WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Officers of the two Battalions of the Norfolk Regiment of Militia, humbly beg Leave to lay at your Majesty's Feet the earliest Assurances of our Zeal and Assection for your Sacred Person and Government. The Happiness which this Nation hath enjoyed during your Majesty's glorious Reign, intitles you to every possible Instance of Duty from all your Subjects. But we rejoice in the Hopes of having it in our Power to realize those Professions of Allegiance, with which we humbly approach your Throne. The Arms, with which we are intrusted by your Majesty, shall never be imployed in any other Cause than the Defence of your Royal Person and Government, which is the Defence of the Religion and Liberties of this Country. We are impatient to manifest our Zeal in so glorious a Cause, and shall be ready to obey your Majesty's Commands, in any Part of the Kingdom, with the Alacrity and Vigour of Subjects who have no Interest separate from that of their Prince, and of Soldiers who are de-termined to hazard their Lives in opposing all Attempts that shall be made against your Majesty, your Royal House, and the happy Constitution upon which your Throne is established.
