orders are already given for preparing the necessary Magazines for that Purpose.

Turin, March 17. The raising of Recruits for augmenting the Forces of this Kingdom goes on with such Success, that it is imagined the whole Number proposed to be raised, amounting, as 'tis said, to 12000 Men, will be compleat by the Middle of next Month.

Turin, March 21. The King of Sardinia has this Week given the Rank of Minister of State, of which Rank there was but one before, to the Six following Persons; the Marquis de Gorzegne, the Marquis de Breille, Count Sta Vittoria, First President of the Senate, Count St. Laurent, Count Bogin, and Chevalier Oso-rio. The last named is to attend the Infanta on her Journey, and is appointed Occasional Great Steward of the Household, to receive her Royal Highness from the Hands of the Spaniards. His Majesty has appointed the Marquis de St. Mar- san, Brother-in-Law to the Marquis St. Ger- main, to be Ambassadour in Ordinary to the Court of Spain.
