Lisbon, April 3:

PREPARATIONS are making at Court for the Departure of the Infanta Anne-Marie-Francoise, future Spouse of the Archduke Joseph; and 'tis expected the King will shortly name the Persons who are to attend that Princess in her Journey to Vienna. They are equipping in this Port the Fleet bound for Maragnham; and 'tis thought the same will be ready to put to Sea, with that bound for Fernambuco, by the End of this Month. The Regiments appointed to form a Camp in the Neighbourhood of this City, wait only for Orders to repair to the Ground that is already marked out for that Purpose.

Naples, April 17. Their Majesties and the young Royal Family arrived here Yesterday from Caserta; they propose staying at their Palace in this City till the 29th, and then to remove, with the whole Court, to Portici for the Summer. The King has caused a great Number of Debtors to be set at Liberty. The Duke and Dutchess of Wirtembourg, after seeing every Thing remarkable in this City, are returned to Rome, in order to assist at the Religious Ceremonies of the Holy Week.

Posmania, April 27. We have at length come to a Resolution to act vigorously against the Cossack Heyducks, in order, if possible, to prevent the many Outrages they are continually committing; for which Purpose a considerable Body of Troops are to assemble in the Polish Ukraine, the Officers of which, having received their Orders from Count Branicky, Great General of the Crown Army, are already set out to join their respective Divisions.

Copenhagen, April 30. On Friday last the Queen Mother went to Hirsholm for the Summer; and the young Royal Family are to remove to Fredensbourg on the 4th or 5th of next Month. The Manufacture of Cloth and other Woollen Goods, lately set on Foot in the Island of Iseland, meets with great Encouragement; and 'tis thought, by the Quantities they have already made, that they will soon be able to furnish enough to answer the Demands of the Inhabitants of that Island. The Militia of this City, who are to guard the same during the Encampment of the regular Troops, are daily learning the new Exercise lately introduced amongst those Troops. The King, in order that the Works of the new Port which is erecting at the Point of Neibo, may be carried on with the greater Expedition, has ordered a large Body of Soldiers to be sent thither, to be employed on the said Works.

Paris, May 4. Yesterday the Deputies of the Parliament went to Versailles, in order to know the King's Pleasure with Regard to his receiving their new Remonstrances; but were refused an Audience. However 'tis thought his Majesty will communicate his Sentiments on that Subject to their first President, who, we hear, is ordered to wait on him, with two other Presidents, for that Purpose. They write from Cadiz, that the Gothick Lion, and the Frederick

Adolphus, two Ships belonging to the Swedish East India Company, which have been in that Bay for a Month past, are put to Sea on their Voyage to Canton in China.

Brussels, May 7. Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, is still at Ter-Vuren, where he proposes to stay some Days longer. We are assured his Highness intends going this Summer to Vienna. A Project is on Foot for widening several Feet the Canal from Bruges to Ghent; but as this will be a tedious Piece of Work, and very expensive, 'tis greatly doubted whether it will ever be carried into Execution.

Hague, May 10. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who opened their Assembly Yesterday, have continued their Deliberations Today. Mess. Beelaars and Pesters, Deputies to the Council of State on the Part of the Provinces of Holland and Utrecht, are appointed to regulate the Duties, and examine the Magazines and Fortifications in the District of the Meuse; and Mess. Scheideruyt and Blommersma are appointed to do the like in the Districts of Wedde and West-Woldingerland.
