HE Farmers of Tobacco have renewed their Contract with the King for three Years, on Condition of their paytwo Millions and eighty Thousand Cruzades, befides the accustomed Duties. The King, in Imitation of the King of Spain, is determined to put his Marine on a respectable Footing, for which Purpose his Majesty has engaged two experienced English Shipbuilders, who have agreed to build 18 Men of War and Frigats in the Course of two Years, on Condition they have the Liberty of chusing such Ports as they shall think most convenient to build them in. The Court is still at Bellem, from whence their Majesties generally come once a Week to partake of the Winter Diversions that are carrying on in this City.

Leghorn, Nov. 30. The Masters of several Ships arrived here within this Week past assure us, that there are at present no Barbary Corsairs on our Coast. We learn by our last Letters from Corsica, that the Malecontents of that Island continue very mutinous, and seem on the Brink of committing Hostilities against such of the Inhabitants who take Part with the

Genoese.

Rome, Dec. 2. Prince Esterhasi, late Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties to the King of the Two Sicilies, who arrived here from Naples on Friday last with his Spouse, was the next Day presented to the Pope, and received with great Marks of Distinction; he proposes to stay here about eight Days, and then to continue his Journey for Vienna. The Congregation de Propaganda Fide were lately informed by Letters from China, that the Emperor of that Country, having conceived more favourable Sentiments of the Christians settled in his Dominions than heretofore, had at length permitted the Missionaries to continue their Functions as before their late Persecution; which News is the more agreeable, as by some former Advices it was greatly feared those Missionaries

must have quitted that Country, and retired into Europe.

Cruizes, for the Winter.

Petersbourg, Dec. 5. Last Week a grand Conference was held at Count Bestuchess, Great Chancellor of this Empire, at which General Baron Pretlack, Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties, assisted; as did also M. Funch, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland; 'tis said this Conference turned upon Affairs of great Consequence; which is the readier believed, as Couriers were, immediately after its breaking up, dispatched to Constanti-Her Imperial nople, Vienna, and Dresden. Majesty has appointed M. Sperat, Assessor of . the College of Commerce of this City, to be Director of that of Archangel. M. de Malzhan, the Danish Envoy Extraordinary, has informed this Court, that the King his Master had nothing more in View, by ordering a Body of Troops to advance towards the Frontiers of Holstein, than meerly to hinder the cutting down of the Woods in those Parts by the common

Dantzick, Dec. 9. The Deputies who were fent to Warfaw, in order to lay before the King an Account of some new Differences that have lately arisen between the Magistrates of this City, and the third Order of Citizens, returned here a few Days ago, extremely latisfied with the Reception they met with from his Majesty. We are informed by our last Letters from Constantinople, that several Persons, who were employed in the Intrigues of the late Grand Vizier and High Treasurer, and who had largely pertaken of the Riches they had amailed in those Employments, have been lately secured, and put to Death. The same Letters add, that a Grand-You of Schach Hussein, who, since the late Troubles in Perlia, had retired to Bagdad, being encouraged by several of the Persian Nobility, on Account of his being a Descendant of the late Sophys, is preparing to affert his Right to the Crown of that Kingdom; and 'tis thought, if he meets with any Encouragement from the Ottoman Porce, his Party will foon get the better of those of Schach Doub and Prince Heraclius of Georgia.

Stockholm, Dec. 11, The Queen has been very much indisposed for some Days past, but 'tis thought she is now much better, and in a fair Way of Recovery. General Count Lieven is returned here from his late Journey to the Courts of Berlin and Copenhagen, and on Monday last he was introduced to the King, and presented to his Majesty the Ensigns of the Order of the Black Eagle, which he brought as a Present from the King of Prussia. Last Thursday, being the Anniversary of their Majesties Coronation, Baron Hopken, President of the Royal Chancery, gave on that Occasion a grand Entertainment to the principal Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction. The same Day the samous Banker Heisfing was brought here under a strong Escort from Hambourg; he was immediately committed to Prison, and Orders given for his being
