The humble Address of the Governor and Council of the Province of North Carolina.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Governor and Council of North Carolina, do most sincerely, and with

most grateful Hearts, congratulate your Majesty upon the glorious Success of your Arms, and that of your Allies in Germany ; by securing the Protestant Religion and Liberties of Germany, and the Restoration of your Majesty's German Dominions, the glorious Victory obtained by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick at Crevelt, and the late Defeat of the Russians by the intrepid and indefatigable King of Prussia : And also upon the happy Introduction of your Arms by Sea into France, and destroying their Harbours and Ships, and securing the Gum Trade at Senegal ; and upon the glorious Success of your Arms in America, in taking Louisburg, by the French deemed impregnable, and its Dependencies ; and also of the Forts Cataracui and Duquesne, and the Submission of the Ohio Indians ; by which the American Frontiers, Possession and Trade of the Countries adjoining the great Inland Lakes are secured to your Majesty : These Conquests being of the utmost Consequence to the American Colonies and Trade of Britain.
