HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act to rectify a Mistake in an Act passed this Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the speedy and effectual Recruiting of His Majesty's Land Forces and Marines.

An Act for continuing an Act of this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to prohibit, for a limited Time, the making of Low Wines and Spirits from Wheat, Barley, Malt, or any other Sort of Grain, or from any Meal or Flour.

An Act for continuing an Act of this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to discontinue, for a limited Time, the Duties upon Corn and Flour imported, and also upon such Corn, Grain, Meal, Bread, Biscuit and Flour, as have been, or shall be, taken from the Enemy, and brought into this Kingdom.

An Act to extend the Liberty granted by an Act of the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, of importing Bar Iron from His Majesty's Colonies in America, into the Port of London, to the rest of the Ports of Great Britain, and for repealing certain Clauses in the said Act.

An Act for Rebuilding the Bridge over the River Ribble, between the Townships of Preston and Perwortham, near a Place called the Fishhouse, in the County Palatine of Lancaster.

An Act for rebuilding, and keeping in Repair, the Shire Hall of the County of Warwick.

An Act for enlarging the Term, and amending and altering several Powers granted by an Act made in the Twentieth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for opening, cleansing, repairing, and improving the Haven of Southwold in the County of Suffolk.

An Act for building a Bridge over the River Lea, at or near a Place called Jeremy's Ferry, and for making, repairing, and widening Roads from thence into the great Roads at Snarebrooke, in the County of Essex, and at Clapton in the County of Middlesex.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the High Road leading from the North End of the Cow Causeway, near the Town of Newcastle upon Tyne, to the Town of Belford; and from thence to Buckton Burn in the County of Northumberland; and for making the same more effectual.

An Act for explaining and amending several Acts of Parliament for repairing the Roads between a Place called the White Post on Alconbury Hill, and Wansford Bridge, in the County of Huntingdon, and between Norman Cross Hill, in the said County, and the City of Peterborough, with respect to the Elections of new Trustees, the Power of compelling Persons employed by the Trustees, in the Execution of such Acts, to deliver up such Books and Papers relating thereto, as are in their Custody; and also to the Manner of summoning and holding the Meetings of the Trustees.

An Act for enlarging the Terms and Powers granted by two several Acts passed in the Fourteenth Year of His present Majesty, the one for repairing the Roads from a Place called the Redhouse near Doncaster, to Wakefield, and through the said Town of Wakefield, by Dewsbury, Hightown, and Lightcliffe, to the Town of Halifax, in the West Riding of the County of York; and the other for repairing the Road from Wakefield to Pontefract, and from thence to a Place called Weeland in the Township of Hensall, and from Pontefract to Wentbridge, in the Township of Darrington, in the West Riding of the County of York.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by two Acts of Parliament, one passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George, and the other in the Ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Highways from Crown Corner, in the Town of Reading, leading by and through the several Parishes of Shinfield and Heckfield, in the several Counties of Berks, Wilts, and Southampton, to Basingstoke in the County of Southampton.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the North End of Dapdon Wharf, in the Parish of Stoke, next Guldeford, through Guldeford, to Andrew's Cross, and to Alford Bars in the County of Surry, and from thence to St. Mary's Gate in Arundel, in the County of Suffex.

An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Roads leading from the Village of Milford, in the County of Surry, through Petworth, to the Top of Dunckton Hill, and from Petworth to Stopham Bridge, in the County of Suffex.

General Post-Office, March 21, 1757.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelisk, or High Stone, near Laytonstone, in the County of Essex, by a single Highwayman on Horseback, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy, at the same Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwise he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Post-Boy to unstrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horse, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. Norwich, Swaffham, Attleborough, Windham, Ibsford, Lynn; Stoke, Bury St. Edmunds, New Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Bishop Stortford, Sawbridgeworth, Downham, Epping, Ongar and Ely.

The Man who committed this Robbery is described to be a middle-sized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat—He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horse, with a swish Tail.
