THIS Day the Right Hon. Richard Earl Temple, First Commissioner for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, &c. William Lord Mansfield, Lord Chief Justice of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench, John Viscount Bateman, of the Kingdom of Ireland, Treasurer of His Majesty's Household, and Richard Edgcumbe, Esq; Comptroller of His Majesty's Household, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having constituted the Right Hon. Sir John Willes, Knt. Lord Chief Justice of His Majesty's Court of Common Pleas; Sir Sidney Stafford Smythe, Knt. one of the Barons of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer; and Sir John Eardley Wilmot, Knt. one of the Justices of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench, Lords Commissioners for the Custody of the Great Seal, was this Day pleased in Council to deliver to them the Great Seal of Great Britain: And the said Lords Commissioners did thereupon take the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, and also the Oath as Lords Commissioners for the Custody of the Great Seal.

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHereas by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the speedy and effectual Recruiting of His Majesty's Land Forces and Marines, it is provided, amongst other Things, That at such Time as His Majesty shall be satisfied by the Returns of the Commissioners appointed to carry the said Act into Execution, or otherwise, that a sufficient Number of Recruits in the Whole, shall have been raised for His present Service, He might be graciously pleased to suspend or stop the further Execution of the said Act, by Proclamation, or Order in Council, or other Publick Notice in the London Gazette. — And whereas in Pursuance of the Power so reserved to His Majesty, Publick Notice was given in the London Gazette of the 17th Day of April last, as likewise in the three following Gazettes, by His Majesty's Secretary at War, That His

Majesty was graciously pleased to suspend and stop the further Execution of the said Act, from and after the first Day of May then next, till further Notice—And whereas His Majesty hath judged it necessary for His Service, to cause several new Levies to be made, as well for the Land Forces as the Marines, and that it is therefore become necessary to cause the said Suspension to be taken off; — His Majesty is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to Declare His Royal Will and Pleasure, that the aforementioned Suspension and Stop, put to the Execution of the said Act, be now taken off: And His Majesty doth hereby strictly Order, Charge and Command all the Commissioners, and other His Majesty's loving Subjects, authorized to carry the said Act into Execution in those Counties where Precepts have been issued by the High Sheriff or his Deputy, pursuant to Notice sent by His Majesty's Secretary at War for that Purpose, that they do forthwith re-assemble themselves, and proceed with their utmost Diligence in carrying the said Act into Execution, pursuant to the Directions therein contained. — And with respect to those Counties to which His Majesty's Secretary at War hath not hitherto sent such Notice, the High Sheriffs of such Counties or their Deputies shall, (notwithstanding the aforementioned Suspension) upon receiving Notice from the Secretary at War, at any Time hereafter, during the Continuance of the said Act, issue their Precepts in the Manner required by the said Act, in order to its being carried likewise into Execution in those respective Counties.

The Bishop of Salisbury, by the Sovereign's Command, having summoned a Chapter of the most Noble Order of the Garter to meet this Day, the Knights Companions, with the Officers of the Order hereafter mentioned, attended in their Mantles, in the Apartment next his Majesty's Closet, from whence a Procession was made to the Council-Chamber in the following Order.

Earl of Winchelsea.
Earl of Lincoln. — Earl Granville.
Duke of Marlborough.
Duke of Rutland.
Duke of Grafton.
Duke of Newcastle. — Duke of Dorset.
His Royal Highness Prince Edward.
His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland.
His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.
Dr. Ewer, senior Canon of Windsor, as Deputy (with the Sovereign's Dispensation) for the Register, having upon his Right Hand Garter King

King of Arms, and upon his Left the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod; but Garter not having been sworn, went no farther than the Door of the Chapter-Room.

The SOVEREIGN.

The Sovereign and Knights Companions being seated, Black Rod acquainted His Majesty, that Stephen Martin Leake, Esq; Garter Principal King of Arms, attended at the Door, and humbly prayed to be admitted, to take the Oath of Office as Chief Officer of Arms of that most Noble Order; and being introduced in his Mantle, and kneeling down near the Sovereign, the Oath was administered to him by the Deputy Register: After which His Majesty was pleased to put the Gold Chain and Badge of Garter's Office about his Neck, and having kissed His Majesty's Hand, he withdrew to his Place.

The Deputy Register then declared the Sovereign's Pleasure, that the four vacant Stalls should be filled at that Time; whereupon the Duke of Devonshire was brought in by Garter and Black Rod, and knighted by the Sovereign with the Sword of State, and having kissed His Majesty's Hand, withdrew. The Knights Companions then proceeded to the Scrutiny, which being collected by the Deputy Register, and presented to the Sovereign, the Duke of Devonshire, by his Majesty's Command, was declared duly elected: Upon which Garter and Black Rod were sent to introduce his Grace, who was received by the Earls of Lincoln and Winchelsea, the two junior Knights Companions, and conducted by them to the Sovereign, Garter carrying upon a Cushion, the Garter and the George in a Blue Ribbon; and having, upon his Knee, presented the Garter to the Sovereign, His Majesty delivered the same to his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, the two senior Knights Companions, who buckled it upon his Grace's Left Leg, the Deputy Register reading the Admonition: Then Garter presented the Ribbon and George, and his Grace kneeling down, His Majesty put it over his Left Shoulder, assisted by their Royal Highnesses, the Deputy Register, in the mean Time, pronouncing the Admonition; and his Grace having kissed the Sovereign's Hand, and severally saluted the Knights Companions, withdrew.

In like Manner the Earl of Carlisle, the Earl of Northumberland, and the Earl of Hertford, were Knighted, Elected, and Invested with the Garter, Ribbon and George: Which done, a Procession was made back to the King's Closet, in the same Order as before.
