WENTY English Prisoners have been delivered up by the Dey to Am-brose Stanyford, Esq; his Britannick 'Majesty's Consul here. As an Attack upon this Place by the Spaniards and their Allies in the Mediterranean is apprehended, Preparations are making for a most vigorous Defence; amongst other Inventions there is one of a floating Battery f 1-2 Guns of 24 Pounders, and three Mortars. Ten Xev ques are now out, as is alfo a Vessel called the Macho, and her Prize, mounted with 34 Guns; and four Ships will go to S a in about three Weeks. Petersbourg, March 2. M. de Wahrendorff, the new Pruffian M'nifter at this Court, will be admitted to his fift publick Audience of h r Imperial Majesty immediately after the Return of the Court from Czarkaselo. General Lieven has received his last Instructions, and is fet out for his Post; and General Lapuchin will fet out in a few Days for Livonia. They talk of fome Camps that are fhortly to be formed, and 'tis even faid, that Orders are already given for preparing the necessary Magazines for that Purpose. Turin, March 17. The raising of Recruits for augmenting the Forces of this Kingdom goes on with fuch Success, that it is imagined the whole Number proposed to be raised, amounting, as 'tis faid, to 12000 Men, will be compleat by the Middle of next Month. Turin, March 21. The King of Sardinia has this Week given the Rank of Minister of State, of which Rank there was but one before, to the Six following Persons; the Marquis de Gorzegne, the Marquis de Breille, Count Sta Vittoria, First President of the Senate, Count St. Laurent, Count Bogin, and Chevalier Oforio. The last named is to attend the Infanta on her Journey, and is appointed Occasional Great Steward of the Houshold, to receive her Royal Highness from the Hands of the Spaniards. His Majesty has appointed the Marquis de St. Marfan, Brother-in-Law to the Marquis St. Germain, to be Ambaffadour in Ordinary to the Court of Spain. Hague, March 26.
