

## GUILDFORD RACES.

**H**IS Majesty's Plate of One Hundred Guineas will be run for (over the New Course) on Merrow Downs near Guildford in Surry, on Tuesday in Whitson-Week, being the 12th of June next, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, carrying Twelve Stone, to be six Years old this Grass, and so certified under the Hand of the Breeder.

On Wednesday the 13th of June will be run for over the same Course, the Ladies Plate of Fifty Pounds, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, the best of three Heats, that never won above that Value in Money or Plate, five Years old Horses, &c. to carry Nine Stone, six Years old Horses, &c. to carry Nine Stone Eight Pounds, and full aged Horses, &c. to carry Ten Stone. No Horse, Mare, or Gelding to enter, whose owner has not subscribed two Guineas, on or before the Day of Entrance, and no less than three reputed Running Horses, &c. to start for this Plate.

And on Thursday the 14th of June will be run for over the same Course, the Subscription Plate of Fifty Pounds, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, the best of three Heats, that never won above that Value in Money or Plate, carrying Eleven Stone. Each Horse, &c. to pay three Guineas, on or before the Day of Entrance; and no less than three reputed Running Horses, &c. to start for this Plate.

All such Horses, &c. to be Enter'd at the White Hart Inn at Guildford, on Monday in the Whitson-Week, between the Hours of Twelve and Three, paying Five Shillings Entrance each to the Clerk of the Course; and no Horse, &c. is to be Enter'd for two Plates; to start at half an Hour after Four each Day. And all Disputes to be decided by the Right Honourable the Lord Onslow, or such Persons as he shall appoint for that Purpose.

All Horses, &c. that run for these Plates, are to stand at the Subscribers Houses at Merrow or West Clandon.

No Person to plate any Horse, &c. but those that have subscribed half a Guinea towards the said Plates.

No Person will be permitted to set up a Booth, Shed, or Stall, to sell Liquors on the said Downs, during the Races, but those that have subscribed half a Guinea to the said Plates.

**N**OTICE is hereby given, pursuant to the Statute made in the Eighth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, intituled an Act for the Amendment of the Law relating to Actions on the Statute of Hue and Cry, That Isaac Philip, of Duke's Place, London, was, on Thursday the 10th Day of May Instant, robbed on Andevor Down, in the King's Highway, near about 50 Yards from the Two Mile Stone from Andevor, in the Hundred of Andevor in the County of Southampton, about Six o'Clock in the Evening, by a single Highwayman, upon a Bay Horse, a middle-size Man, about Thirty-six Years old: He had on a white Fustian Frock, with a Velvet Cape near the same Colour; a Pair of round plain Silver Buckles in his Shoes; a Pair of Steel Spurs, but no Boots; who then and there robbed the said Isaac Philip, of the Money and Goods following, (to wit) Four Silver Punch Ladles; two Pair of Silver Salts, and four Silver Salt Spoons; five Sets of Silver Tea Spoons; one Dozen of Silver Tea-tongs; one Dozen of large Silver Spoons; two Silver Marrow Scoops; one Silver Marrow Spoon; four Silver Pap Spoons; three Silver Pepper Boxes; two Silver Casters; six Silver Watch Chains; four Silver Seals; three Pair of large Silver Buckles; three Pair of middle-sized Silver Buckles; six plain Silver Stock Buckles; two Silver Watches; one fine Snuff Box; one Silver Tankard; one Silver Pint, and one Silver half Pint Mug; and one Thirty-six Shilling Piece in Gold; one half Moidore, eight Golden Guineas and a half; the half Guinea was wore plain, and had a Hole near the Edge for a String, and the rest in Silver, to the Amount of twelve Pounds, six or seven Shillings. All Persons are desired to stop the said Goods and Money, if offered to Sale, and to discover the said Highwayman, and give Notice to the Town-Clerk of Andevor, or to the said Isaac Philip, at his House in Duke's Place, London.
